I. Situation Overview


Issued on 28 August 2023 at 5PM, "Goring" maintains its strength as it moves northward over the Philippine Sea.

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall

Forecast accumulated rainfall from today to tomorrow afternoon

 50-100 mm: Babuyan Islands, northeastern portion of mainland Cagayan



Forecast accumulated rainfall from tomorrow afternoon to Wednesday afternoon

• 50-100 mm: Batanes, Babuyan Islands, and the northern portions of mainland Cagayan, Apayao, and Ilocos Norte.

Forecast accumulated rainfall for Wednesday afternoon to Thursday evening

- Greater than 200 mm: Batanes
- 100-200 mm: Babuyan Islands
- 50-100 mm: The northern portions of mainland Cagayan, Apayao, and Ilocos Norte

Forecast rainfall are generally higher in elevated or mountainous areas. Under these conditions, flooding and rain-induced landslides are still expected especially in areas that are highly or very highly susceptible to these hazards as identified in hazard maps and in localities that experienced considerable amounts of rainfall for the past several days.

The Southwest Monsoon enhanced by "Goring" will bring occasional or monsoon rains over the western portions of Central Luzon, Southern Luzon, and Visayas over the next three days. For more information, refer to Weather Advisory #8 for Southwest Monsoon issued at 11:00 AM today and 24-Hour Public Weather Forecast and Outlook at 4:00 PM today.





Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.

Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are also possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.

Higher wind signals may still be hoisted over Extreme Northern Luzon and the northern or northeastern portion of mainland Cagayan tomorrow. Hoisting of Wind Signal No. 3 or 4 over the Batanes-Babuyan Islands area is not ruled out.

The enhanced Southwest Monsoon will continue to bring gusty conditions over the following areas not under any Wind Signal, especially in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds:

- Today: Aurora, Bataan, Metro Manila, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, Visayas, Dinagat Islands, Camiguin, and most of Zamboanga Peninsula.
- Tomorrow: Aurora, Bataan, Bulacan, Metro Manila, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, Visayas, Dinagat Islands, Camiguin, and most of Zamboanga Peninsula.
- Wednesday: Aurora, Bataan, Zambales, Pampanga, Bulacan, Metro Manila, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, and most of Visayas.

HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

A Gale Warning is in effect for the northern and eastern seaboards of Northern Luzon, the eastern and western seaboards of Central Luzon, the seaboards of Southern Luzon, seaboards of Visayas, and the northern seaboard of Mindanao. Disruption in civilian maritime activities is expected over these areas (e.g., suspension of sea travel) due to hazardous sea condition. For more information, refer to Gale Warning #9 issued at 5:00 PM today.

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

- "Goring" is forecast to turn generally northward or northwestward in the next 36 hours, then west northwestward on Wednesday afternoon towards the Bashi Channel and the vicinity of Batanes. On the forecast track, the typhoon will make a close approach (a landfall scenario is not ruled out) to Batanes between Wednesday morning and evening and to the southern portion of Taiwan between Wednesday evening and Thursday morning. Afterwards, it will exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) on Thursday morning or afternoon and cross the Taiwan Strait before making landfall over southeastern China on Friday evening or on Saturday early morning.
- "Goring" is forecast to maintain its strength in the next 24 hours, then gradually intensify before passing close to Batanes area. Interaction with the rugged terrain





of Taiwan during its close approach will result to a weakening trend beginning on late Wednesday.

The center of the eye was estimated based on all available data 260 km East of Tuguegarao City, Cagayan (17.6 °N, 124.2 °E) moving Northward at 15 km/h with maximum sustained winds of 155 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 190 km/h.


