

## DSWD DROMIC Report #66 on the Oil Spill Incident in Naujan, Oriental Mindoro as of 05 May 2023, 6PM

### I. Situation Overview

On 01 March 2023, the Philippine Coast Guard (PCG) confirmed oil spillage in the waters of Naujan in Oriental Mindoro after the Motor Tanker (MT) Princess Empress sunk last 28 February 2023.

Reports indicated that the MT Princess Empress was loaded with 800,000 liters of industrial fuel prior to the incident. The vessel experienced engine trouble brought by overheating while in transit from the Province of Bataan to the Province of Iloilo, causing it to drift towards Balingawan Point in Naujan. It then partially sank due to rough sea conditions until it fully submerged on 28 February 2023.

There were twenty (20) crew members onboard including the Master Captain that were eventually rescued.

On 03 March 2023, the PCG confirmed the impact of the oil spill in the Province of Antique particularly in the Municipality of Caluya.

The PCG and the Local Government Unit (LGU) of Batangas City reported sightings of oil sheens and thick patch along Verde Island on 20 March 2023. The same situation was monitored in Tingloy, Batangas on 21 March 2023. Residents of Brgy. San Andres (Isla Verde), Batangas City also reported sightings of tar balls about one (1) kilometer from the shoreline on 25 March 2023.

### II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **40,733 families** or **192,616 persons** are affected in **249 barangays** in **Regions CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, and VI** (see Table 1).

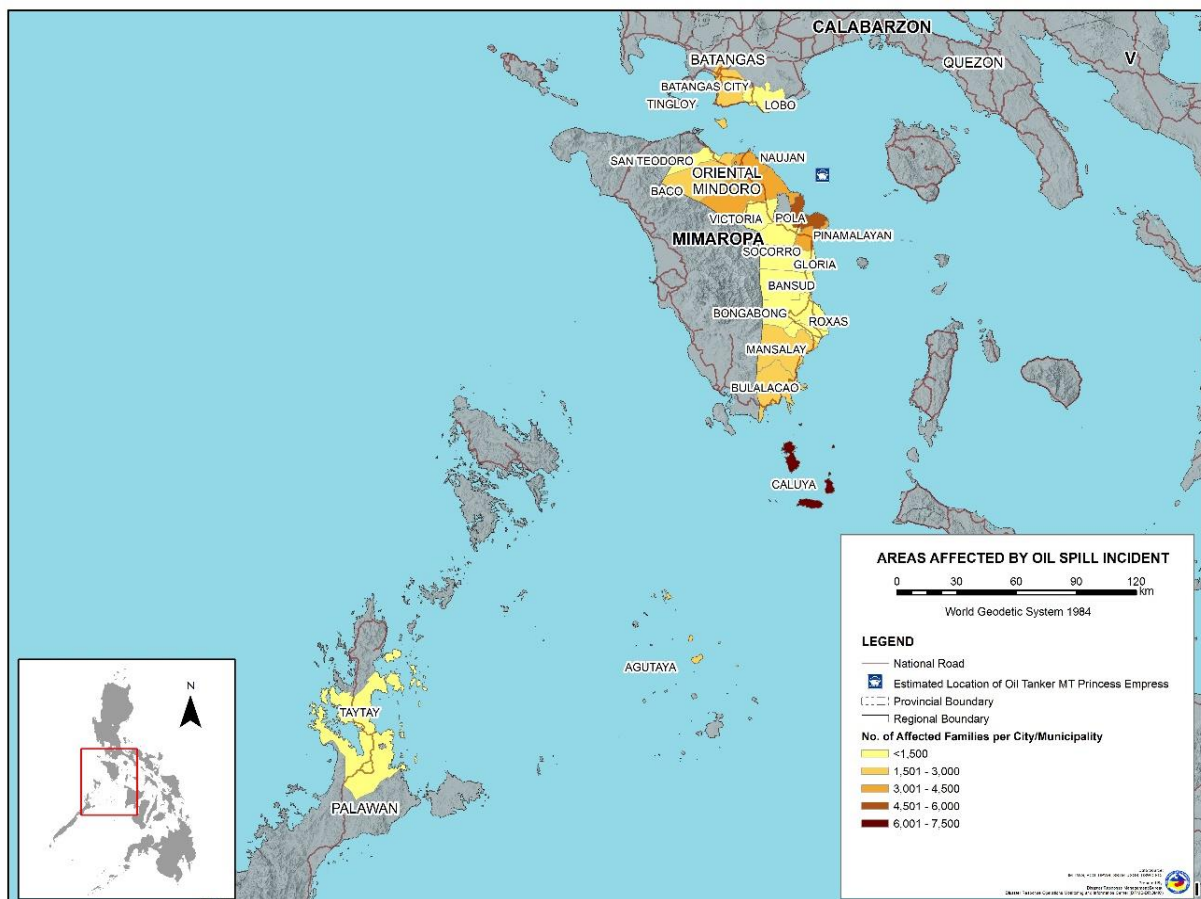

### III. Status of Displaced Population

#### a. Inside Evacuation Center

A total of **10 families** or **40 persons** sought temporary shelter in **one (1) evacuation center** in **Caluya, Antique** (see Table 2). These families and

individuals have returned home upon the release of safety advisory from the concerned authorities.

#### IV. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱156,560,772.77** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, **₱126,505,194.00** from the **DSWD**, **₱1,366,273.00** from the **LGUs**, **₱737,786.00** from **Non-Government Organizations (NGOs)**, and **₱27,951,519.77** from **other Partners** (see Table 3).

#### 1. Standby Funds

- ₱28.48 million Quick Response Fund (QRF) at the DSWD Central Office.
- ₱17.78 million available at DSWD FOs CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, and VI.
- ₱63.48 million available in DSWD FOs which may support the relief needs of the displaced families due to the effects of the oil spill incident through inter-FO augmentation.
