

DSWD DROMIC Report #5 on the Effects of Super Typhoon “JULIAN” as of 01 October 2024, 6PM

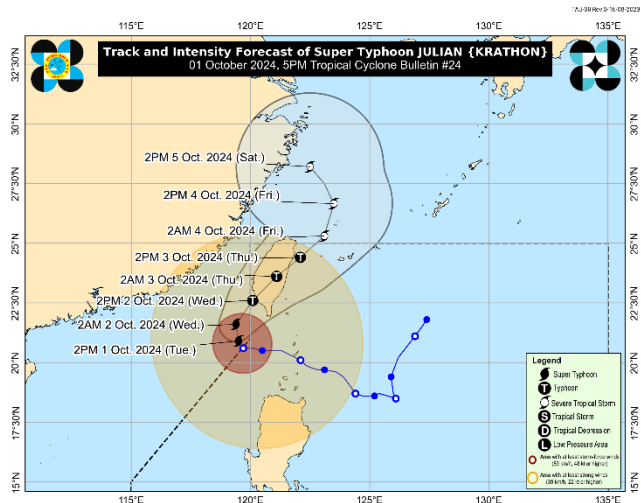
I. Situation Overview

Issued on 01 October 2024 at 5PM, “JULIAN” maintains its strength as it starts to recurve north northwestward.

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Refer to Weather Advisory No. 24 issued at 5:00 PM today for the heavy rainfall outlook due to Super Typhoon “JULIAN”.



Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are weaker in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.

- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.
- Furthermore, the wind flow coming towards the circulation of “JULIAN” may also bring strong to gale-force gusts over the following areas (especially in coastal and upland areas exposed to winds):
 - Today: Ilocos Region, Cordillera Administrative Region, the northern and eastern portions of mainland Cagayan, the eastern portion of Isabela, and Zambales
 - Tomorrow (2 October): Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur, Abra, Apayao, Batanes, Babuyan Islands, the northern and eastern portions of mainland Cagayan, and the eastern portion of Isabela
 - Thursday (3 October): Batanes and Babuyan Islands

HAZARD AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook

Under the influence of Super Typhoon “JULIAN”, a Gale Warning is hoisted over the northern seaboard of Northern Luzon.

Very rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 4.5 m over the seaboard of Babuyan Islands and Ilocos Norte
- Sea travel is risky for most types or tonnage of vessels, including all small seacrafts and motorbancas. Mariners are advised to remain in port or seek safe shelter or harbor.

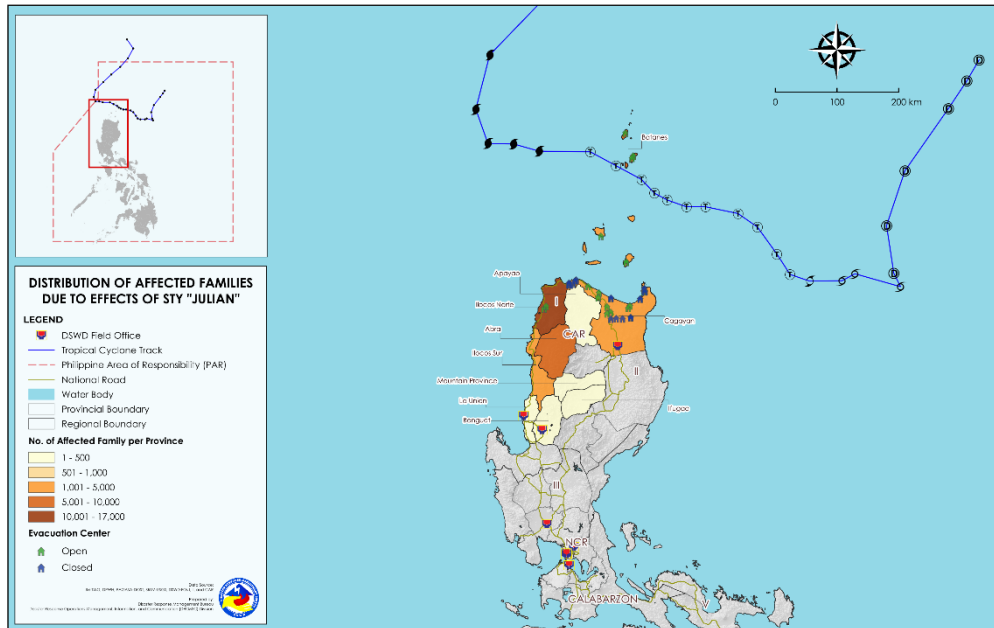

- Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

- “JULIAN” is forecast to recurve towards the sea southwest of Taiwan today through tomorrow (2 October) morning. On the track forecast, this weather disturbance will make landfall along the southwestern coast of Taiwan tomorrow afternoon. It will then cross the rugged terrain of Taiwan before emerging over the sea east of Taiwan on Thursday (3 October) morning. Afterwards, “JULIAN” will move northeastward towards the East China Sea, and exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility on Thursday evening or Friday (4 October) early morning, then turn northwestward on Friday evening to Saturday (5 October) early morning once over the East China Sea.
- Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels
- Due to weak steering, sudden change in the forecast track is likely.

The center of the eye of Super Typhoon “JULIAN” was estimated based on all available data 245 km West of Itbayat, Batanes (21.0 °N, 119.5 °E) moving North Northwestward slowly with a maximum sustained winds of 195 km/h near the center, gustiness of up to 240 km/h.

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **35,759 families** or **120,171 persons** are affected in **478 barangays** in **Regions I, II, and CAR** (see Annex A).

III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **581 families** or **1,978 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **56 evacuation centers** in **Regions I, II, and CAR** (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **862 families** or **3,054 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are **1,443 families** or **5,032 persons** displaced in **Regions I, II, and CAR** (see Annex E).

d. Damaged Houses

A total of **76 houses** were damaged; of which, **two (2)** are totally damaged and **74** are partially damaged in **Region I, II, and CAR** (see Annex F).

e. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱3,296,122.20** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, **₱2,884,065.87** from **DSWD**, and **₱405,056.33** from the **Local Government Units (LGUs)** (see Annex G).
