

# DSWD DROMIC Preparedness for Response Report #4 on the Super Typhoon (STY) “Betty” (Mawar)

as of 28 May 2023, 6PM

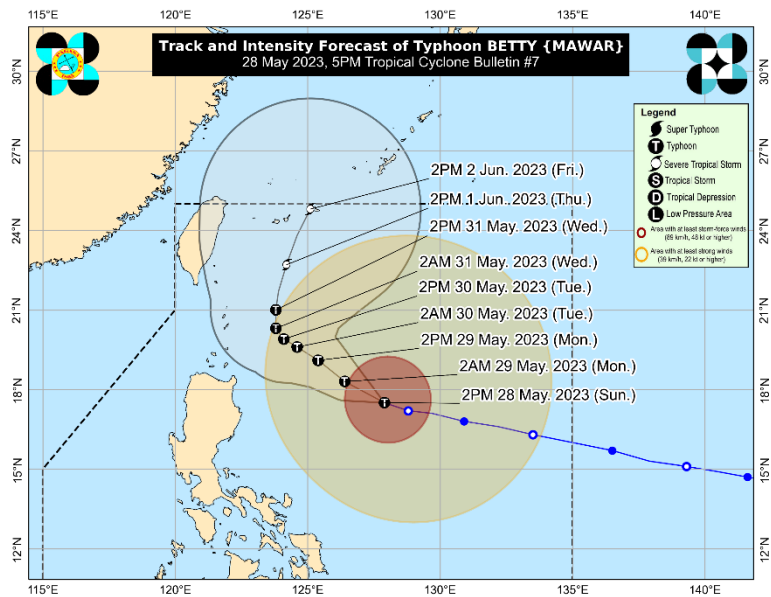
## Situation Overview

Issued on 28 May 2023 at 5PM, “Betty” slightly weakens and is now moving West Northwestward over the Philippine Sea East of Northern Luzon

## HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

### Heavy Rainfall Outlook

- Forecast accumulated rainfall from tomorrow afternoon to Tuesday afternoon
    - 100-200 mm: The eastern portion of Babuyan Islands and the northeastern portion of mainland Cagayan.
    - 50-100 mm: Batanes, the northwestern portion of mainland Cagayan, and the northern portions of Ilocos Norte and Apayao.
  - Forecast accumulated rainfall from Tuesday afternoon to Wednesday afternoon
    - Greater than 200 mm: Batanes, Babuyan Islands, and the northern portion of Ilocos Norte
    - 100-200 mm: The northern portion of mainland Cagayan, the rest of Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur, La Union, Abra, and Benguet
    - 50-100 mm: Pangasinan and the rest of Cordillera Administrative Region and mainland Cagayan.
  - Forecast accumulated rainfall from Wednesday afternoon to Thursday afternoon
    - Greater than 200 mm: Batanes, Ilocos Sur, the northern portion of La Union, and the northern portion of Benguet
    - 100-200 mm: Babuyan Islands, Ilocos Norte, Abra, and the rest of La Union and Benguet
    - 50-100 mm: The northern portion of mainland Cagayan, Pangasinan, and the rest of Cordillera Administrative Region
- In addition, Typhoon BETTY will also enhance the Southwest Monsoon this week:
- Tomorrow: Monsoon rains are possible over the western portions of MIMAROPA and Western Visayas
  - Tuesday: Monsoon rains are likely over the western portions of CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, and Western Visayas
  - Wednesday: Monsoon rains are likely over Western Visayas and the western portions of Central and Southern Luzon



Under these conditions, flooding and rain-induced landslides are likely, especially in areas that are highly or very highly susceptible to these hazard as identified in hazard maps and in localities that experienced considerable amounts of rainfall for the past several days.

### Severe Winds

- Minimal to minor impacts caused by strong winds (i.e., strong breeze to near gale strength) are possible within any of the areas where Tropical Cyclone Wind Signal No.1 is currently in effect. Such conditions may begin tonight or tomorrow.
- Wind Signal No. 2 remains the most likely highest wind signal that will be hoisted, while Wind Signal No. 3 remains the reasonable worst-case scenario.
- The enhanced Southwest Monsoon may also bring occasionally gusts reaching strong breeze to near gale strength beginning tonight or tomorrow morning over most of Visayas, the eastern portion of Central Luzon, the eastern and southern portion of Southern Luzon, and the northern portion of Mindanao. The western portion of Luzon may also experience similar conditions beginning on Tuesday or Wednesday.

### **HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS**

- Under the influence of BETTY, a marine gale warning remains in effect over the northern and eastern seaboard of Northern Luzon, eastern seaboard of Central and Southern Luzon, and the eastern seaboard of Visayas and Mindanao. For more information, refer to Gale Warning #3 issued at 5:00 PM today.

### **TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK**

- BETTY will move west northwestward or northwestward for the next 36 hours while gradually decelerating. The typhoon will likely become slow-moving to almost stationary by Tuesday while over the waters east of Batanes. It will then move northward or north northeastward by mid Wednesday towards the sea east of Taiwan.
- This typhoon will likely remain as a typhoon throughout the forecast period, although it is expected to gradually weaken until Tuesday. Afterwards, increasingly unfavorable environment while moving northward or north northeastward on Wednesday or Thursday will result in a faster weakening rate. BETTY may be downgraded to severe tropical storm category on Thursday.

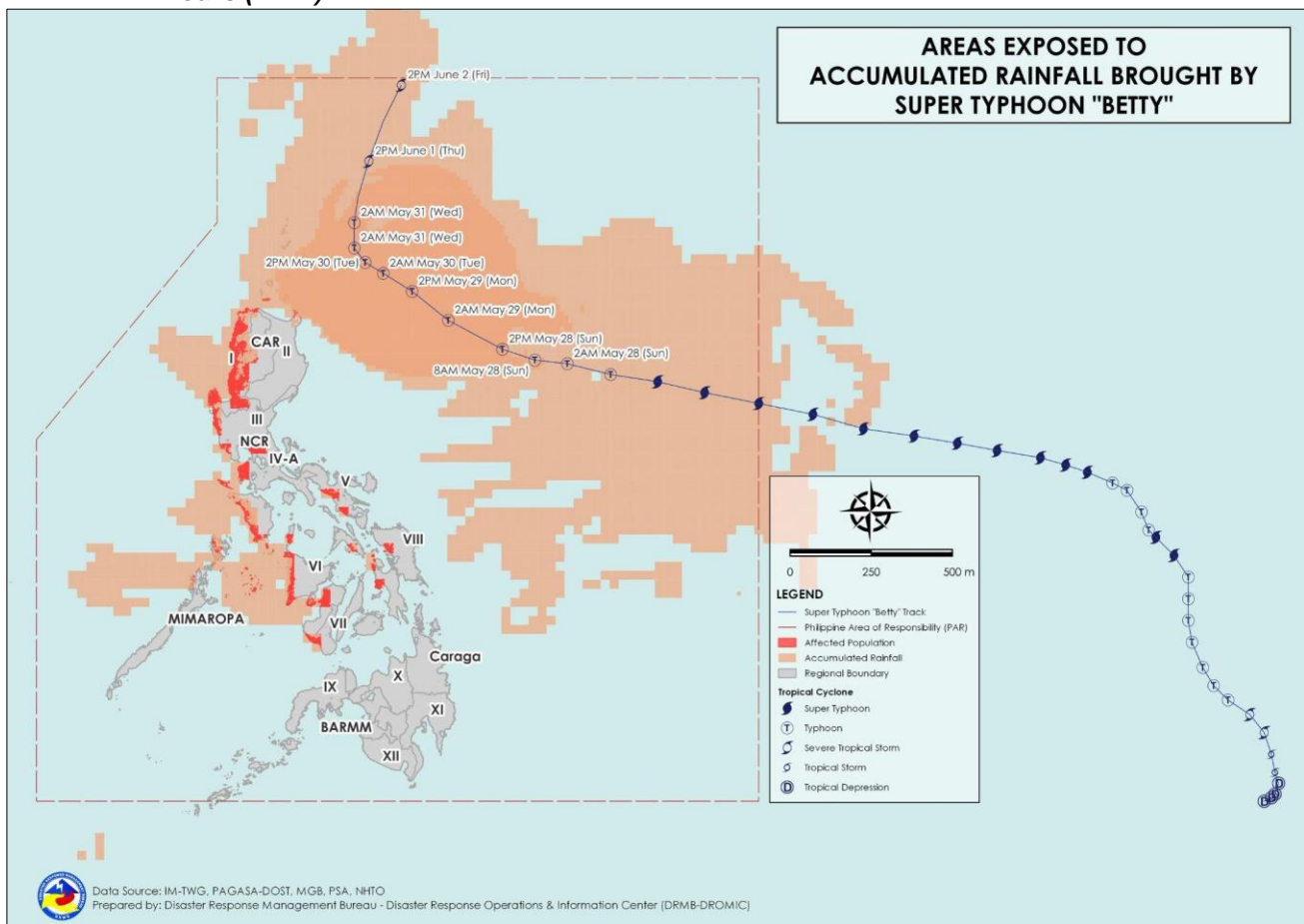
The center of the eye of Typhoon BETTY was estimated based on all available data at 630 km East of Tuguegarao City, Cagayan (17.6°N, 127.7°E) moving West Northwestward at 15 km/h with maximum sustained winds of 165 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 205 km/h.

## Predictive Analytics for Humanitarian Response (PAHR)

Based on the Global Spectral Model (GSM) & Weather Research and Forecasting (WRF) Accumulated Forecast Rainfall initialized on **28 May 2023 at 8AM**, the PAHR results show that 1,099,227 families (PSA) or 127,331 poor families (Listahanan) in Regions I, II, III, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, V, VI, VII, VIII, NCR, and CAR may be affected by STY Betty. Hence, it is important to note that the model based its list of affected areas during the time at which the forecast was initialized.

## Status of Prepositioned Resources: Stockpile and Standby Funds

The DSWD Central Office (CO), Field Offices (FOs), and National Resource Operations Center (NROC) have stockpiles and standby funds amounting to **₱2,042,994,719.71** with breakdown as follows (see Table 1):

### a. Standby Funds

A total of **₱505,032,667.91** standby funds in the CO and FOs. Of the said amount, **₱431,708,985.19** is the available **Quick Response Fund (QRF)** in the CO.

## b. Stockpiles

A total of **892,866 family food packs (FFPs)** amounting to **₱564,017,284.80**, **other food items** amounting to **₱185,422,165.86**, and **non-food items (NFIs)** amounting to **₱788,522,601.14** are available
