



DSWD DROMIC Report #3 on Super Typhoon Henry



I. Situation Overview

Issued at 5:00 PM, 03 September 2022, "HENRY" MAINTAINS ITS STRENGTH WHILE MOVING NORTHWARD OVER THE SEA EAST OF TAIWAN

Heavy Rainfall:

- Today: Light to moderate with at times heavy rains likely over Batanes and Babuyan Islands.
- Under these conditions, isolated to scattered flooding (including flash floods) and rain-induced landslides are possible especially in areas that are highly or very highly susceptible



to these hazard as identified in hazard maps, and in localities with significant antecedent rainfall.

 In the next 24 hours, the Southwest Monsoon enhanced by this typhoon will also bring monsoon rains over the western sections of Northern and Central Luzon. For more information, refer to Weather Advisory #3 issued at 11:00 AM today and the 24-Hour Public Weather Forecast at 4:00 PM today.

Severe Winds:

- Strong wind strength (strong breeze to near gale) will be experienced within any of the areas where Wind Signal no. 1 is currently in effect.
- In the next 24 hours, occasional gusts reaching strong to gale-force strength associated with the enhanced Southwest Monsoon and its convergence with the typhoon circulation may also be experienced (especially in the coastal and mountainous areas) over Ilocos Region, Cordillera Administrative Region, Central Luzon, Metro Manila, CALABARZON, Bicol Region, Cagayan, Isabela, Nueva Vizcaya, Quirino, Mindoro Provinces, Romblon, and the remaining localities in Babuyan Islands that are not under any wind signal.

Hazards affecting Coastal Waters:

- Under the influence of Typhoon HENRY, a Gale Warning is in effect for the seaboards of Northern Luzon. For more information, refer to Gale Warning #7 issued at 5:00 PM today.
- In the next 24 hours, HENRY may bring moderate to rough seas over the eastern seaboards of Central and Southern Luzon (1.2 to 3.0 m). These conditions may be risky for those using small seacrafts. Mariners are advised to take precautionary measures





when venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigating in these conditions.

Track and Intensity Outlook:

- Under the influence of Typhoon HENRY, a Gale Warning is in effect for the seaboards of Northern Luzon. For more information, refer to Gale Warning #7 issued at 5:00 PM today.
- In the next 24 hours, HENRY may bring moderate to rough seas over the eastern seaboards of Central and Southern Luzon (1.2 to 3.0 m). These conditions may be risky for those using small seacrafts. Mariners are advised to take precautionary measures when venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigating in these conditions.

The center of the eye of Typhoon "HENRY" was estimated based on all available data at 460km Northeast of Itbayat, Batanes (23.9 °N, 124.8 °E) moving Northwestward at 10 km/h with a maximum sustained winds of 150 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 185 km/h.

03 September 2022	 The Disaster Response Management Bureau (DRMB) is closely coordinating with the concerned field offices for significant disaster response updates. DRMB participated in the NDRRMC Weather updating for Super Typhoon "HENRY" and Tropical Depression Gardo on 01 September 2022. All DRMB Quick Response Team (QRT) members and emergency equipment are on standby and ready for deployment.
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DSWD-NRLMB

03 September 2022	 DSWD-NRLMB is continuously repacking goods for possible augmentation. DSWD-NRLMB provides logistical augmentation to FOs on delivering FFPs to LGUs.

DSWD-CAR

DATE	SITUATIONS / ACTIONS UNDERTAKEN
01 September 2022	 DSWD FO CAR continuously conducts daily monitoring of Super Typhoon "HENRY" maximizing all available communication resources. The Quick Response Teams (QRTs) of DRMD is activated at the Regional Operations Center for continuous monitoring of their respective areas of responsibility. DSWD FO CAR ensures the availability and prepositioning of food and non-food items in response to possible effects of Super Typhoon "HENRY". DSWD FO CAR ensures the functionality and availability of telecommunications and transportation equipment.

DSWD-FO I

03 September 2022	 DSWD FO I continuously monitoring the effects of Southwest Monsoon and Typhoon Henry. DSWD FO I continuously coordinating through the Provincial Operations Offices on the affected population in LGU Burgos and Caoyan, Ilocos Sur.
02 September 2022	 DSWD FO I facilitated the RDRRMC I – Response Cluster meeting with regards on the updates and actions taken of the LGUs and RDRRMC cluster member. DSWD FO I facilitated the unloading of 3,600 bags of rice at DSWD FO1 Regional Warehouse in La Union to ensure availability of FFPs. DSWD FO I recorded 47 families with 122 individuals have conducted pre-emptive evacuation in one (1) evacuation center while 12 families with 28 individuals are outside the evacuation center in Burgos, Ilocos Sur
01 September 2022	 DSWD FO I continuously conducts daily monitoring of Super Typhoon "HENRY" maximizing all available communication resources.





 DSWD FO I lead by Regional Director Marie Angela S. Gopalan attended the PDRA meeting facilitated by OCD in preparation for the possible effects of Super Typhoon "HENRY". DSWD FO I ensures the availability and prepositioning of food and non-food items

DSWD-FO II

03 September 2022	 DSWD FO II recorded a total of one (1) family and/ or 5 individuals have conducted preemptive evacuation in one (1) evacuation center in Brgy. San Antonio, Basco, Batanes. DSWD FO II continuously coordinating with concerned LGUs for possible augmentation support.
01 September 2022	 DSWD FO II attended the Pre-Disaster Risk Assessment (PDRA) Core Group Meeting relative to the preparedness for response measures of every member council of Cagayan Valley Regional Disaster Risk Reduction Management Council (CVRDRRMC). DSWD FO II ensures that the Regional Quick Response Teams (RQRTs), Social Welfare and Development Teams and City / Municipal Action Teams (C/MATs) in the region are on a ON-CALL/STANDBY status and are advised to coordinate with the Local Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Councils (LDRRMCs) / Local Social Welfare and Development Offices (LSWDOs) if there are concerns needed to be addressed by the Field Office. DSWD FO II ensures the availability of Food and Non-Food Items (FNIs) at any given time. DSWD FO II through the Disaster Response Management Division (DRMD) is continuously coordinating with the Provincial / City / Municipal Social Welfare and Development Offices (P/C/MSWDOs) and Provincial / City / Municipal Disaster Risk Reduction Management Offices (P/C/MDRRMOs) in the provinces of Cagayan, Isabela, Quirino, Nueva Vizcaya and Batanes for significant disaster response updates.


