

## DSWD DROMIC Report #14 on Typhoon “AGHON” as of 04 June 2024, 6AM

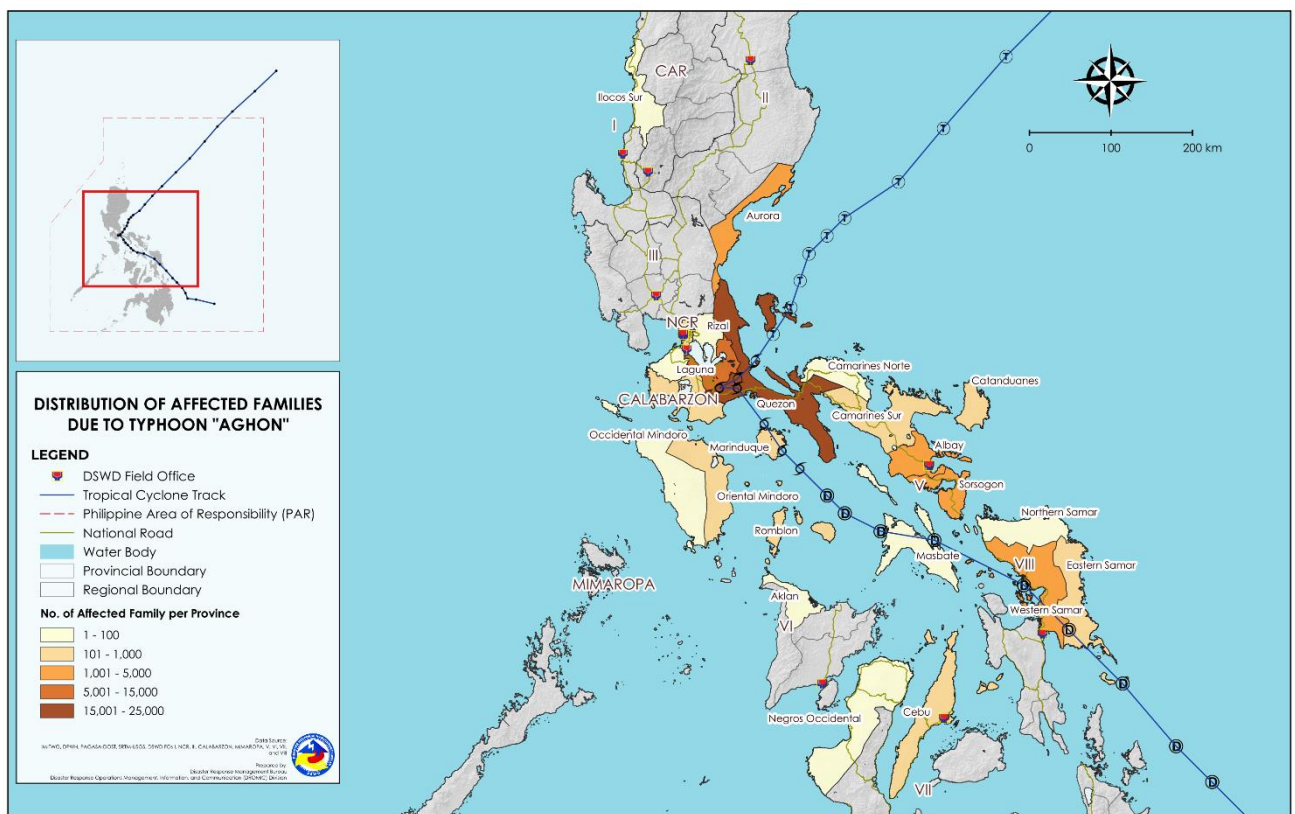
### I. Situation Overview

On 29 May 2024, “AGHON” is already outside the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR).

### II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **51,681 families** or **185,384 persons** are affected in **1,037 barangays** in **Regions NCR, I, III, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, V, VI, VII and, VIII** (see Annex A).



### III. Status of Displaced Population

#### a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **89 families** or **301 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **7 evacuation centers** in **Regions NCR and CALABARZON** (see Annex B).

#### b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **389 families** or **1,424 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

### c. Total Displaced Population

There are **478 families** or **1,725 persons** displaced in **Regions NCR, CALABARZON, VI, and VIII** (see Annex E).

## IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **13,277 houses** were damaged; of which, **1,187** are **totally damaged** and **12,090** are **partially damaged** in **Regions CALABARZON, V, VI, and VIII** (see Annex F).

## V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱16,168,897.90** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families composed of **₱13,634,162.40** from **DSWD**, **₱ 2,459,310.50** from the **Local Government Units (LGU)** and **₱53,140.00** from **Other Partners** (see Annex G).
