

DSWD DROMIC Report #10 on Typhoon “AGHON” as of 29 May 2024, 6AM

I. Situation Overview

Issued on 29 May 2024 at 5AM, “AGHON” has maintained its strength while accelerating northeastward.

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Typhoon “AGHON” is unlikely to directly bring significant amount of rainfall within the next three days.

The Southwesterly Windflow partly influenced by “AGHON” will bring moderate to heavy rains over the western

portions of Northern Luzon, Central Luzon and MIMAROPA until tomorrow. For more information, refer to Weather Advisory No. 5 issued at 11:00 PM yesterday.

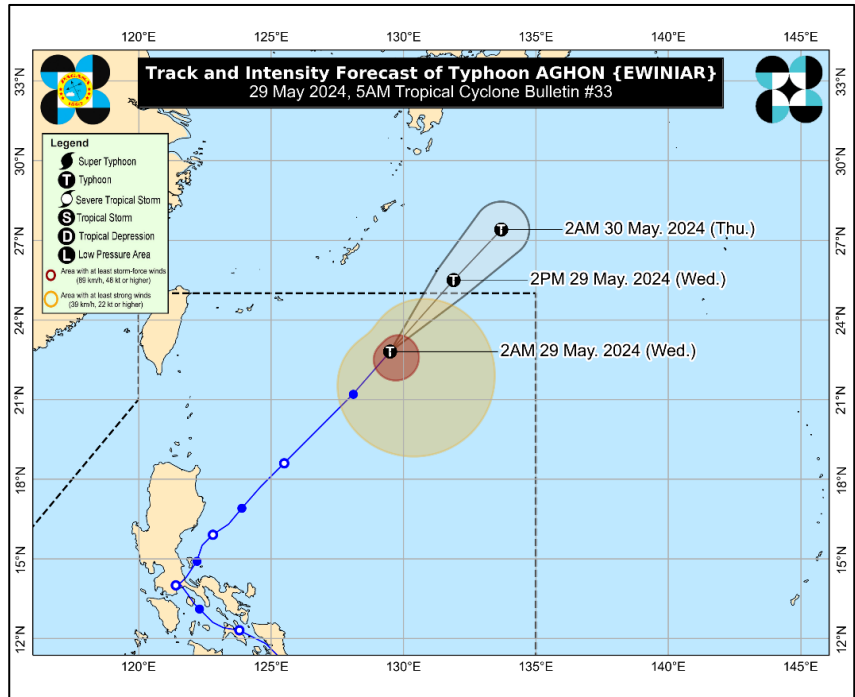
Severe Winds

The Southwesterly Windflow partly influenced by AGHON will bring occasional gusty conditions in the next three days over the following areas, especially in coastal and upland/mountainous localities exposed to winds:

- Today: Batanes, Ilocos Region, Zambales, Bataan, northern Aurora, southern mainland Quezon, Polillo Islands,
- Palawan, Lubang Islands, Romblon, Marinduque, and Camarines Norte
- Tomorrow: Batanes, Ilocos Region, Zambales, Bataan, Lubang Islands, and Kalayaan Islands.
- Friday: Batanes and Ilocos Region

HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

The Southwesterly Windflow partly influenced by AGHON and the Frontal System will bring moderate to rough seas (1.0 to 3.0 m) over the coastal waters of Batanes. Mariners of motorbancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigating in these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.



TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

On the track forecast, Typhoon AGHON will move generally northeastward over the Philippine Sea for the entirety of the forecast period and exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) this morning or afternoon.

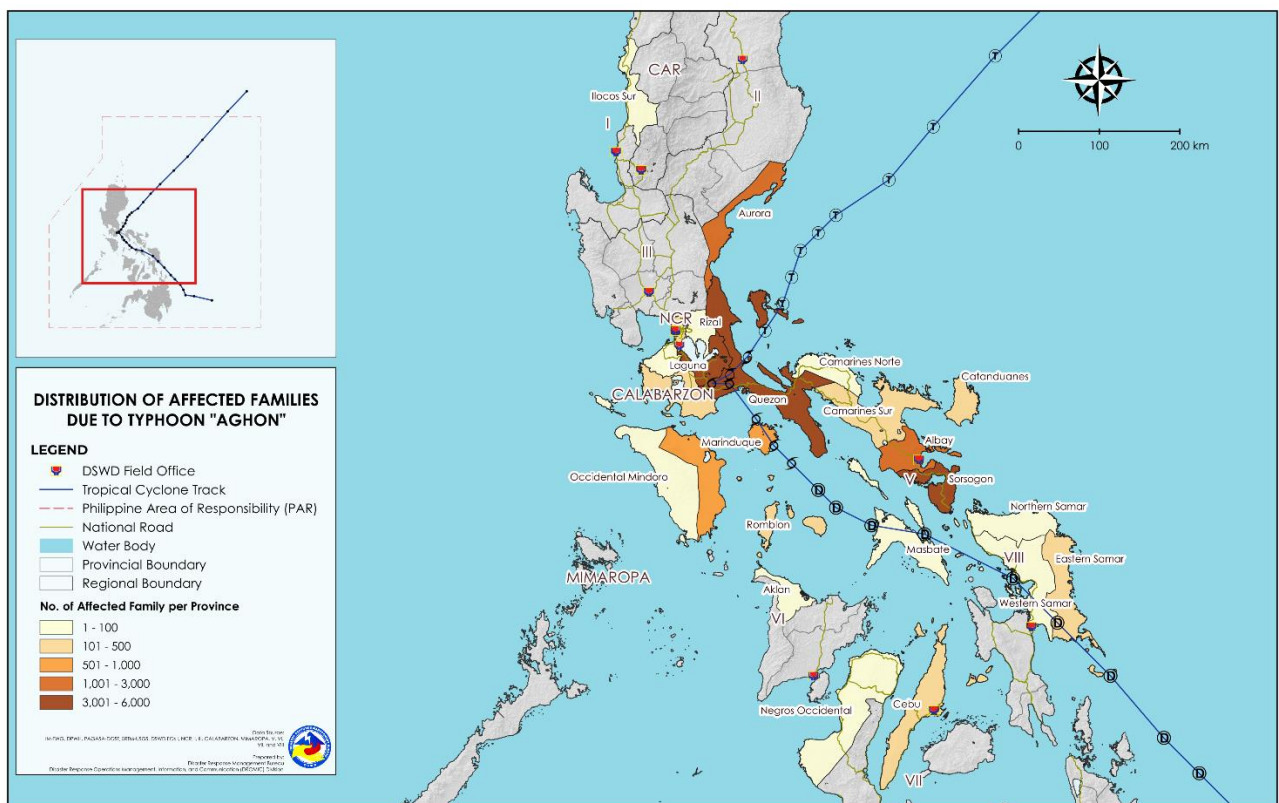
AGHON is forecast to enter a period of weakening by tomorrow as it begins to interact with the mid-latitude environment and undergo post-tropical transition.

The center of the eye was estimated based on all available data 870 km East Northeast of Extreme Northern Luzon (23.3 °N, 129.8 °E) moving Northeastward at 40 km/h with a maximum sustained winds of 130 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 160 km/h.

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **22,770 families** or **70,956 persons** are affected in **566 barangays** in **Regions NCR, I, III, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, V, VI, VII and, VIII** (see Annex A).



III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **1,457 families** or **5,696 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **98 evacuation centers** in **Regions NCR and CALABARZON** (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **2,351 families** or **9,678 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are **3,808 families** or **15,374 persons** displaced in **Regions NCR, CALABARZON, VI, and VIII** (see Annex E).

IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **26 houses** were damaged; of which, **five (5)** are **totally damaged** and **21** are **partially damaged** in **Regions V and VIII** (see Annex F).

V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱4,853,717.60** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, **₱3,619,632.60** from **DSWD**; **₱1,180,945.00** from the **Local Government Units (LGU)** and **₱53,140.00** from **Other Partners** (see Annex G).
