

DSWD DROMIC Report #6 on Super Typhoon “Julian” as of 02 October 2024, 6AM

I. Situation Overview

Issued on 02 October 2024 at 5AM, “Julian” weakens into a Typhoon as it continues to move slowly.

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Refer to Weather Advisory No. 26 issued at 5:00 AM today for the heavy rainfall outlook due to “Julian”.

Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are weaker in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.

- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.

HAZARD AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

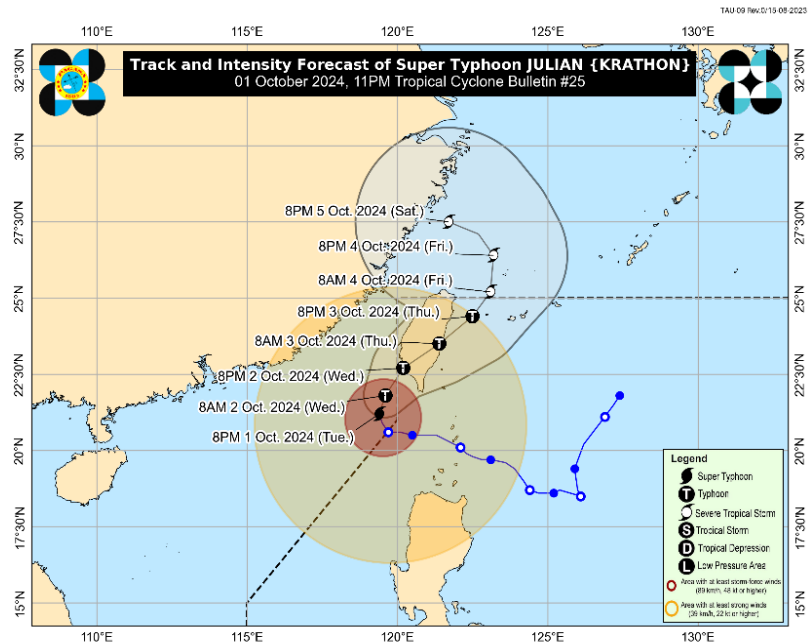
A Gale Warning is hoisted over the northern seaboard of Northern Luzon. For more information, refer to Gale Warning No. 11 issued at 5:00 AM today.

24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook

Under the influence of Typhoon “Julian”, a Gale Warning is hoisted over the northern seaboard of Northern Luzon.

Very rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 5.0 m over the seaboard of Batanes
- Up to 4.5 m over the seaboard of Babuyan Islands and the northern seaboard of Ilocos Norte



Sea travel is risky for most types or tonnage of vessels, including all small seacrafts and motorbancas. Mariners are advised to remain in port or seek safe shelter or harbor.

Moderate or rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 4.0 m over the remaining seaboard of Ilocos Norte
- Up to 3.5 m over the remaining seaboards of Ilocos Region
- Up to 3.0 m over the northern seaboard of mainland Cagayan and the seaboard of Zambales
- Up to 2.5 m over the remaining seaboard of Cagayan and the seaboard of Isabela

Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

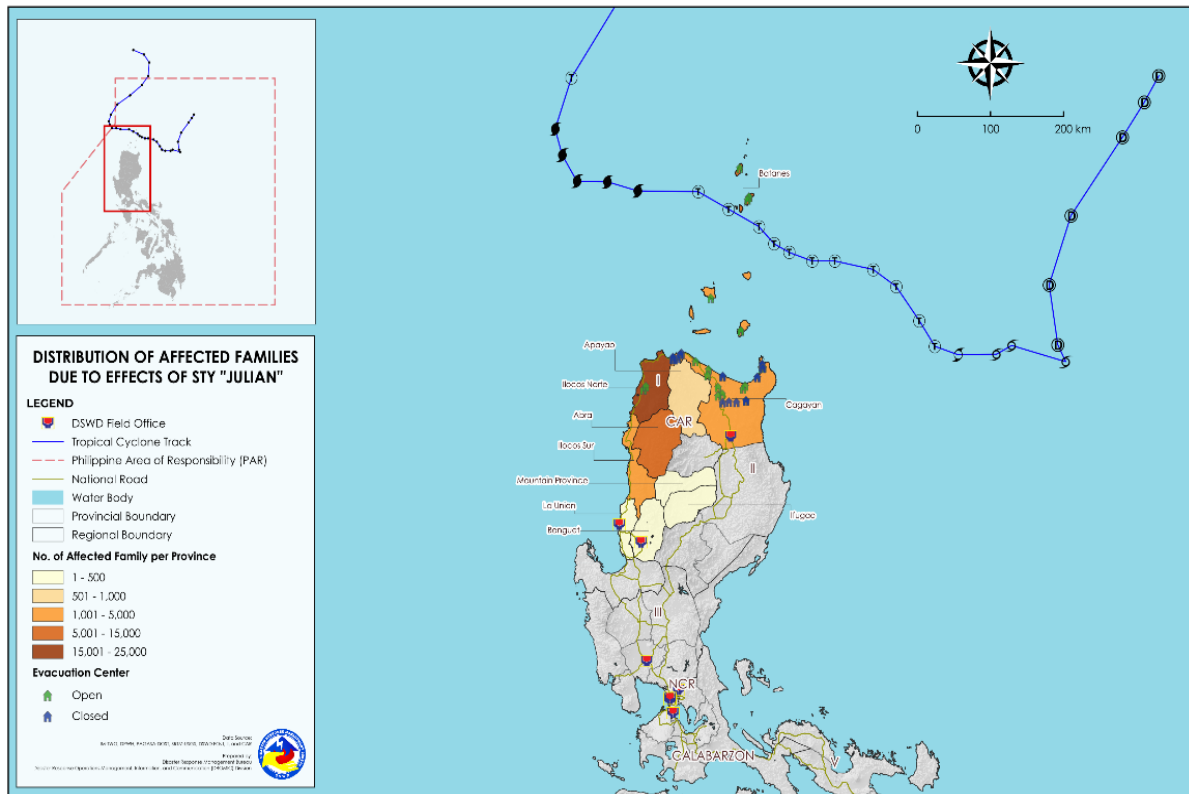
- There is a significant change in the track forecast of “Julian”. The typhoon is still forecast to turn northeastward towards the southwestern coast of Taiwan, where it is expected to make landfall tonight or tomorrow (3 October) early morning. After landfall, “Julian” is forecast to move erratically over the landmass and coastal waters of Taiwan before emerging over the Taiwan Strait on Friday (4 October) evening or Saturday (5 October) early morning. Afterwards, “Julian” will move southwestward over the Taiwan.
- At present, there is no dominant weather system influencing the general motion of “Julian”. As such, considerable shifts in the track forecast of succeeding bulletins are not ruled out.
- “Julian” will continue to weaken due to a combination of incoming northeasterly wind flow over the East China Sea and Taiwan Strait and lower ocean heat content in its vicinity (which is related to upwelling of cooler waters caused by its slow movement for nearly two days). Further weakening is expected once “Julian” hits the landmass over Taiwan due to frictional effects. The tropical cyclone may become a remnant low during the weekend.

The center of the eye of Typhoon “Julian” was estimated based on all available data at 280 km West Northwest of Itbayat, Batanes (OUTSIDE PAR) (21.4°N, 119.2°E) moving North Northwestward slowly with a maximum sustained winds of 165 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 205 km/h.

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **45,525 families** or **160,469 persons** are affected in **582 barangays** in **Regions I, II, and CAR** (see Annex A).



III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **667 families** or **2,230 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **55 evacuation centers** in **Regions I, II, and CAR** (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **700 families** or **2,608 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex E).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are **1,367 families** or **4,838 persons** displaced in **Regions I, II, and CAR** (see Annex F).

d. Damaged Houses

A total of **257** houses were damaged; of which, **35** are totally damaged and **222** are partially damaged in **Region I, II, and CAR** (see Annex G).

e. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱10,905,691.32** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, **₱9,078,509.39** from **DSWD**, **₱1,753,881.93** from the **Local Government Units (LGUs)**, **₱5,000.00** from **Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs)**, and **₱68,300.00** from **other Partners** (see Annex H).
