

## DSWD DROMIC Report #3 on the Effects of Tropical Storm “Enteng” and Southwest Monsoon as of 02 September 2024, 6PM

### I. Situation Overview

Issued on 02 September 2024 at 5:00 PM, “Enteng” enters Quirino Province after making landfall in Casiguran, Aurora.

#### HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

##### Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Forecast accumulated rainfall: Today to tomorrow (3 September) afternoon

- 100-200 mm: Ilocos Region, Nueva Vizcaya, Quirino, Isabela, Apayao, Abra, Benguet, and the northern and central portions of Aurora.
- 50-100 mm: Zambales, Bataan, Nueva Ecija, Bulacan, Rizal, Metro Manila, and the rest of Cagayan Valley, and Cordillera Administrative Region.

Forecast accumulated rainfall: Tomorrow afternoon to Wednesday (4 September) afternoon

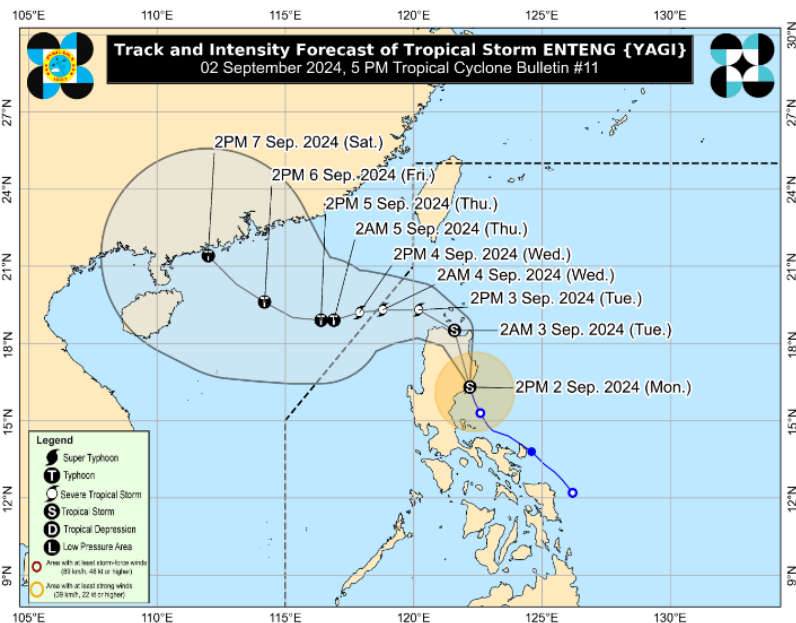
- 100-200 mm: Ilocos Sur and Abra
- 50-100 mm: The rest of Ilocos Region, and Benguet.

Forecast rainfall are generally higher in elevated or mountainous areas. Under these conditions, flooding and rain-induced landslides are expected especially in areas that are highly or very highly susceptible to these hazards as identified in official hazard maps and in localities that experienced considerable amounts of rainfall for the past several days.

Furthermore, the enhanced Southwest Monsoon will bring moderate to intense rainfall in other areas of Luzon and Visayas (especially along the western portions) over the next three days.

#### Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and



upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.

- Minor to moderate impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the localities where Wind Signal No. 2 is hoisted.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.

The highest possible Wind Signal that may be hoisted during the passage of “Enteng” is Wind Signal No. 3. The enhanced Southwest Monsoon will also bring strong to gale-force gusts over the following areas (especially in coastal and upland areas exposed to winds):

- Today: Ilocos Region, Aurora, Zambales, Bataan, Bulacan, Metro Manila, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, and Visayas
- Tomorrow (3 September): Ilocos Region, Nueva Vizcaya, Quirino, Zambales, Bataan, Aurora, Bulacan, Metro Manila, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, Western Visayas, Negros Island Region, Northern Samar.
- Wednesday (4 September): Ilocos Region, Abra, Benguet, Zambales, Bataan, Bulacan, Aurora, Metro Manila, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, Western Visayas, Negros Occidenta, Northern Samar.

### **Coastal Inundation**

A minimal to moderate risk of storm surge may occur in the next 48 hours in the low-lying or exposed coastal localities of Batanes, Cagayan, Isabela, Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur, and Aurora. For more information, refer to Storm Surge Warning No. 2 issued at 2:00 PM today. Refer to official hazard maps for specific areas susceptible to storm surge inundation in these provinces.

### **HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS**

In the next 24 hours, “Enteng” and the enhanced Southwest Monsoon will bring the following conditions over the coastal waters of the country:

- Gale Warning is in effect over the northern and eastern seaboard of Luzon. Sea travel is risky for small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas.
- Moderate to rough seas over the western seaboard of Northern and Central Luzon (1.5 to 3.0 m), the western seaboard of Southern Luzon, the eastern and southern seaboard of Southern Luzon outside Gale Warning areas, and western seaboard of Visayas (1.5 to 2.5 m). Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.
- Slight to moderate seas are expected over the eastern seaboard of Visayas and Mindanao (1.0 to 2.0 m). Mariners of motorbancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigation under these conditions.

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## TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

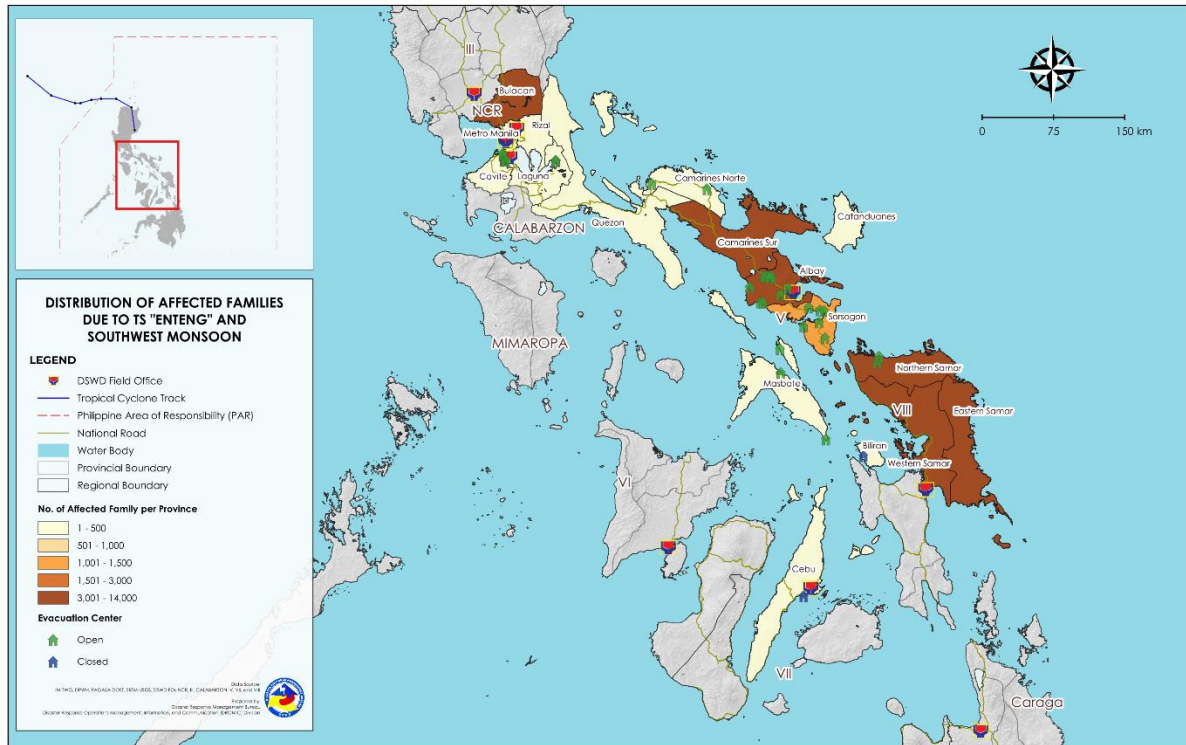
- “Enteng” is forecast to continue moving north northwestward or northward over Cagayan Valley or northern Cordillera Administrative Region before turning west northwestward over the Babuyan Channel by tomorrow (3 September) morning. From tomorrow afternoon to Thursday, ENTENG will move generally westward over the West Philippine Sea. On the track forecast, this tropical cyclone may exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility on Wednesday (4 September) morning or afternoon.
- “Enteng” is forecast to maintain tropical storm category during its traverse of mainland Northern Luzon. Further intensification is forecast to occur from tomorrow afternoon onwards, with “Enteng” becoming a severe tropical storm by tomorrow afternoon or evening (at the earliest), and typhoon category by Thursday.

The center of the eye was estimated based on all available data in the vicinity of Maddela, Quirino (16.4 °N, 121.9 °E ) while moving North Northwestward at 20 km/h with Maximum sustained winds of 85 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 105 km/h.

## II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **48,448 families** or **183,582 persons** are affected in **446 barangays** in **Regions NCR, III, CALABARZON, V, VII, and VIII** (see Annex A).



## III. Status of Displaced Population

### a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **2,930 families** or **12,110 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **169 evacuation centers** in **Regions NCR, III, CALABARZON, V, VII, and VIII** (see Annex B).

### b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **5,744 families** or **23,197 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

### c. Total Displaced Population

There are **8,674 families** or **35,307 persons** displaced in **Regions NCR, III, CALABARZON, V, VII, and VIII** (see Annex E).

## IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **38 houses** were damaged; of which, **19** are **totally damaged** and **19** is **partially damaged** in **Region VII** (see Annex F).

## V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱10,038,972.06** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families composed of **₱9,406,551.06** from **DSWD** and **₱632,421.00** from the **Local Government Units (LGUs)** (see Annex G).
