




DSWD DROMIC Preparedness for Response Report #3 on the Taal Volcano Activity

as of 11 August 2022, 6AM

I. Situation Overview

- Taal Volcano is at Alert Level 1, which means that it is at low-level unrest¹;
- Alert Level 1 indicates Abnormal parameters: moderate level of seismic activity with some felt events; main Crater Lake gas (diffuse CO2) emission >1,000 tonnes/day, slight increases in fumarole and/or main Crater Lake temperatures and acidity; slight and/or localized inflationary ground deformation changes in Taal Volcano Island (TVI).
- Hydrothermal or tectonic activity beneath the volcano may be occurring; steamdriven, gas or hydrothermal explosions can occur without warning.
- The Local Government Units (LGUs) and the public are strongly reminded that entry into the Taal Volcano Island (Permanent Danger Zone or PDZ), especially the Main Crater and Daang Kastila fissures, as well as the occupancy and boating on Taal Lake and the flying of any aircraft close to the Taal Volcano must not be allowed.
- DOST-PHIVOLCS is closely monitoring Taal Volcano's activity and any new development will be relayed to all concerned.

II. Predictive Analytics for Humanitarian Response (PAHR)

A total of **4,877 families** or **24,385 persons** in **13 barangays** in **Region CALABARZON** lying within the 7-kilometer (km) Permanent Danger Zone (PDZ) are at high risk on Taal Volcano's eruption. A massive eruption would directly affect **74,090 families** or **370,448 persons** spanning **six (6) municipalities in Batangas** (see Table 1).

A total of \$\mathbb{P}2,966,288.94\$ worth of family food packs (FFPs) is projected to be provided to 4,877 families in Regions CALABARZON based on the 7-km PDZ. A massive eruption would require 74,090 FFPs for the same number of families that would be directly affected, costing \$\mathbb{P}45,062,776.51\$ for a two (2)-day food requirement for a family of five (5) members (see Table 2).

1. Standby Funds

- ₱124.38 million Quick Response Fund (QRF) at the DSWD Central Office.
- ₱5 million available at DSWD FO CALABARZON.
- ₱64.33 million in other DSWD FOs which may support the relief needs through inter-FO augmentation.

2. Prepositioned FFPs and Other Relief Items

- 95,610 FFPs available in Disaster Response Centers; of which, 43,881 FFPs are at the National Resource Operations Center (NROC), Pasay City and 51,729 FFPs are at the Visayas Disaster Resource Center (VDRC), Mandaue City.
- 14,634 FFPs available at DSWD FO CALABARZON.
- 341,685 FFPs in other DSWD FOs which may support the relief needs through inter-FO augmentation.
- ₱687.43 million worth of other FNIs at NROC, VDRC, and DSWD FO CALABARZON warehouses.

•	DSWD FO CALABARZON monitored 166 individuals who experienced irritation of the eyes, nose, and throat, cough and colds, asthma and fever in Buso-Buso, Laurel due to the SO2 gas emission from the Taal Volcano. The Department of Agriculture (DA) IV-A have also reported damages to rice, corn, and high-value crops in the Province of Cavite and Batangas while 339 farmers in Laurel, Batangas have also been reportedly affected. The DSWD FO CALABARZON in collaboration with the Municipal Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (MDRRMC) of Laurel, Batangas delivered 447 Family Food Packs (FFPs) amounting to ₱347,967.15 intended for the affected farmers. The distribution of FFPs will be facilitated and witnessed by the Municipal Action Team (MAT) of Laurel, Batangas on 11 August 2022. DSWD FO CALABARZON Disaster Response Management Division (DRMD) is advised to activate the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) and place the Provincial QRTs of Batangas on alert status and monitor their area of responsibility for ready deployment. DSWD FO CALABARZON coordinated with the Regional Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (RDRRMC) IV-A Secretariat to convene a meeting with the members of the Response Cluster and affected LGUs to identify the objectives, strategies, and tactics in managing the consequences of the ongoing incident. The meeting will be held on 11 August 2022 via virtual teleconference. DSWD FO CALABARZON EOC notified the members of the RDRRMC IV-A Response Cluster to be on standby for any eventuality. DSWD FO CALABARZON EOC mobilized the members of Batangas Provincial Quick Response Team (PQRT) to conduct rapid assessment in





	 the affected areas of Laurel, Batangas and witness the distribution of Family Food Packs on 11 August 2022. DSWD FO CALABARZON is continuously monitoring and coordinating with the Local Social Welfare and Development Offices (LSWDOs) in Taal Volcano high risk areas and RDRRMC IV-A member agencies regarding the situation in their respective AOR. DSWD FO CALABARZON is ready to support and facilitate the assistance, once requested by Regional Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (RDRRMC) IV-A and Local Government Units (LGUs). DSWD FO CALABARZON maintains close coordination with the affected LGUs for any requests of Technical Assistance and Resource Augmentation (TARA).
08 August 2022	 DSWD FO CALABARZON monitors and closely coordinates with concerned offices/agencies for significant updates. DSWD FO CALABARZON has a total of 1,395 members of the Regional and Provincial Quick Response Teams (R PQRTs) including the P/C/MAT. DSWD FO CALABARZON has identified the 18 LGUs with permanent evacuation centers, GIDA areas in Quezon Province, and municipalities near ports to position the FNI in strategic areas. The Field Office will enter into agreement to the LGUs identified for the prepositioning of FNI as proactive measures in response to any related incident in the region.
