

DSWD DROMIC Report #9 on Typhoon “AGHON” as of 28 May 2024, 6PM

I. Situation Overview

Issued on 28 May 2024 at 5PM, “AGHON” continues to accelerate northeastward over the Philippine Sea.

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Typhoon AGHON is unlikely to directly bring significant amount of rainfall within the next three days.

The Southwesterly Windflow will bring moderate to heavy rains over Western Visayas and the western section of Luzon in the next three days.

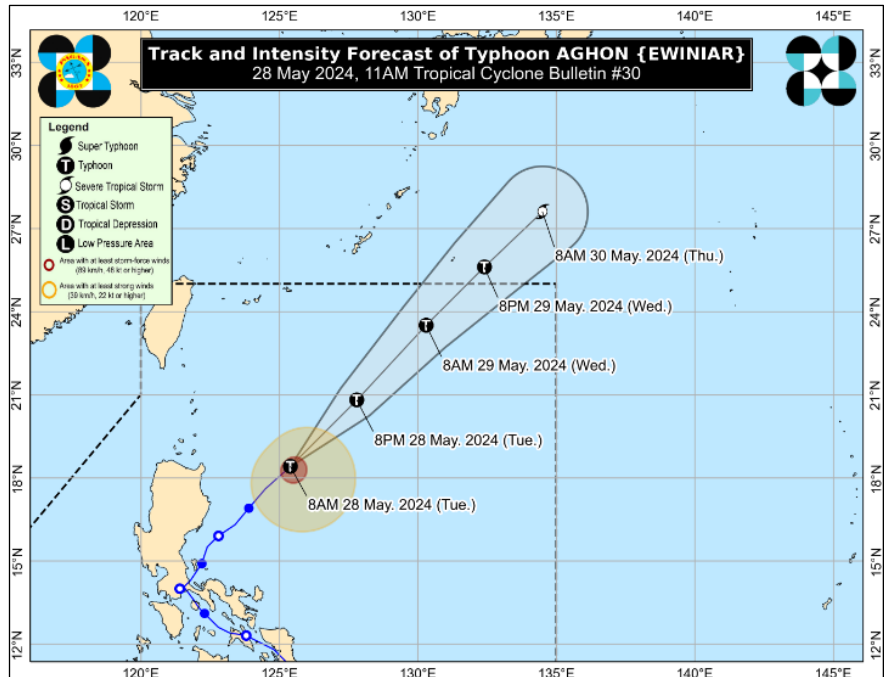
Severe Winds

With the lifting of all hoisted wind signals, possible impacts from severe winds of AGHON within the forecast period are becoming unlikely. However, the southwesterly windflow partially influenced by AGHON will bring occasional gusty conditions for the next 24 hours over the following, especially in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds:

Today: Batanes, Cagayan, Isabela, Ilocos Region, Central Luzon, Metro Manila, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, and Aklan, and Antique

HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

All Gale Warning for coastal waters have been lifted. However, AGHON will bring moderate to rough seas (1.0 to 3.5 m) over the coastal waters of Cagayan (eastern coast), Isabela, northern Aurora and the northern coastal waters of Polillo Islands, Camarines Norte, Camarines Sur, and Catanduanes. Mariners of motorbancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigating in these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.



TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

On the track forecast, Typhoon AGHON will move generally northeastward over the Philippine Sea for the entirety of the forecast period and exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) by tomorrow afternoon.

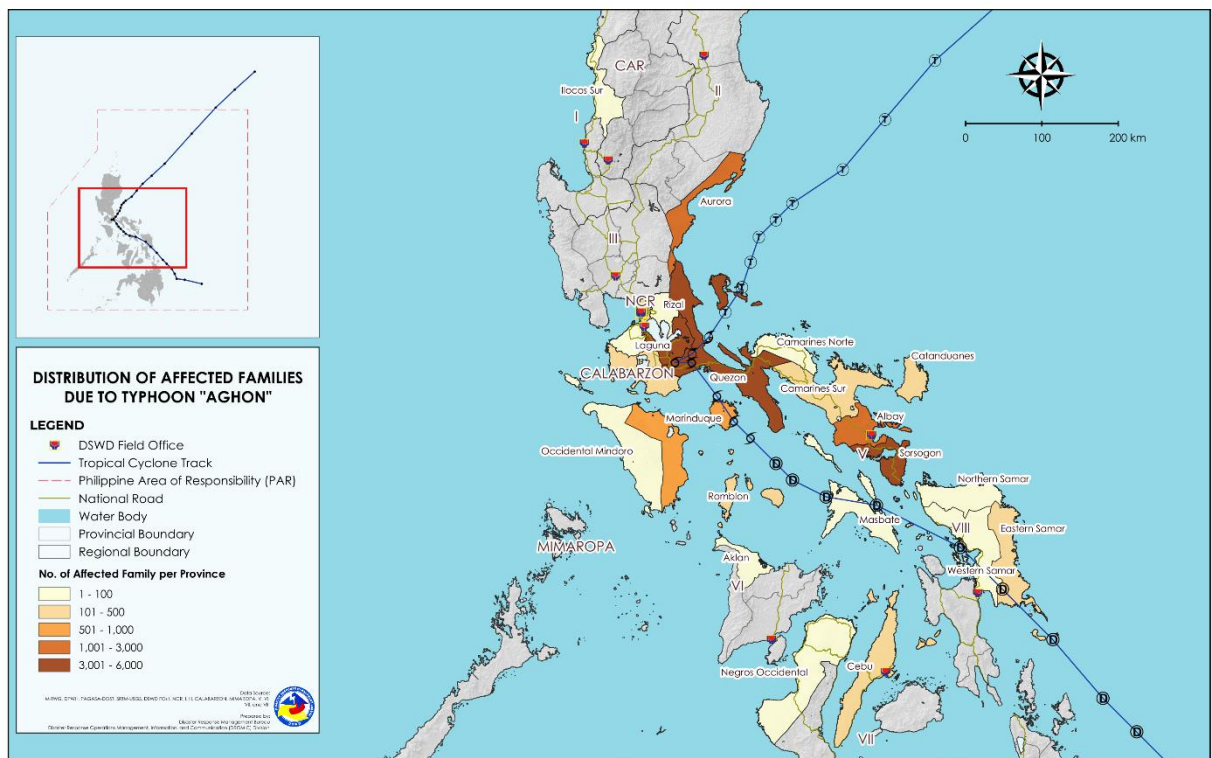
AGHON will likely maintain its strength until tomorrow although a short period of intensification may be possible in the next 12 hours. AGHON will start entering a period of weakening by tomorrow as it begins to interact with the mid-latitude environment and undergo post-tropical transition. However, an earlier weakening trend is not ruled out.

The center of the eye was estimated based on all available data 535 km East of Basco, Batanes (20.1 °N, 127.1 °E) moving Northeastward at 30 km/h with a maximum sustained winds of 130 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 160 km/h.

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **20,467 families** or **62,508 persons** are affected in **487 barangays** in **Regions NCR, I, III, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, V, VI, VII and, VIII** (see Annex A).



III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **4,686 families** or **18,126 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **254 evacuation centers** in **Regions NCR and CALABARZON** (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **2,695 families** or **11,156 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are **7,381 families** or **29,282 persons** displaced in **Regions NCR, CALABARZON, VI, and VIII** (see Annex E).

IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **26 houses** were damaged; of which, **five (5)** are **totally damaged** and **21** are **partially damaged** in **Regions V and VIII** (see Annex F).

V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱4,624,617.60** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, **₱3,619,632.60** from **DSWD**; **₱955,985.00** from the **Local Government Units (LGU)** and **₱49,000.00** from **Other Partners** (see Annex G).
