Situation Overview


Issued on 26 May 2024 at 5PM, "AGHON" intensifies into Severe Tropical Storm.

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Forecast accumulated rainfall: Today to tomorrow afternoon

- >200mm: Quezon
- 100-200 mm: Aurora, the eastern portion of Bulacan, Rizal, Laguna, Metro Manila, and Camarines Norte.
- 50-100 mm: The eastern portion of Isabela, Nueva Ecija, the rest of Bulacan, the eastern portion of Pampanga, Cavite, Batangas, Oriental Mindoro, Occidental Mindoro, Romblon, Burias Island, the western portion of Camarines Sur, Cuyo Islands, Aklan, and Antique.



Forecast accumulated rainfall: Tomorrow afternoon to Tuesday afternoon

 50-100 mm: The eastern portion of Isabela, the northern portion of Aurora, and Polillo Islands.

Forecast rainfall are generally higher in elevated or mountainous areas. Under these conditions, flooding and rain-induced landslides are likely especially in areas that are highly or very highly susceptible to these hazards as identified in hazard maps and in localities that experienced considerable amounts of rainfall for the past several days.

Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.







- Moderate to significant impacts from storm-force winds are possible within any of the areas where Wind Signal No. 3 is hoisted.
- Minor to moderate impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the localities where Wind Signal No. 2 is hoisted.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.
- Additional areas in Cagayan Valley and Central Luzon may be placed under Wind Signal No.1 in the next bulletin. Hoisting of Wind Signal No. 3 over the eastern section of Aurora is not ruled out.

Coastal Inundation

• Within the next 24 hours, there is a minimal to moderate risk of storm surge over the exposed and low-lying coastal areas of Cagayan, Isabela, Central Luzon, Metro Manila, CALABARZON, Mindoro Provinces, Marinduque, Romblon, Camarines Norte, Camarines Sur, and Burias Island. For more information, refer to Storm Surge Warning No. 2 issued at 2:00 PM today.

HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

Under the influence of AGHON, a Gale Warning is hoisted over the coastal waters of Aurora, Quezon, and Marinduque, and the southern coastal waters of Batangas, and the northern coastal waters of Camarines Norte. Sea travel is risky for small seacrafts, including all motorbancas of any type of tonnage. For more information, refer to Gale Warning No. 3 issued at 5:00 PM today.

Outside the Gale Warning areas, AGHON will bring moderate to rough seas (1.5 to 3.5 m) over the coastal waters along the northern and eastern seaboards of Luzon and the seaboard of Bicol Region. Mariners of motor bancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigating in these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

- AGHON will continue to move northeastward towards Polillo Islands. The possibility of intensifying into a typhoon while over the sea east of Quezon is not ruled out.
- From tomorrow through the remainder of the forecast period, AGHON will gradually accelerate northeastward while intensifying. AGHON is forecast to reach Typhoon category by tomorrow afternoon and may exit the PAR region on Wednesday.


The center of Severe Tropical Storm AGHON was estimated based on all available data including those from Tagaytay and Daet Doppler Weather Radars over the coastal waters of Mauban, Quezon (14.4 °N, 121.8 °E) while moving northeastward slowly with maximum sustained winds of 95 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 130 km/h.

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **8,902 families** or **15,828 persons** are affected in **94 barangays** in **Regions CALABARZON**, **MIMAROPA**, **V**, **VI**, **VII** and **VIII** (see Annex A).

III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are 1,048 families or 2,371 persons currently taking temporary shelter in 54 evacuation centers in Regions CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, V and VII (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **849 families** or **3,325 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are 1,897 families or 5,696 persons displaced in Regions CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, V, VII, and VIII (see Annex E).

IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **21 houses** were damaged; of which, **four (4)** are **totally damaged** and **17** are **partially damaged** in **Region VIII** (see Annex F).







V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of \$\mathbb{P}1,724,062.50\$ worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, \$\mathbb{P}1,245,062.50\$ from DSWD and \$\mathbb{P}479,000.00\$ from the Local Government Unit (LGU) (see Annex G).
