

# DSWD DROMIC Report #5 on Tropical Depression “Butchoy” as of 21 July 2024, 6AM

## I. Situation Overview

Issued on 20 July 2024 at 11:00 AM, Tropical Depression (TD) “Butchoy” is now outside the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR).

### HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

#### Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Butchoy is unlikely to directly affect the country within the next three days. However, the Southwest Monsoon that it will enhance alongside TD “Carina” will bring moderate to heavy rains over the western portion of Luzon over the next three days.

#### Severe Winds

The Southwest Monsoon that will be enhanced by TD “Butchoy” and TD “Carina” will bring gusty conditions over the following areas (especially in coastal and upland areas exposed to winds):

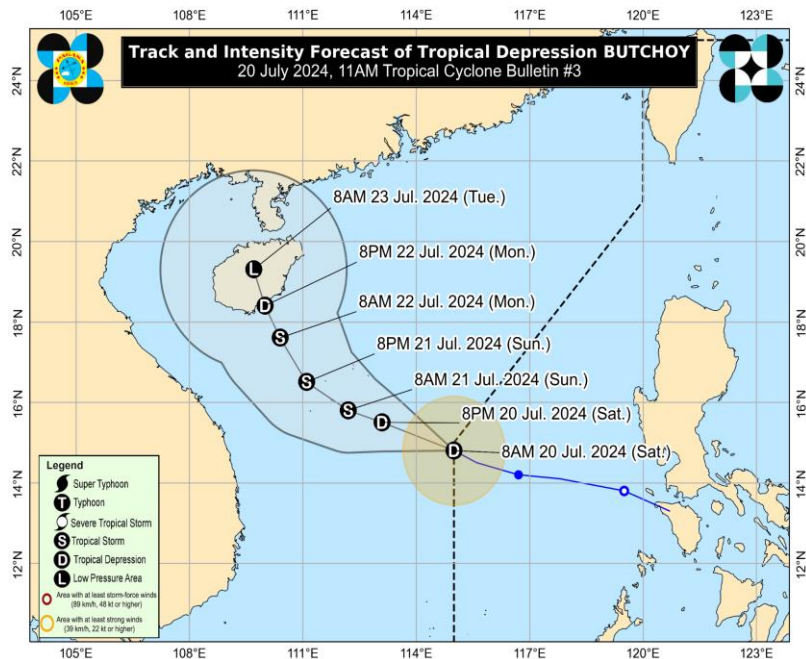
- Today and tomorrow (21 July): Kalayaan Islands; and
- Monday (22 July): CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, Western Visayas, Zambales, Bataan, and Metro Manila.

### HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

In the next 24 hours, the Southwest Monsoon enhanced by BUTCHOY will bring slight to moderate seas (0.5-2.0 m) over the coastal waters of Ilocos Region, Zambales, Bataan, Occidental Mindoro, and the northern portion of Palawan including Calamian (west coast) and Kalayaan Islands. Mariners of motor bancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea.

### TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

On the forecast track, BUTCHOY will move generally west northwestward today until tomorrow before turning more north northwestward beginning Monday (22 July).



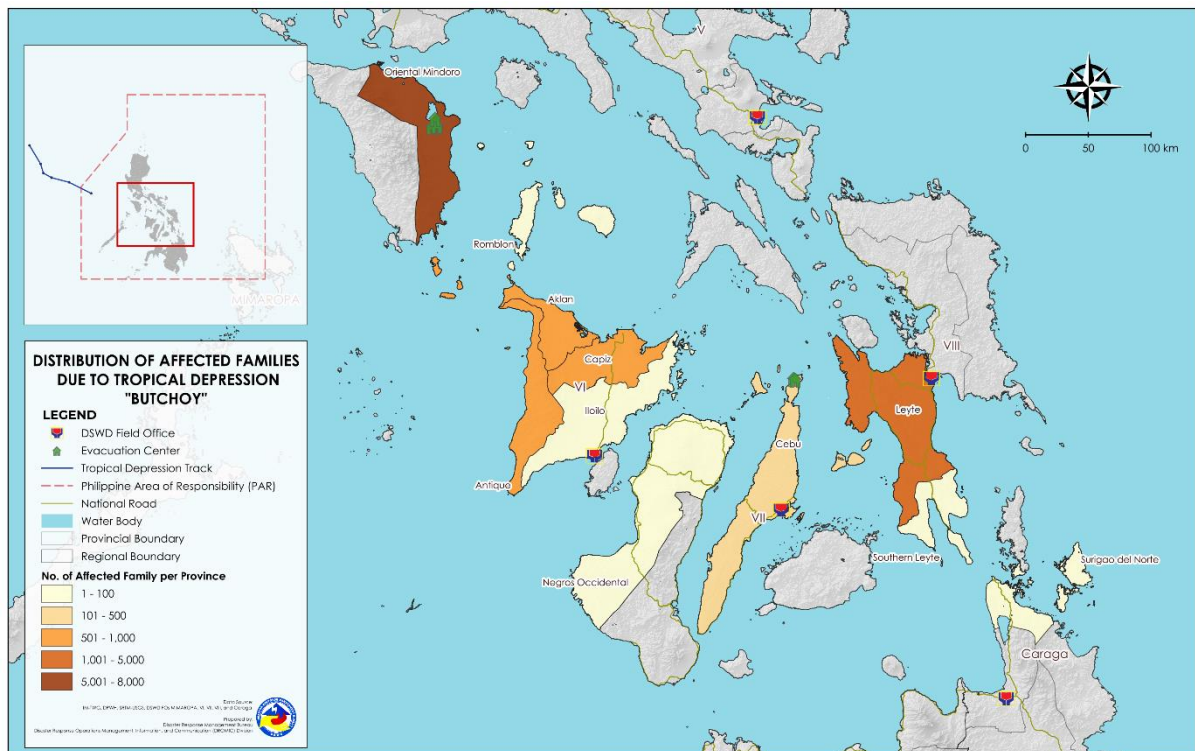
BUTCHOY will likely have limited intensification within the next two days, but is forecast to reach tropical storm category by tomorrow. Rapid weakening is possible after its landfall over Hainan, China on Monday evening (22 July).

The center of the eye of TD was estimated based on all available data 565 km West of Iba, Zambales (OUTSIDE PAR) (15.1 °N, 114.7 °E) while moving West Northwestward at 10 km/h with maximum sustained winds of 55 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 70 km/h.

## II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **17,236 families** or **68,248 persons** are affected in **119 barangays** in Regions **MIMAROPA**, **VI**, **VII**, **VIII** and **Caraga** (see Annex A).



## III. Status of Displaced Population

### a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **268 families** or **1,273 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **seven (7) evacuation centers** in Regions **MIMAROPA** and **VII** (see Annex B).

### b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **174 families** or **660 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex C).

### c. Total Displaced Population

There are **442 families** or **1,933 persons** displaced in **Regions MIMAROPA and VII** (see Annex D).

## IV. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱3,307,423.91** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, **₱3,068,490.16** from **DSWD** and **₱238,933.75** from the **Local Government Units (LGUs)** (see Annex E).
