



DSWD DROMIC Report #3 on Tropical Depression "Maymay"

as of 13 October 2022, 6PM


I. Situation Overview

Issued on 13 October 2022 at 5 AM, the threat of heavy rainfall continues as "Maymay" weakens into a Low-Pressure Area.

Hazards affecting Land Areas

Heavy Rains:

- Today through tomorrow early morning, moderate to heavy with at times intense rains over Cagayan, Isabela, and Apayao. Light to moderate with at times heavy rains over the rest of Cagayan Valley and Cordillera Administrative Region.
- Under these conditions and considering significant antecedent



rainfall, scattered to widespread flooding (including flashfloods) and rain-induced landslides are expected especially in areas that are highly or very highly susceptible to these hazard as identified in hazard maps, and in localities with significant antecedent rainfall. For more information, refer to the 24-Hour Public Weather Forecast issued at 4 AM today and the Weather Advisory #7 issued at 11 PM yesterday.

Severe Winds:

 Despite the lifting of wind signals, occasional gusts reaching strong to gale-force strength associated with the enhanced northeasterly surface wind flow may still be experienced (especially in the coastal and mountainous areas) over Batanes, Cagayan, Cordillera Administrative Region, and Ilocos Region.

Hazards affecting Coastal Waters

- Due to the surge of northeasterly surface wind flow, rough to very rough seas (2.8 to 5.5 m) will prevail over the seaboards of Northern and Central Luzon and the eastern seaboard of Southern Luzon. For more information, refer to Gale Warning #8 issued at 5 AM today.
- Moderate to rough seas (1.5 to 3.5 m) over the western seaboards of Central and Southern Luzon. These conditions may be risky for those using small seacrafts. Mariners are advised to take precautionary measures when venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigating in these conditions.

Track and Intensity Outlook

• The remnant circulation of "MAYMAY" is forecast to track westward towards Aurora. Due to the frictional effects, this may dissipate within 12 hours.

The Low Pressure Area (formerly "MAYMAY") was estimated based on all available data over the coastal waters of Casiguran, Aurora (16.1°N, 122.1°E) and moving West Southwestward at 15 km/h.



12 October 2022	 DSWD FO CAR conducts real-time monitoring of weather updates and information within the area of responsibility (AOR). DSWD FO CAR through the Disaster Response Management Division (DRMD) QRT is on standby at the DRMD Operations Center for monitoring of the AOR. DSWD FO CAR is strategically prepositioning goods in disaster-prone areas within the Region. DSWD FO CAR ensures availability of FNIs at the Regional and Satellite warehouses. The DRMD Disaster Response focal persons in the provinces are actively monitoring their AOR for any untoward incident. DSWD FO CAR ensures the availability of transportation and communication services ready for deployment. DSWD FO CAR conducted PDRA with the Provincial Action Team and QRT leaders to check on the readiness of each office for any untoward incident that may occur.

12 October 2022	 DSWD FO I closely monitors the movement of Tropical Depression Maymay through the Department of Science and Technology – Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (DOST-PAGASA) and coordinates with the Regional Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (RDRRMC) 1. DSWD FO I ensures availability of FNIs including drinking water for augmentation to LGUs.
11 October 2022	DSWD FO I attended the Pre-Disaster Risk Assessment (PDRA) Meeting facilitated by the Office of Civil Defense (OCD) in preparation for the possible effects of Tropical Depression Maymay and other weather systems. Per agreement, it was recommended to raise the Region's alert level status to BLUE, in consonance with the ALPHA Emergency Preparedness and Response (EPR) Protocol while the Response Cluster is on standby for possible activation.

13 October 2022	 DSWD FO II Disaster Response Monitoring Team (DRMT) conducted meeting and coordinated with Social Welfare and Development Teams (SWADTs), City/Municipal Action Teams (C/MATs) relative to the status of affected families. DSWD FO II together with MATs conducted validation and monitoring of the status of affected families and relief operations in the affected LGUs in Cagayan.
12 October 2022	 DSWD FO II, together with its Municipal Action Team (MAT), conducted actual validation of reported families affected by flooding in Brgy. Tallungan, Aparri, Cagayan. DSWD FO II through its MAT in Lasam, Cagayan conducted validation of families affected by flooding in Barangays Cabatacan East, Cabatacan West, Tucalan Passing, and Finugo Norte. The MAT stationed in Gattaran, Cagayan coordinated with the Chairman of Barangay Basao to validate the reported flooding in the area. DSWD FO II attended the media interview in relation to Tropical Depression "Maymay". DSWD FO II requested 10,000 FFPs, 3,000 hygiene kits, and 3,000 sleeping kits to NRLMB as additional standby stockpile of the Region readily available for augmentation to LGUs affected by the TD "Maymay". DSWD FO II released an advisory directed the DRMD and the FO QRT, Social Welfare and Development Teams (SWADTs) and Municipal Action Teams (MATs) to render duty starting 11 October 2022. The 6-wheeler wing van truck from the DSWD FO II loaded with FNIs is on its way to Lal-lo Satellite Warehouse and readily available for augmentation to the affected families. The DRMD, FO QRTs, and SWADTs conducted emergency meeting regarding Tropical Depression Maymay. The MAT Aparri conducted actual validation on the reported families affected due to flooding brought about by Tropical Depression Maymay. DSWD FO II closely coordinates with SWADTs and MATs relative to the status of affected families brought about by Tropical Depression Maymay. The DRMD of the FO II continuously coordinates with the Provincial/City/Municipal Social Welfare and Development Offices (P/C/MSWDOs) and Provincial/City/Municipal Disaster Risk Reduction Management Offices (P/C/MDRRMOs) in the Provinces of Cagayan, Isabela, Quirino, Nueva Vizcaya, and Batanes for significant disaster response updates.

11 October 2022	 The DSWD FO CALABARZON Emergency Operations Center (EOC) including the QRTs were placed on alert status to monitor the possible effects of the weather disturbance in their AOR. The 1,144 members of the Regional and Provincial QRTs trained on Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM), Rapid Damage Assessment and Needs Analysis (RDANA), Incident Command System (ICS), EOC Management, Emergency Telecommunications and Psychosocial Processing are placed on standby alert status and were advise for possible deployment and disaster duty. The Local Social Welfare and Development Offices (LSWDOs) in the identified flood, landslide, and storm surge-prone areas were advised to undertake pre-emptive evacuation. The DSWD FO CALABARZON as the Response Cluster lead provided guidance and advised its cluster members to ensure that resources are available should the need arise. The DSWD FO CALABARZON closely coordinates with the RDRRMC IV-A Operations Center and PDRRMCs of Cavite, Laguna, Rizal, and Quezon for any updates regarding the situation. The DSWD FO CALABARZON EOC continuously conducts weather monitoring through DOST-PAGASA social media pages and disseminating the same to the members of the QRTs.
