



DSWD DROMIC Report #4 on the Effects of Southwest Monsoon and Typhoon "Jenny"

as of 05 October 2023, 6PM

I. Situation Overview

Issued on 05 October 2023 at 5PM, "Jenny" further weakens and is now outside the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR).

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Forecast rainfall are generally higher in elevated or mountainous areas. Under these conditions, flooding and rain-induced landslides are possible especially in areas that are highly or very highly susceptible to these hazards as identified in hazard maps and in localities that experienced considerable amounts of rainfall for the past several days.

In addition, "Jenny" will continue to enhance the Southwest Monsoon and bring light to moderate rains over the western portions of Luzon. For more information, refer to 24-Hour Public Weather Forecast and Outlook at 4PM today.

Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.

- Minor to moderate impacts from gale-force winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 2.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.





The enhancement of the Southwest Monsoon by "Jenny" will bring gusty conditions for the next 3 days over the following areas not under any Wind Signal, especially in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds:

Today: The southern portion of Aurora, Romblon, and portions of CALABARZON, Metro Manila, Bataan, and Bicol Region.

HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

Under the influence of "Jenny", a Gale Warning is in effect for the coastal waters along the northern and western seaboards of Northern Luzon. For more information, refer to Gale Warning No. 9 issued at 5PM today.

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

- Outside the PAR region, "Jenny" will continue to move westward (becoming west southwestward to southwestward by Sunday) slowly over the Taiwan Strait and the coastal waters of southeastern China.
- Once over the Taiwan Strait, additional cool dry air from the north will entrain into JENNY, resulting in continued weakening. "Jenny" may become a tropical depression by late Sunday.

The center of the eye was estimated based on all available data 275 km West Northwest of Itbayat, Batanes (outside PAR) (22.1°N, 119.6°E) moving Westward at 15 km/h maximum sustained winds of 140 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 170 km/h.

05 October 2023	 DRMB closely coordinates with DOST-PAGASA for significant weather updates and other related information relative to TY "Jenny". All DRMB Quick Response Team (QRT) members and emergency equipment are on standby and ready for deployment. The National Resource and Logistics Management Bureau (NRLMB) ensures the replenishment and availability of FNIs for resource augmentation to DSWD FOs as need arises. NRLMB continuously repacks goods for possible augmentation.
30 September 2023	 The Disaster Response Management Bureau (DRMB) attended the Pre-Disaster Risk Assessment (PDRA) Analyst Meeting relative to TY "Jenny". The DRMB closely coordinated with the DSWD FOs for disaster preparedness measures and activities.

03 October 2023	 DSWD FO I closely monitored the track and movement of TY "Jenny" through DOST-PAGASA and closely coordinates with the Regional Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (RDRRMC) 1, Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Councils (PDRRMCs), and Provincial Social Welfare and Development Offices (PSWDOs) for significant updates.
02 October 2023	 DSWD FO I staff in different Provincial Operations Offices (POOs) closely monitored their respective areas of responsibility (AORs) for any eventualities. DSWD FO I ensured the availability of all resources for possible augmentation to affected LGUs. Members of the Incident Management Team (IMT) were on standby for possible activation of the DSWD FO I IMT while other DSWD staff were on standby for possible conduct of disaster response operations. DSWD FO I closely coordinated with NRLMB for the requested FFPs to be delivered to different Regional and satellite Warehouses.

04 October 2023	DSWD FO II through its Disaster Response Management Division (DRMD) continuously coordinated with the Social Welfare and Development Team (SWADT) in the Province of Batanes on the status of affected population and for other concerns needed to be addressed by the FO.
02 October 2023	 DSWD FO II attended the PDRA Meeting convened by the Office of Civil Defense (OCD) Region II. DSWD FO II continuous monitored and disseminated weather updates in coordination with QRTs and Local Social Welfare and Development Offices (LSWDOs). DSWD FO II coordinated with the SWADTs and Municipal Action Teams (MATs) in the Region for any possible augmentation to LGUs.

DSWD FO MIMAROPA, together with other RDRRMC member agencies and LDRRMOs, attended the PDRA Core Group Meeting facilitated by OCD MIMAROPA.
02 October 2023	 DSWD FO MIMAROPA, together with other RDRRMC member agencies and LDRRMOs, attended the PDRA Core Group Meeting facilitated by OCD MIMAROPA. DSWD FO MIMAROPA activated the Regional/Provincial/City/Municipal (R/P/C/M) QRTs to monitor and gather necessary information in their respective areas of responsibility (AOR). DSWD FO MIMAROPA issued a memorandum placing the expanded R/P/C/M QRTs on an on-call status together with the special projects staff on a 24/7 basis for possible activation of the Operations Center to respond in case any untoward incidents and eventualities are reported.
30 September 2023	 The logistical equipment and workforce of DSWD FO MIMAROPA were on standby. DSWD FO MIMAROPA maintained coordination with SWADT Offices and concerned LGUs for the management of stranded passengers in ports and terminals, if any. The Information and Communications Technology Management Section (ICTMS) of DSWD FO MIMAROPA remained on standby to ensure availability of a robust communication system. DSWD FO MIMAROPA closely coordinated with OCD and RDRRMC MIMAROPA to monitor the areas that may be affected by the weather disturbance, establish response mechanisms, and gather other related updates. DSWD FO CAR conducted general cleaning of the Regional Warehouse including quality check of sleeping kits and hygiene kits.
