as of 04 January 2023, 6PM

I. Situation Overview

On 23 December 2022, several municipalities in the Provinces of Oriental Mindoro and Palawan experienced flooding due to the effects of the Northeast Monsoon.

V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of \$\mathbb{P}2,147,624.00\$ worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, \$\mathbb{P}1,943,200.00\$ from \$\mathbb{D}SWD\$, \$\mathbb{P}185,979.00\$ from the Local Government Units (LGUs), and \$\mathbb{P}18,445.00\$ from the other Partners (see Table 6).

2. Prepositioned FFPs and Other Relief Items

- 94,960 FFPs available in Disaster Response Centers; of which, 76,854 FFPs are at the National Resource Operations Center (NROC), Pasay City and 18,106 FFPs are at the Visayas Disaster Resource Center (VDRC), Mandaue City.
- 50,392 FFPs available at DSWD FO MIMAROPA.
- ₱104.22 million worth of other FNIs at NROC, VDRC, and DSWD FO MIMAROPA warehouses.

30 December 2022	 DSWD FO MIMAROPA has an ongoing hauling and delivery of FFPs from the Social Welfare and Development (SWAD) Office to Bataraza, Palawan. DSWD FO MIMAROPA though its SWAD Office delivered and distributed FFPs to the affected families in Naujan, Oriental Mindoro.

	DSWD FO MIMAROPA regularly monitors the local weather conditions through coordination with its Social Welfare and Development Team (SWADT) Offices, Quick Response Teams (QRTs), Local Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Offices (LDRRMOs), and Local Social Welfare and Development Offices (LSWDOs), and advisories issued by DOST-PAGASA, Department of Environment and Natural Resources – Mines and Geosciences Bureau (DENR-MGB), and other warning agencies.
29 December 2022	Affected families with damaged houses were referred to DSWD FO MIMAROPA's Crisis Intervention Section (CIS) for provision of additional relief intervention.

The Disaster Response Operations Monitoring and Information Center (DROMIC) of DSWD-DRMB is closely coordinating with DSWD FO MIMAROPA for significant disaster response updates and assistance provided.
