



DSWD DROMIC Preparedness for Response Report #3 on the Super Typhoon (STY) "Betty" (Mawar)

as of 27 May 2023, 6PM

Situation Overview

Issued on 27 May 2023 at 5PM, "Betty" slightly weakens and is now moving westward.


HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

- Forecast accumulated rainfall from Monday afternoon to Tuesday afternoon
 - 100-200mm: Batanes, Babuyan Islands, and the northern portions of mainland Cagayan, Apayao, Ilocos Norte, and Ilocos Sur.
 - 50-100 mm: La Union and the rest of Cordillera Administrative Region
- Forecast accumulated rainfall from Tuesday afternoon to Wednesday afternoon
 - o Greater than 200 mm: Batanes
 - o 100-200 mm: Babuyan Islands, Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur, and La Union
 - 50-100 mm: Cordillera Administrative Region and the northern portion of mainland Cagayan.
- Forecast rainfall are generally higher in elevated or mountainous areas.
- In areas that will not be directly affected by the super typhoon, monsoon rains from the enhanced Southwest Monsoon are possible over the western sections of MIMAROPA, Visayas, and Mindanao tomorrow. On Monday and Tuesday, monsoon rains are likely over the western sections of MIMAROPA and Western Visayas, and possible over the rest of MIMAROPA and Western Visayas.
- Under these conditions, flooding and rain-induced landslides are likely, especially in areas that are highly or very highly susceptible to these hazard as identified in hazard maps and in localities that experienced considerable amounts of rainfall for the past several days.

Severe Winds

- Strong winds (strong breeze to near gale strength) will be experienced within the areas where Tropical Cyclone Wind Signal No.1 is currently in effect.
- The enhanced Southwest Monsoon may bring strong breeze to near gale conditions with intermittent gusts beginning on tomorrow evening or early Monday over Visayas, the







western portions of Central and Southern Luzon, and the northern and western portions of Mindanao.

HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

- Under the influence of BETTY, a Marine Gale Warning is in effect over the northern and eastern seaboards of Northern Luzon, eastern seaboards of Central and Southern Luzon, and the eastern seaboards of Visayas and Mindanao. For more information, refer to Gale Warning #1 issued at 5:00 PM today.
- These conditions may be risky for those using small seacrafts. Mariners of small seacrafts are advised to take precautionary measures when venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigating in these conditions.

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

- Super Typhoon BETTY is forecast to track westward in the next 12 hours before turning
 west northwestward. On Monday, the tropical cyclone will turn northwestward and
 decelerate as it moves over the waters east of Extreme Northern Luzon. BETTY may
 eventually become almost stationary between late Tuesday and early Wednesday when
 it will be closest to Batanes (i.e., within 250-300 km).
- BETTY is forecast to remain as a super typhoon over the weekend. Although it will likely
 maintain its strength for the next 36-48 hours, short-term intensification is not ruled out
 especially in the next 12 to 24 hours. However, this tropical cyclone may begin weakening
 considerably on Monday or Tuesday during its slowdown period over the waters east of
 Batanes due to potential unfavorable conditions (e.g., effect of upwelling of cooler ocean
 water and dry air intrusion).

The center of the eye of Super Typhoon BETTY was estimated based on all available data at 1,035 km East of Central Luzon (16.7°N, 131.8°E) and moving westward at 25 km/h with a maximum sustained winds of 185 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 230 km/h.

Predictive Analytics for Humanitarian Response (PAHR)

Based on the Global Spectral Model (GSM) & Weather Research and Forecasting (WRF) Accumulated Forecast Rainfall initialized on 27 May 2023 at 8AM, the PAHR results show that 616,894 families (PSA) or 116,469 poor families (Listahanan) in Regions I, II, III, MIMAROPA, V, VI, VII, VIII, BARMM, and CAR may be affected by STY Betty. Hence, it is important to note that the model based its list of affected Regions during the time at which the forecast was initialized.

Status of Prepositioned Resources: Stockpile and Standby Funds

The DSWD Central Office (CO), Field Offices (FOs), and National Resource Operations Center (NROC) have stockpiles and standby funds amounting to ₱2,084,509,460.16 with breakdown as follows (see Table 1):

a. Standby Funds

A total of **P505,032,667.91 standby funds** in the CO and FOs. Of the said amount, **P431,708,985.19** is the available **Quick Response Fund (QRF)** in the CO.

b. Stockpiles

A total of 881,390 family food packs (FFPs) amounting to ₱560,154,021.94, other food items amounting to ₱195,513,613.61, and non-food items (NFIs) amounting to ₱823,809,156.70 are available

DSWD FO IX ensures coordination with the Response Cluster member agencies for logistics support to immediately respond to any reported incident. DSWD FO IX closely coordinates with the LDRRMOs for significant updates relative to STY "Mawar". All C/MATs and QRT members of DSWD FO IX are on standby for any possible deployment to any imminent disaster and were instructed to immediately validate and assess reported incidents for any possible relief augmentation support needed. DSWD FO IX through its DRMD disseminated all monitored weather updates to its QRT members and directed them to gather other relevant updates from LGUs. DSWD FO IX continuously repacks relief goods at the DSWD Mampang warehouse in Zamboanga City and procures raw materials for the continuous production of FNIs.
