

DSWD DROMIC Report #4 on the Effects of Super Typhoon “JULIAN” as of 01 October 2024, 6AM

I. Situation Overview

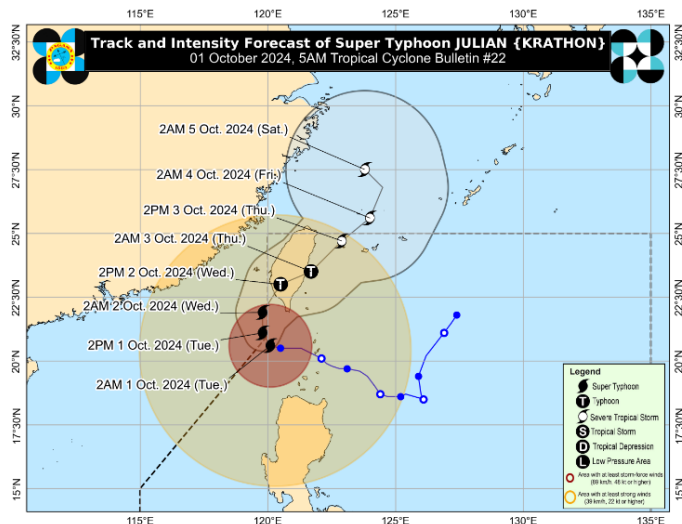
Issued on 01 October 2024 at 5AM, “JULIAN” intensifies into a super typhoon and is now moving slowly.

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Forecast accumulated rainfall:
Today

- >200 mm: Batanes, Babuyan Islands, and Ilocos Norte.
- 100 – 200 mm: Apayao, Abra, and Ilocos Sur
- 50 – 100 mm: Mainland Cagayan, the rest of Ilocos Region and the rest of Cordillera Administrative Region.



Under these conditions, flooding and rain-induced landslides are likely, especially in areas that are highly or very highly susceptible to these hazards as identified in hazard maps and in areas with significant antecedent rainfall.

Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are weaker in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.

- Minor to moderate impacts from gale-force winds are possible within any of the localities where Wind Signal No. 2 is hoisted.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.

Coastal Inundation

There is a moderate to high risk of life-threatening storm surge in the next 48 hours over the low-lying or exposed coastal localities of Batanes and Babuyan Islands. For more information, refer to Storm Surge Warning No. 7 issued at 2:00 AM today.

HAZARD AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

Under the influence of Super Typhoon “JULIAN”, A Gale Warning is hoisted over the northern and western seaboard of Northern Luzon. For more information, refer to Gale Warning No. 9 issued at 5:00 AM today

Super Typhoon “JULIAN” will bring strong to typhoon-force winds over the northern seaboard of northern Luzon, and the western seaboard of northern Luzon. Mariners of motor bancas and similarly sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigating in these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.

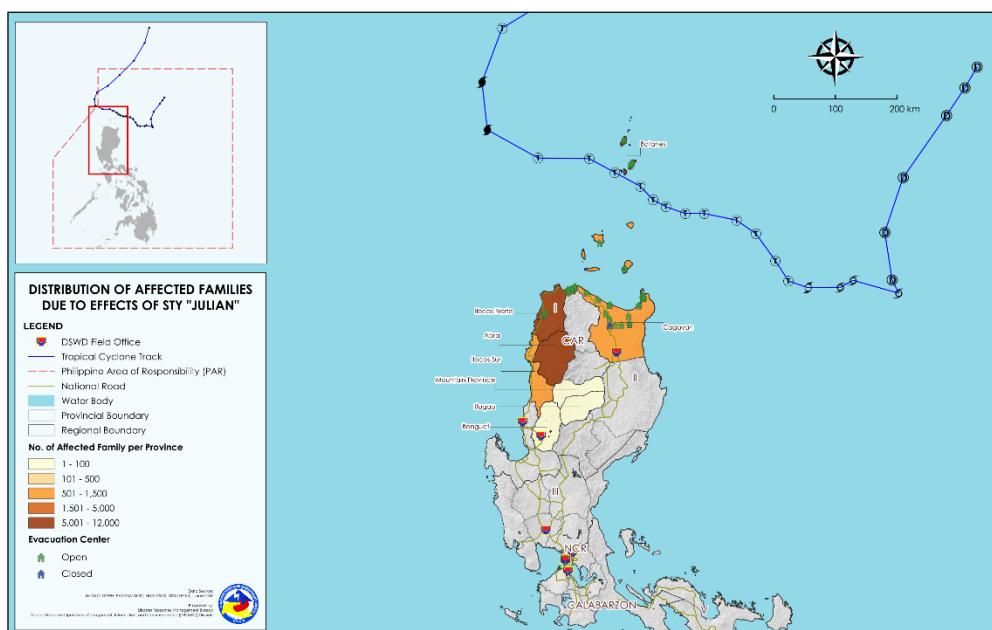
TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

On the track forecast, Super Typhoon “JULIAN” will recurve towards the sea southwest of Taiwan today through tomorrow (2 October) early morning. It may exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) on Thursday afternoon or evening as a typhoon.

“JULIAN” still has a window for brief intensification in the next 24 hours. Afterwards, increasing interaction with the mountainous terrain of Taiwan will slightly weaken JULIAN prior to making landfall. Its passage over Taiwan will result in JULIAN being downgraded into a severe tropical storm on Thursday.

The center of the eye of Super Typhoon JULIAN was estimated based on all available data 205 km West of Itbayat, Batanes (20.6°N, 119.9°E) moving West northwestward slowly with a maximum sustained winds of 185 km/h near the center, gustiness of up to 230 km/h, and central pressure of 925 hPa.

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **29,933 families** or **99,041 persons** are affected in **311 barangays** in **Regions I, II** and **CAR** (see Annex A).

III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **372 families** or **1,099 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **54 evacuation centers** in **Regions I, II** and **CAR** (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **741 families** or **2,489 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are **1,113 families** or **3,588 persons** displaced in **Regions I, II** and **CAR** (see Annex E).

d. Damaged Houses

A total of **39** houses were damaged; of which, **one (1)** is totally damaged and **38** is partially damaged in in **Region I, CAR** (see Annex F).

e. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱1,076,559.03** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families composed of **₱940,496.45** from **DSWD**, **₱136,062.58** from the **Local Government Units (LGUs)** (see Annex G).
