

DSWD DROMIC Report #18 on STY “Betty” (Mawar)

as of 25 August 2023, 6PM

I. Situation Overview

On 27 May 2023 at around 4AM, Super Typhoon (STY) “Mawar” entered the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) and was renamed “Betty”. On the same day at around 10PM, “Betty” weakened into a Typhoon and continued to move over the Philippine Sea.

On 28 May 2023, the extent of Tropical Cyclone winds continues to expand as TY “Betty” further weakened over the Philippine Sea.

On 29 May 2023, TY “Betty” slightly accelerated Northwestward over the waters of Cagayan. Tropical Cyclone Wind Signal (TCWS) No. 2 was raised over Batanes, the eastern portion of Babuyan Islands (Babuyan Is., Camiguin Is., Didicas Is., Pamuktan Is.), and the northeastern portion of mainland Cagayan (Santa Ana) while TCWS No. 1 over the rest of Babuyan Islands, the rest of mainland Cagayan, Isabela, Quirino, the northeastern portion of Nueva Vizcaya (Kasibu, Quezon, Solano, Bagabag, Diadi, Villaverde, Bayombong, Ambaguio), Apayao, Abra, Kalinga, Mountain Province, Ifugao, Ilocos Norte, the northern and central portions of Aurora (Dilasag, Casiguran, Dinalungan, Dipaculao, Baler), Polillo Islands, the northern portion of Catanduanes (Caramoran, Viga, Gigmoto, Panganiban, Bagamanoc, Pandan), the northeastern portion of Camarines Sur (Caramoan, Garchitorena, Lagonoy, Tinambac, Siruma), and the northern portion of Camarines Norte (Vinzons, Paracale, Jose Panganiban, Capalonga, Talisay, Daet, Mercedes, Basud).

On 30 May 2023, TY “Betty” steadily weakened and continued to move slowly over the Sea of East of Batanes.

On 31 May 2023, TY “Betty” continued to move Northward over the Sea East of Taiwan.

On 01 June 2023, “Betty” weakened into a Severe Tropical Storm (STS) and exited PAR in the afternoon.

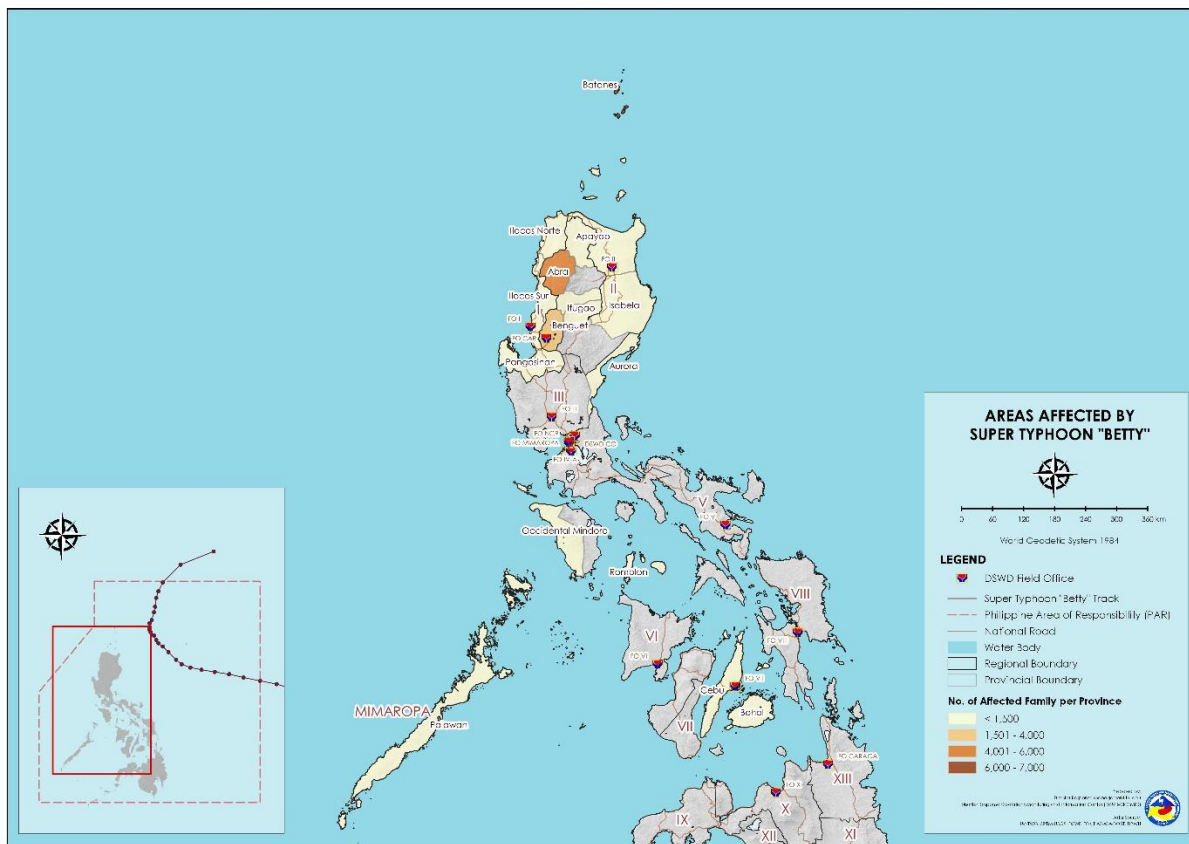
