



# DSWD DROMIC Report #9 on the Mw 7.0 Earthquake Incident in Tayum, Abra

as of 31 July 2022, 6AM

### I. Situation Overview

On 27 July 2022 at 8:43 AM, a 7.0-magnitude earthquake jolted the Municipality of Tayum, Abra (17.64°N, 120.63°E - 003 km N 45°W) with a tectonic origin and a depth of focus of 017 km. The earthquake was also felt in the neighboring municipalities.


