as of 27 May 2024, 6AM

#### I. Situation Overview

Issued on 27 May 2024 at 5AM, "AGHON" slightly intensifies over the Philippine Sea East of Aurora.


# HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

#### Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Forecast accumulated rainfall: Today

 50-100 mm: The eastern portion of Isabela and the northern portion of Aurora

Forecast rainfall are generally higher in elevated or mountainous areas. Under these conditions, flooding



and rain induced landslides are possible especially in areas that are highly or very highly susceptible to these hazards as identified in hazard maps and in localities that experienced considerable amounts of rainfall for the past several days

#### Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.

- Minor to moderate impacts from gale-force winds are possible within any of the localities where Wind Signal No. 2 is hoisted.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1

#### Coastal Inundation

Within the next 24 hours, there is a minimal to moderate risk of storm surge over the exposed and low-lying coastal areas of Cagayan, Isabela, Aurora, and Polillo Islands. For more information, refer to Storm Surge Warning No. 4 issued at 2:00 AM today.







#### HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

Under the influence of Typhoon "AGHON", a Gale Warning is hoisted over the coastal waters of Cagayan (southern portion), Isabela, Aurora, and the northern coastal waters of Quezon including Polillo Islands. Sea travel is risky for small seacrafts, including all motor bancas of any type of tonnage. For more information, refer to Gale Warning No. 4 issued at 5:00 AM today.

Outside the Gale Warning areas, Typhoon "AGHON" will bring moderate to rough seas (1.5 to 3.0 m) over the eastern coastal waters of Cagayan and the northern coastal waters of Bicol Region. Mariners of motor bancas and similarly sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigating in these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.

#### TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

On the track forecast, Typhoon "AGHON" will move generally northeastward over the Philippine Sea for the entirety of the forecast period. It may exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) on Wednesday afternoon or evening as a typhoon.

Typhoon "AGHON" will continue to intensify over the next two days as it moves northeastward over the Philippine Sea. A weakening trend may begin on mid or late Wednesday as the typhoon begins interacting with the mid-latitude environment and undergo post-tropical transition.

The center of the eye of Typhoon "AGHON" was estimated based on all available data including those from Baler, Tagaytay, and Daet Doppler Weather Radars at 105 km East of Baler, Aurora (15.6°N, 122.6°E) moving North Northeastward at 10 km/h with a maximum sustained winds of 140 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 170 km/h








## II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of 12,043 families or 26,726 persons are affected in 240 barangays in Regions CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, V, VI, VII and VIII (see Annex A).



## III. Status of Displaced Population

#### a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are 2,517 families or 8,839 persons currently taking temporary shelter in 165 evacuation centers in Regions CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, and V (see Annex B).

#### b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are 1,370 families or 5,391 persons temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

### c. Total Displaced Population

There are 3,887 families or 14,230 persons displaced in Regions CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, V, and VIII (see Annex E).

## IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **22 houses** were damaged; of which, **four (4)** are **totally damaged** and **18** are **partially damaged** in **Region VIII** (see Annex F).







## V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of \$\mathbb{P}1,901,892.50\$ worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, \$\mathbb{P}1,354,302.50\$ from DSWD; \$\mathbb{P}510,590.00\$ from the Local Government Units (LGU) and \$\mathbb{P}37,000.00\$ from Other Partners (see Annex G).
