



# DSWD DROMIC Report #4 on the Flooding Incidents in MIMAROPA

as of 02 January 2023, 6PM

## I. Situation Overview

On 23 December 2022, several municipalities in the Provinces of Oriental Mindoro and Palawan experienced flooding due to the effects of the Northeast Monsoon.

A total of ₱1,647,124.00 worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, ₱1,442,700.00 from DSWD, ₱185,979.00 from the Local Government Units (LGUs), and ₱18,445.00 from the other Partners (see Table 6).

- 92,222 FFPs available in Disaster Response Centers; of which, 74,116 FFPs are at the National Resource Operations Center (NROC), Pasay City and 18,106 FFPs are at the Visayas Disaster Resource Center (VDRC), Mandaue City.
- 54,292 FFPs available at DSWD FO MIMAROPA.
- ₱292.8 million worth of other FNIs at NROC, VDRC, and DSWD FO MIMAROPA warehouses.
