



# DSWD DROMIC Report #3 on the Effects of Typhoon "JULIAN"

as of 30 September 2024, 6PM


## I. Situation Overview

Issued on 30 September 2024 at 5PM, "JULIAN" is now moving away from Batanes towards the Northwestern boundary of the Philippine Area of Responsibility.

## HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

#### Severe Winds

The peak of devastating typhoon-force winds will be felt over areas under Wind Signal No. 4 this afternoon until evening. The wind signals warn the public of the



general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are weaker in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.:

- Significant to severe impacts from typhoon-force winds are possible within any of the localities where Wind Signal No. 4 is hoisted.
- Moderate to significant impacts from storm-force winds are possible within any of the localities where Wind Signal No. 3 is hoisted.
- Minor to moderate impacts from gale-force winds are possible within any of the localities where Wind Signal No. 2 is hoisted.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.

Furthermore, the wind flow coming towards the circulation of JULIAN may also bring strong to gale-force gusts over the following areas (especially in coastal and upland areas exposed to winds):

- Today (30 September): Aurora, Zambales, Bataan, Metro Manila, CALABARZON, Romblon, and Bicol Region
- Tomorrow (1 October): Ilocos Region, Cordillera Administrative Region, northern and eastern portions of mainland Cagayan, the eastern portion of Isabela, Aurora, Zambales, Bataan, Metro Manila, CALABARZON, Romblon, Camarines Norte, Camarines Sur, and Catanduanes
- Wednesday (2 October): Batanes, Babuyan Islands, Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur, Apayao, and Abra





### **Coastal Inundation**

There is a moderate to high risk of life-threatening storm surge in the next 48 hours over the low-lying or exposed coastal localities of Batanes, Cagayan, and Ilocos Norte. For more information, refer to Storm Surge Warning No. 5 issued at 2:00 PM today.


## HAZARD AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

A Gale Warning is hoisted over the seaboards of Northern Luzon.

## TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

JULIAN is forecast to move generally westward to northwestward while decelerating over the Bashi Channel today and will begin recurving tomorrow (1 October) while moving slowly, then turn generally northeastward on Wednesday (2 October) towards the southwestern coast of Taiwan, where it is forecast to make landfall on Wednesday. JULIAN may briefly leave the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) during this period but bulletins are expected to continue. The typhoon will then cross the rugged terrain of Taiwan and emerge over the waters east of Taiwan by Wednesday evening or Thursday (3 October) early morning. Afterwards, the typhoon will gradually accelerate northeastward towards the East China Sea and exit the PAR region on Thursday.

JULIAN will continue intensifying and may reach super typhoon category this afternoon or evening. Interaction with the rugged terrain of Taiwan will trigger a weakening trend prior to landfall.

# **II.** Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **11,793 families** or **39,643 persons** are affected in **131 barangays** in **Regions I, II** and **CAR** (see Annex A).

## III. Status of Displaced Population

### a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **192 families** or **538 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **30** evacuation centers in Regions I, II and CAR (see Annex B).

#### b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **310 families** or **970 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

### c. Total Displaced Population

There are **502 families** or **1,508 persons** displaced in **Regions I, II** and **CAR** (see Annex E).

#### d. Damaged Houses

A total of two (2) houses were damaged; of which, one (1) is totally damaged and one (1) is partially damaged in in Region CAR (see Annex F).

### e. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of ₱163,377.22 worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, ₱141,670.40 from DSWD, ₱21,706.82 from the Local Government Units (LGUs) (see Annex G).
