

DSWD DROMIC Preparedness for Response Report #1 on the Super Typhoon (STY) “Mawar” as of 25 May 2023, 6PM

Situation Overview

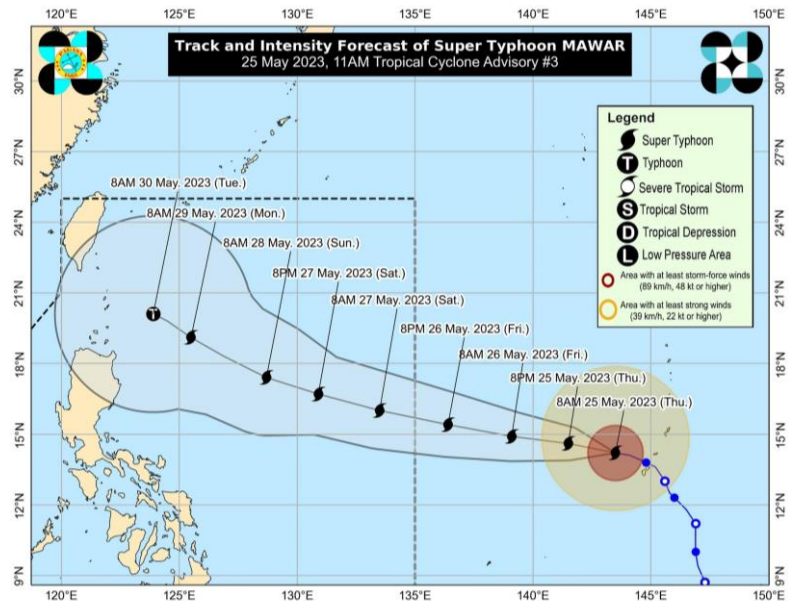
Issued on 25 May 2023 at 11 AM, “Mawar” maintains its strength while moving westward at 10 km/h.

Location of Center (10 AM):

The center of the eye of Super Typhoon “Mawar” was estimated based on all available data at 2,065 km East of Southeastern Luzon (14.2°N, 143.3°E).

Intensity:

Maximum sustained winds of 185 km/h near the center, gustiness of up to 230 km/h, and central pressure of 930 hPa.



Extent of Tropical Cyclone Winds:

Strong to typhoon-force winds extend outwards up to 400 km from the center.

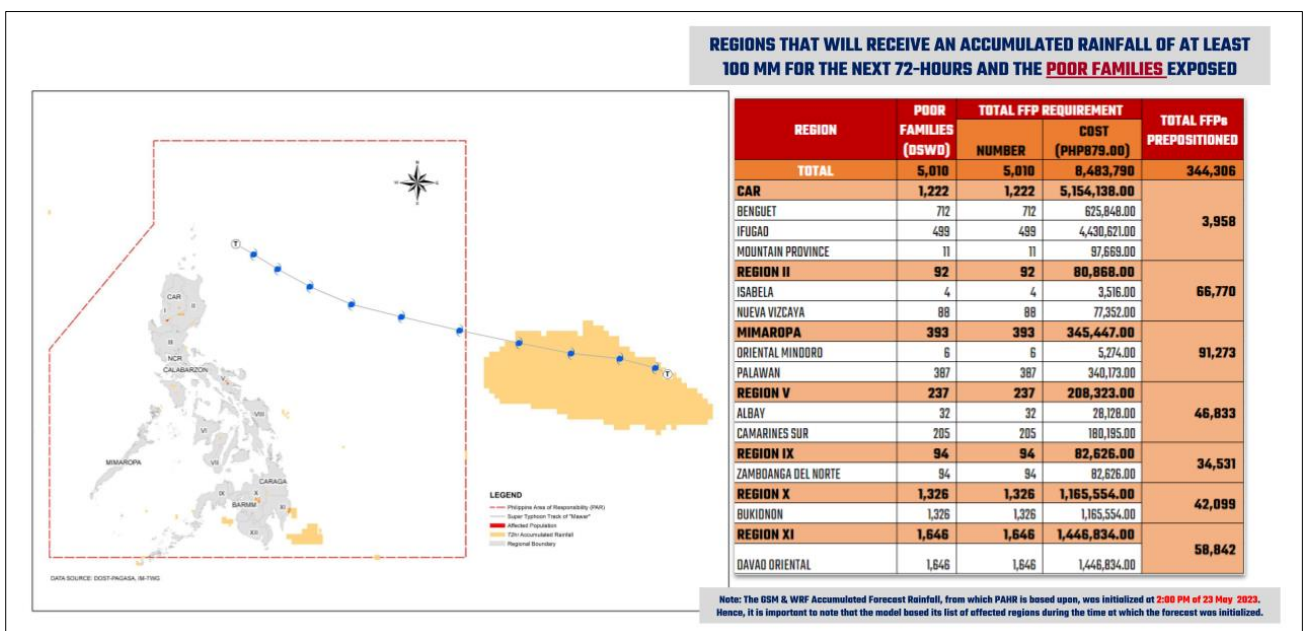
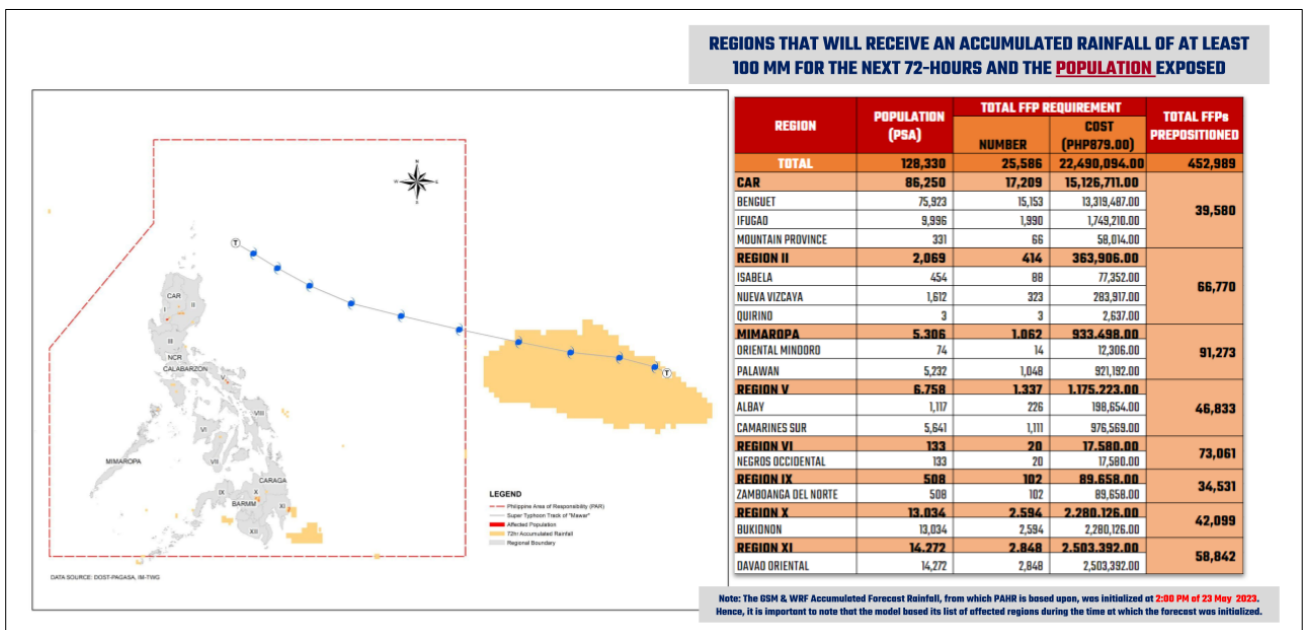
General Outlook for the Forecast Period

- Super Typhoon “Mawar” is forecast to accelerate tracking generally west northwestward in the next 12 hours before turning westward. On the forecast track, “Mawar” will enter the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) tomorrow evening or on Saturday morning and will move west northwestward throughout the forecast period towards the sea area east of Extreme Northern Luzon. The forecast confidence cone and the slightly southward shift in the model solutions suggest that the potential for a much closer approach to the country than the ones shown by the center track is not ruled out.
- “Mawar” is forecast to continue intensifying in the next three days and may reach a peak intensity of 215 km/h by Sunday. Afterwards, the super typhoon is forecast to weaken although it will remain a typhoon by the end of the forecast period.
- Current track scenario shows that the rain bands of the typhoon may bring heavy rains over Cagayan Valley between Sunday and Tuesday next week. In addition, strong to gale-force conditions may be experienced in most areas of the region (except for Batanes-Babuyan Islands area which may have gale to storm-force conditions) which result in the hoisting of Tropical Cyclone Wind Signal in the coming days. However, considering potential shifts in the track forecasts of “Mawar”, residents in Cagayan Valley and other areas of Northern Luzon are advised to monitor for changes in the forecast weather scenario.

- “Mawar” is forecast to enhance the Southwest Monsoon and may trigger monsoon rains over the western portions of Luzon and Visayas beginning on Sunday or Monday. However, the monsoon rains scenario may still change due to dependence of Southwest Monsoon enhancement on the track and intensity of MAWAR.

Status of Prepositioned Resources: Stockpile and Standby Funds

The DSWD Central Office (CO), Field Offices (FOs), and National Resource Operations Center (NROC) have stockpiles and standby funds amounting to **₱2,079,827,344.75** with breakdown as follows (see Table 1):

a. Standby Funds

A total of **₱598,542,046.87 standby funds** in the CO and FOs. Of the said amount, **₱525,218,364.15** is the available **Quick Response Fund (QRF)** in the CO.

b. Stockpiles

A total of **784,682 family food packs (FFPs)** amounting to **₱518,939,335.27**, **other food items** amounting to **₱209,572,705.23**, and **non-food items (NFIs)** amounting to **₱752,773,257.38** are available

25 May 2023	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Disaster Response Management Bureau (DRMB) closely coordinates with the DSWD FOs for disaster preparedness measures and activities. Undersecretary for Disaster Response Management Group (DRMG) Dr. Diana Rose Cajipe, together with Special Assistant to the Secretary (SAS) for Disaster Response Management Ma. Isabel Lanada, SAS for Supply Chain Management and Logistics Marlon A. Alagao, and DSWD FOs, led and convened the meeting on DSWD Disaster Preparedness for Response on the Possible Effects of STY “Mawar”. The National Resource and Logistics Management Bureau (NRLMB) ensures the replenishment and availability of Food and Non-Food Items (FNIs) for resource augmentation to DSWD FOs as need arises. The Disaster Response Management Bureau (DRMB) closely coordinates with DOST-PAGASA for significant weather updates and other related information relative to STY “Mawar”. All DRMB Quick Response Team (QRT) members and emergency equipment are on standby and ready for deployment. DSWD-NRLMB continuously repacks goods for possible augmentation.

DSWD FO NCR

25 May 2023	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> DSWD FO NCR established its operations center and conducts daily monitoring of the weather situation. DSWD FO NCR continuously coordinates with the local government units (LGUs) through their respective Local Social Welfare and Development Offices (LSWDOs) and with Metro Manila Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (MMDRRMC) for reports on incidents requiring augmentation assistance. Some members of the DSWD FO NCR QRT and the Motorcycle Riders Group are activated and on standby to respond to any eventualities. Volunteers who are assigned at DSWD FO NCR warehouse in Pasay City have been notified for duty to augment in the repacking of relief goods.

DSWD FO CAR

25 May 2023	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> DSWD FO CAR maintains daily monitoring of weather updates and other related information within the area of responsibility (AOR). DSWD FO CAR conducted strategic prepositioning of relief goods in disaster-prone areas within the Region for immediate response. DSWD FO CAR is in close coordination with the LGUs for additional prepositioning of FNIs to their designated hubs. DSWD FO CAR ensures availability of transportation and communication services ready for possible deployment if needed. DSWD FO CAR closely coordinates with the Emergency Telecommunications Team for the testing of communication equipment. DSWD FO CAR coordinates with volunteers and service providers for the hauling of scheduled deliveries of FNIs. DSWD FO CAR QRTs are on standby and ready for deployment.

DSWD FO I closely coordinates with the Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Councils (PDRRMCs) and the Provincial Social Welfare and Development Offices (PSWDOs) to monitor the possible effects of the current weather condition and to ensure submission of reports when needed. DSWD FO I staff in different Provincial Operations Offices (POOs) are closely monitoring their respective (AORs) for any eventualities. Members of the Incident Management Team (IMT) are on standby for possible activation of the DSWD FO I IMT while other DSWD staff are on stand by for possible conduct of disaster response operations. DSWD FO I ensures the availability of all resources for possible augmentation to affected LGUs.

The QRT members were provided with refresher course on their roles and responsibilities during disaster response operations. Most of the team leaders were trained on Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM). Other members were trained on Mental Health and Psychosocial Support, and Basic First Aid. The Active Rapid Deployment Team is on standby for continuous monitoring of STY “Mawar”.

DSWD FO CALABARZON issued advisory on the possible activation of the Regional and Provincial QRTs and monitor the possible effects of the STY “Mawar” in the Region. DSWD FO CALABARZON EOC continuously conducts weather monitoring through DOST-PAGASA. DSWD FO CALABARZON closely coordinates with the RDRRMC IV-A Operations Center and PSWDOs for any significant updates relative to STY “Mawar”. DSWD FO CALABARZON attended the virtual meeting with the DSWD Central Office and all DSWD FOs relative to the Department’s preparedness measures. DSWD FO MIMAROPA’s expanded Regional/Provincial/City/Municipal (R/P/C/M) QRTs are on-call status together with special projects staff on a 24/7 basis for possible activation of the Operations Center to respond in case any untoward incident and eventualities are reported. DSWD FO MIMAROPA’s logistical equipment and workforce are on standby.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● DSWD FO MIMAROPA maintains coordination with SWAD Team Offices and concerned LGUs for the management of stranded passengers in ports and terminals, if any. ● DSWD FO MIMAROPA's Information and Communications Technology Management Section (ICTMS) is on standby to ensure availability of a robust communication system. ● DSWD FO MIMAROPA closely coordinates with the Office of Civil Defense (OCD) and RDRRMC MIMAROPA to monitor the areas that may be affected by the weather disturbance, establish response mechanisms, and gather other related updates. ● DSWD FO MIMAROPA ensures adherence to the NDRRMC's guidelines on COVID-19 Preparedness Measure. ● DSWD FO MIMAROPA ensures the availability of FNIs, transportation vehicles, and communications equipment.
