

DSWD DROMIC Report #5 on the Flooding Incidents in MIMAROPA

as of 04 January 2023, 6PM

I. Situation Overview

On 23 December 2022, several municipalities in the Provinces of Oriental Mindoro and Palawan experienced flooding due to the effects of the Northeast Monsoon.

A total of **6,048 families** or **28,226 persons** are affected in **62 barangays** in **MIMAROPA** (see Table 1).
