

DSWD DROMIC Report #5 on the Effects of Southwest Monsoon and Typhoon Jenny as of 17 October 2023, 6PM

I. Situation Overview

On 29 September 2023, the Low Pressure Area (LPA) East of Central Luzon entered the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) and developed into Tropical Depression “Jenny”. On 30 September 2023, “Jenny” became a Tropical Storm. On 01 October 2023, “Jenny” intensified into a Severe Tropical Storm and enhanced the prevailing Southwest Monsoon bringing occasional to monsoon rains in several areas of the country. On 02 October 2023, “Jenny” further intensified into a Typhoon while moving over the Philippine Sea. On 03 October 2023, “Jenny” maintained its strength as it moved North Northwestward over the Philippines. On 04 October 2023, “Jenny” slightly weakened as it commenced its West Northwestward turn towards Southern Taiwan. On 05 October 2023, “Jenny” further weakened and is already outside PAR. On 06 October 2023, “Jenny” continuously weakened and was no longer directly affecting the country.
