

## DSWD DROMIC Preparedness for Response Report #3 on Severe Tropical Storm “Egay” as of 23 July 2023, 6PM

### Situation Overview

Issued on 23 July 2023 at 5PM, “Egay” further intensifies while moving West Northwestward

### HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

#### Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Forecast accumulated rainfall today

- 50-100 mm: Catanduanes

Forecast accumulated rainfall tomorrow

- 100-200 mm: Catanduanes
- 50-100 mm: Cagayan, eastern section of Isabela, Polilio Islands, Camarines Norte, Camarines Sur, and Albay

Forecast accumulated rainfall on Tuesday

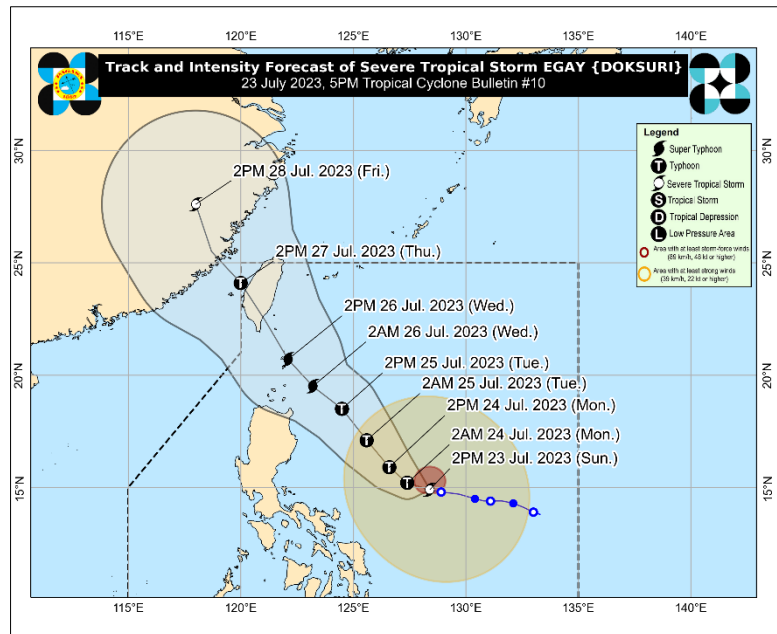
- >200 mm: Batanes, Babuyan Islands, northeastern portion of mainland Cagayan, and the northern portion of Ilocos Norte
- 100-200 mm: Apayao, Abra, the rest of Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur, La Union, and the rest of Cagayan
- 50-100 mm: Pangasinan, Isabela, and the rest of Cordillera Administrative Region

Forecast rainfall are generally higher in elevated or mountainous areas. Under these conditions, flooding and raininduced landslides are possible, especially in areas that are highly or very highly susceptible to these hazard as identified in hazard maps and in localities that experienced considerable amounts of rainfall for the past several days.

In addition, “Egay” may also enhance the Southwest Monsoon, bringing occasional rains over several areas of the country in the next three days. For more information, refer to Weather Advisory #2 for Southwest Monsoon issued at 11:00 AM today and the 24-Hour Public Weather Forecast and Outlook issued at 4:00 PM today.

#### Severe Winds

Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds (i.e., strong breeze to near gale strength) are also possible within any of the areas where Wind Signal No.1 is currently in effect. Current



forecast scenario shows that the highest wind signal that may be hoisted will be Wind Signal No. 3 or 4, potentially over Extreme Northern Luzon. However, should a southward shift in the track occur, higher wind signals may be hoisted.

“Egay” and the enhanced Southwest Monsoon may also bring gusty conditions over the following areas especially in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds:

- Today: MIMAROPA, Visayas, and the northern portions of Zamboanga Peninsula, Northern Mindanao, and Caraga.
- Tomorrow: CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Visayas, Zamboanga Peninsula, and the northern portions of Northern Mindanao and Caraga.
- Tuesday: Most of Luzon and Visayas, the northern portions of Zamboanga Peninsula, and Dinagat islands

## **HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS**

Under the influence of “Egay”, a Gale Warning is in effect over several coastal waters along the eastern seaboard of Southern Luzon, Visayas, and Northeastern Mindanao. Sea travel is risky for small seacrafts. For larger vessels, operating in gale conditions requires experience and properly equipped vessels. Mariners without proper experience or operating ill-equipped vessels are advised to remain in port or seek safe harbor. For more information, refer to Gale Warning #2 issued at 5:00 PM today.

In the next 24 hours, “Egay” may also bring rough seas (2.8 to 3.5 m) over the coastal waters along the eastern seaboard of Luzon, Visayas, and Mindanao that are outside the Gale Warning area. Mariners of small seacrafts are advised to take precautionary measures when venturing over these waters. If inexperienced or operating illequipped vessels, avoid navigating in these conditions.

## **TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK**

- “Egay” is forecast track west northwestward or westward in the next 12 hours. Afterwards, it will turn generally northwestward for the remainder of the forecast period. Although the latest track forecast shows that “Egay” will remain offshore for most of the forecast period, a close approach or landfall in the vicinity of Extreme Northern Luzon is still not ruled out based on the forecast confidence cone. On the track forecast, “Egay” will be closest to Extreme Northern Luzon on Wednesday and make landfall over the east coast of Taiwan on Thursday morning.
- Based on current and forecast behavior of the ridge of high pressure to the north of “Egay”, a “westward shift” in the track forecast remains a possibility.
- “Egay” is forecast to reach typhoon category within 24 hours and may become a super typhoon on Tuesday. Rapid intensification is likely within the next 72 hours due to favorable atmospheric and oceanic conditions. A slight weakening trend may begin on Wednesday and will continue until “Egay” makes landfall over Taiwan. Interaction with the mountainous terrain of Taiwan will result in further weakening – a trend which will continue until the tropical cyclone makes another landfall on mainland China.

The center of Severe Tropical Storm “Egay” was estimated based on all available data at 560 km East of Daet, Camarines Norte (15.0 °N, 128.1 °E) moving West Northwestward at

10 km/h with maximum sustained winds of 110 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 135 km/h.

## Predictive Analytics for Humanitarian Response (PAHR)

Based on the Global Spectral Model (GSM) & Weather Research and Forecasting (WRF) Accumulated Forecast Rainfall initialized on **23 July 2023 at 2 AM**, the PAHR results show that **778,841 families (PSA) and 133,365 poor families (Listahanan) in Regions I, II, III, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, V, VI, VII, VIII, NCR, and CAR** may be affected by Severe Tropical Storm “Egay”.

Figure 1. Areas exposed to Accumulated Forecast Rainfall based on the GSM and WRF model.

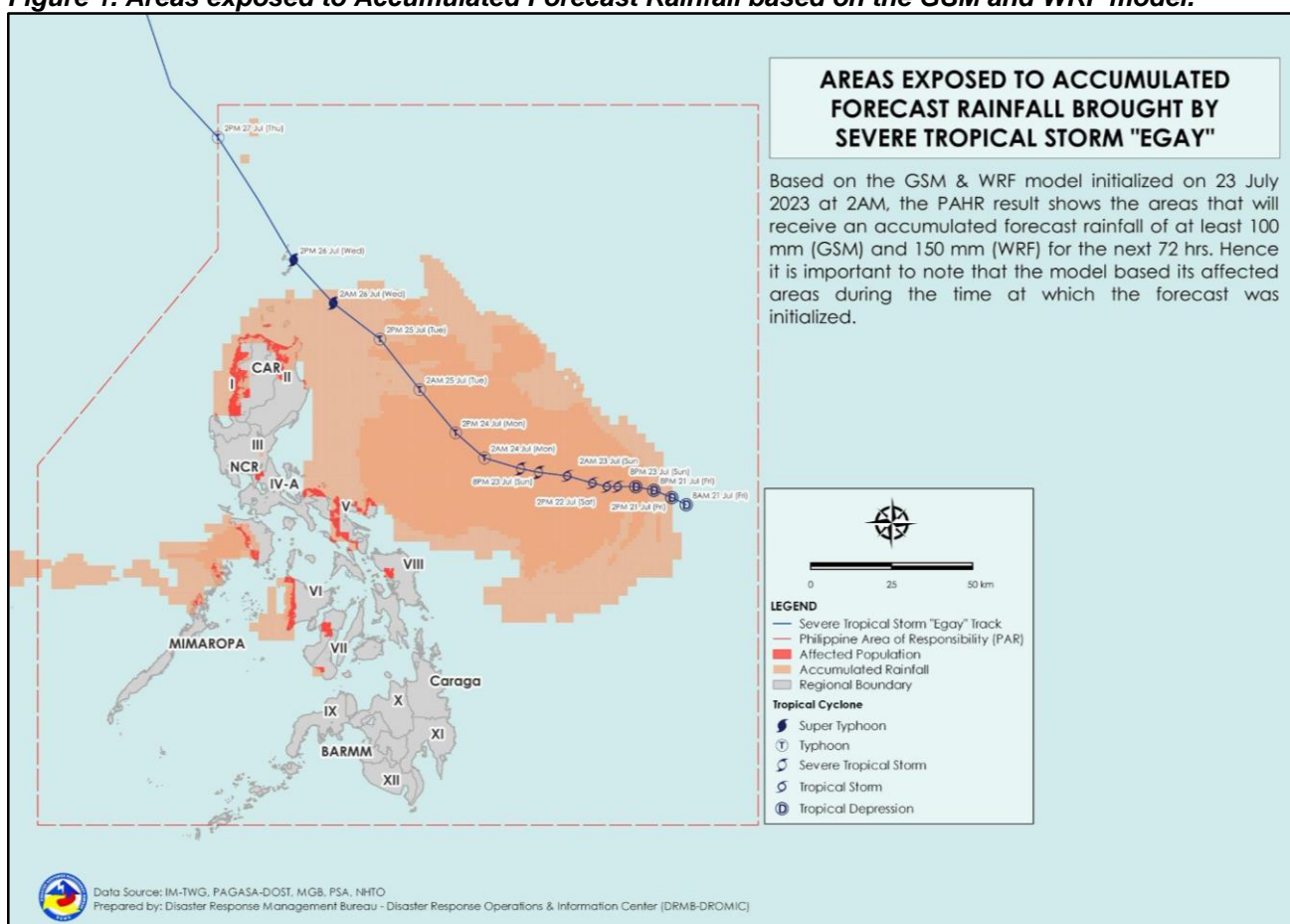

## Status of Prepositioned Resources: Stockpile and Standby Funds

The DSWD Central Office (CO), Field Offices (FOs), and Disaster Response Centers have stockpiles and standby funds amounting to **₱2,054,380,507.96** with breakdown as follows (see Table 2):

### a. Standby Funds

A total of **₱173,986,968.06** standby funds in the CO and FOs. Of the said amount, **₱98,861,092.41** is the available **Quick Response Fund (QRF)** in the CO.

### b. Stockpiles

A total of **1,151,500 family food packs (FFPs)** amounting to **₱757,271,221.55**, **other food items** amounting to **₱263,384,811.83**, and **non-food items (NFIs)** amounting to **₱859,737,506.52** are available.
