



DSWD DROMIC Report #4 on the Oil Spill Incident in Naujan, Oriental Mindoro

as of 07 March 2023, 6AM

I. Situation Overview

On 01 March 2023, the Philippine Coast Guard (PCG) confirmed oil spillage in the waters of Naujan in Oriental Mindoro after the Motor Tanker (MT) Princess Empress sunk last 28 February 2023.

Reports indicated that the MT Princess Empress was loaded with 800,000 liters of industrial fuel prior to the incident. The vessel experienced engine trouble brought by overheating while in transit from the Province of Bataan to the Province of Iloilo, causing it to drift towards Balingawan Point in Naujan. It then partially sank due to rough sea conditions until it fully submerged on 28 February 2023.

There were twenty (20) crew members onboard including the Master Captain that were eventually rescued.

On 03 March 2023, the PCG confirmed the impact of the oil spill in the province of Antique particularly in the municipality of Caluya.

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **22,489 families** or **92,168 persons** are affected in **98 barangays** in **Regions MIMAROPA** and **VI** (see Table 1).



III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are ten (10) families or 40 persons currently taking temporary shelter in one (1) evacuation center in Caluya, Antique (see Table 2).

IV. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of \$\mathbb{P}_3,144,015.00\$ worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, \$\mathbb{P}_3,123,800.00\$ from the DSWD and \$\mathbb{P}_20,215.00\$ from the Local Government Unit (LGU) (see Table 2).

1. Standby Funds

- ₱704.46 million Quick Response Fund (QRF) at the DSWD Central Office.
- ₱10 million available at DSWD FOs MIMAROPA and VI.
- ₱61.21 million available in DSWD FOs which may support the relief needs of the displaced families due to the effects of the Oil Spill Incident through inter-FO augmentation.

2. Prepositioned FFPs and Other Relief Items

- 121,071 FFPs available in Disaster Response Centers; of which, 67,324 FFPs are at the National Resource Operations Center (NROC), Pasay City and 53,747 FFPs are at the Visayas Disaster Resource Center (VDRC), Mandaue City.

04 March 2023	 1,000 FFPs from DSWD FO VI were at Philippine Coast Guard (PCG) Headquarters which would be transported to Caluya, Antique once the weather condition improves. DSWD FO VI through its Municipal Action Team (MAT) hauled 300 FFPs from Barbaza, Antique to Lipata Port, Culasi, Antique in coordination with the Provincial Government of Antique. Other FNIs and Personal Protective Equipment (PPEs) from the Office of Civil Defense (OCD) were to be transported by a PCG vessel to Caluya, Antique.

04 March 2023	 DSWD FO MIMAROPA SWADT Office in Oriental Mindoro, together with Provincial/City/Municipal Quick Response Teams (P/C/MQRTs), continuously monitored and coordinated with the concerned Local Disaster Risk Reduction Management for the updates and response activities. DSWD FO MIMAROPA attended the Regional Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (RDRRMC) Meeting and presented the agency's plans and actions taken in relation to the oil spill incident.
03 March 2023	DSWD FO MIMAROPA conducted coordination meeting with the Local Social Welfare and Development Offices (LSWDOs) of the affected municipalities to get updates on the situation of the affected population and plan out appropriate response actions. One of the agreements is for the LSWDOs to submit the list of affected fisherfolks for the provision of financial assistance and FFPs.

03 March 2023	DSWD FO VI closely coordinated with the Provincial Government of Antique and the LGU of Caluya for updates on the situation in the affected area.


