

DSWD DROMIC Report #4 on the Effects of Tropical Storm “Enteng” and Southwest Monsoon as of 03 September 2024, 6AM

I. Situation Overview

Issued at 05:00 am, 03 September 2024, “Enteng” accelerates over Northern Luzon and is now over the West Philippine Sea.

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Forecast accumulated rainfall:
Today (3 September)

- 100-200 mm: Ilocos Region, Apayao, Abra, Benguet.
- 50-100 mm: Cagayan Valley, and the rest of Cordillera Administrative Region.

Forecast accumulated rainfall: Tomorrow (4 September) afternoon

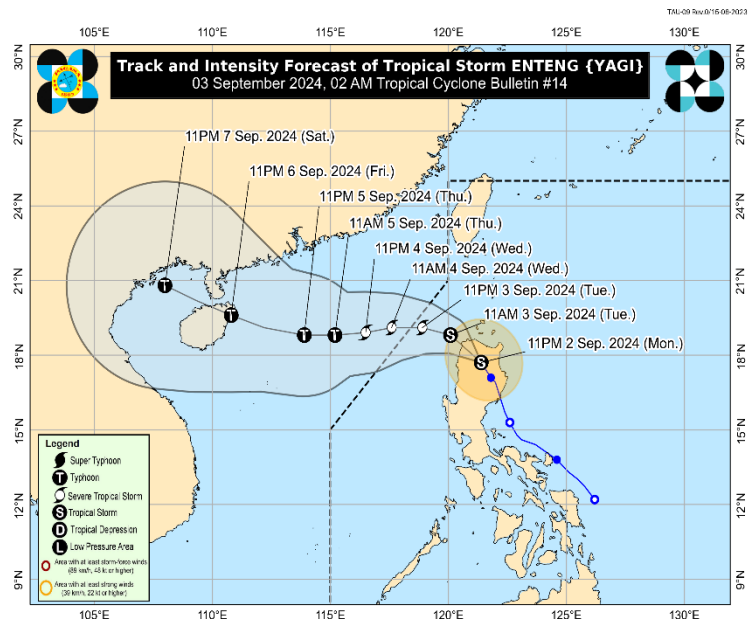
- 50-100 mm: Ilocos Norte and Ilocos Sur.

Forecast rainfall are generally higher in elevated or mountainous areas. Under these conditions, flooding and rain-induced landslides are expected especially in areas that are highly or very highly susceptible to these hazards as identified in official hazard maps and in localities that experienced considerable amounts of rainfall for the past several days.

Furthermore, the enhanced Southwest Monsoon will bring moderate to intense rainfall in other areas of Luzon (especially along the western portions) over the next three days. For more information, refer to Weather Advisory No. 6 issued at 11:00 PM yesterday.

Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.



- Minor to moderate impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the localities where Wind Signal No. 2 is hoisted.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.

The enhanced Southwest Monsoon will also bring strong to gale-force gusts over the following areas (especially in coastal and upland areas exposed to winds):

- Today (3 September): Ilocos Region, Nueva Vizcaya, Quirino, Zambales, Bataan, Aurora, Bulacan, Metro Manila, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, Western Visayas, Negros Island Region, and Northern Samar.
- Tomorrow (4 September): Ilocos Region, Abra, Benguet, Zambales, Bataan, Bulacan, Aurora, Metro Manila, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, Western Visayas, Negros Occidental, and Northern Samar.

Coastal Inundation

A minimal to moderate risk of storm surge may occur in the next 48 hours in the low-lying or exposed coastal localities of Batanes, Cagayan, Isabela, Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur, and northern Aurora. For more information, refer to Storm Surge Warning No. 3 issued at 8:00 PM yesterday. Refer to official hazard maps for specific areas susceptible to storm surge inundation in these provinces.

HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

In the next 24 hours, “Enteng” and the enhanced Southwest Monsoon will bring the following conditions over the coastal waters of the country:

- Gale Warning is in effect over the seaboard of Northern Luzon and the eastern seaboard of Central and Southern Luzon. Sea travel is risky for small seacrafts, including all types of motor bancas. For more information, refer to Gale Warning No. 4 (intermediate) issued at 11:00 PM yesterday.
- Moderate to rough seas over the western seaboard of Northern and Central Luzon (1.5 to 3.0 m), the western seaboard of Southern Luzon, the eastern and southern seaboard of Southern Luzon outside Gale Warning areas, and the western seaboard of Visayas (1.5 to 2.5 m). Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motor bancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.
- Slight to moderate seas is expected over the eastern seaboard of Visayas and Mindanao (1.0 to 2.0 m). Mariners of motor bancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigation under these conditions.

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

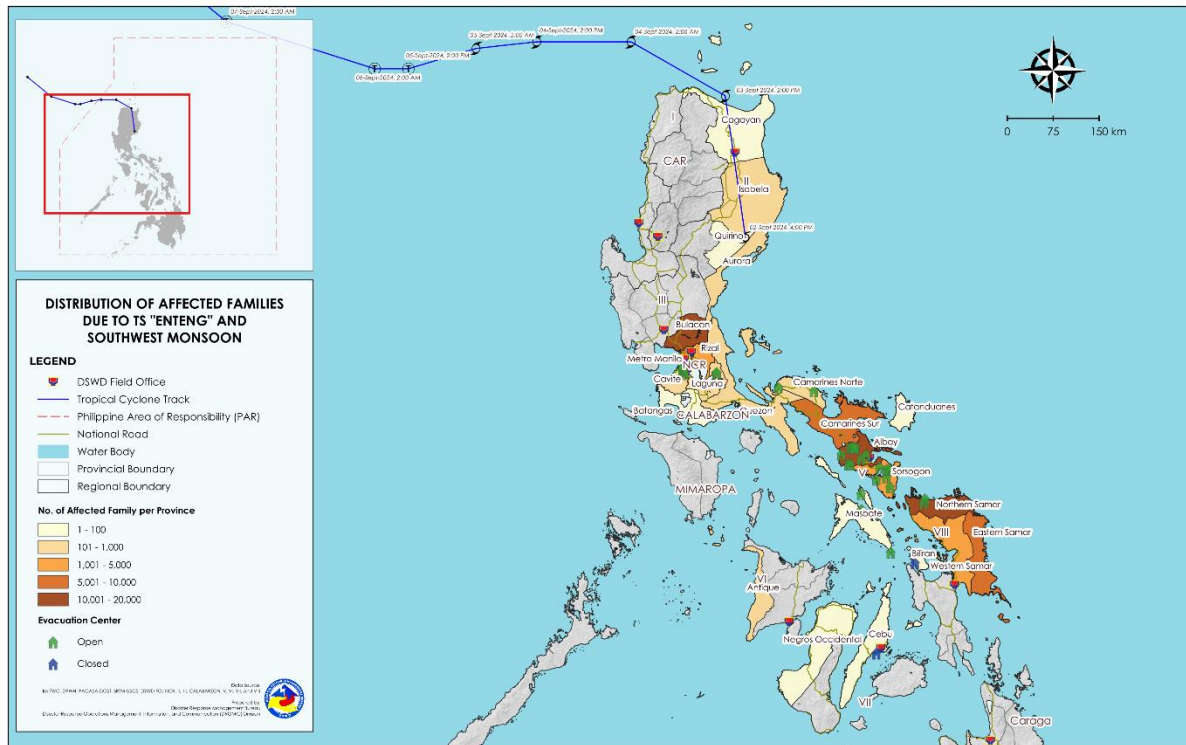
- “Enteng” is forecast to continue moving northwestward and emerge over the northwestern portion of Ilocos Region by this morning. From this afternoon until Thursday (5 September), “Enteng” will move generally westward over the West Philippine Sea. On the track forecast, this tropical cyclone may exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility by tomorrow (4 September) morning.
- “Enteng” is forecast to maintain tropical storm category during its traverse of mainland Northern Luzon. Further intensification is forecast to occur from this afternoon onwards, with “Enteng” becoming a severe tropical storm by this afternoon (at the earliest) or evening, and typhoon category by Thursday.

The center of the eye was estimated based on all available data over the coastal waters of Paoay, Ilocos Norte (18.1 °N, 120.4 °E) while moving Northwestward at 25 km/h with maximum sustained winds of 75 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 125 km/h

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **80,078 families** or **303,938 persons** are affected in **767 barangays** in **Regions NCR, II, III, CALABARZON, V, VI, VII, and VIII** (see Annex A).



III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **14,607 families** or **60,202 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **441 evacuation centers** in **Regions NCR, II, III, CALABARZON, V, VI, VII, and VIII** (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **6,658 families** or **26,576 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are **21,265 families** or **86,778 persons** displaced in **Regions NCR, II, III, CALABARZON, V, VI, VII, and VIII** (see Annex E).

IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **71 houses** were damaged; of which, **18 are totally damaged** and **53 are partially damaged** in **Region III, V, VI, VII, VIII** (see Annex F).

V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱17,246,284.30** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families composed of **₱16,148,113.30** from **DSWD** and **₱1,098,171.00** from the **Local Government Units (LGUs)** (see Annex G).
