

DSWD DROMIC Report #7 on Super Typhoon “Julian”

as of 02 October 2024, 6PM

I. Situation Overview

Issued on 02 October 2024 at 5PM, “Julian” slightly accelerated while moving towards Southern Taiwan.

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Refer to Weather Advisory No. 28F issued at 5:00 PM today for the heavy rainfall outlook due to “Julian”.

Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are weaker in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.

- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.

HAZARD AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

A Gale Warning is hoisted over the northern seaboard of Northern Luzon.

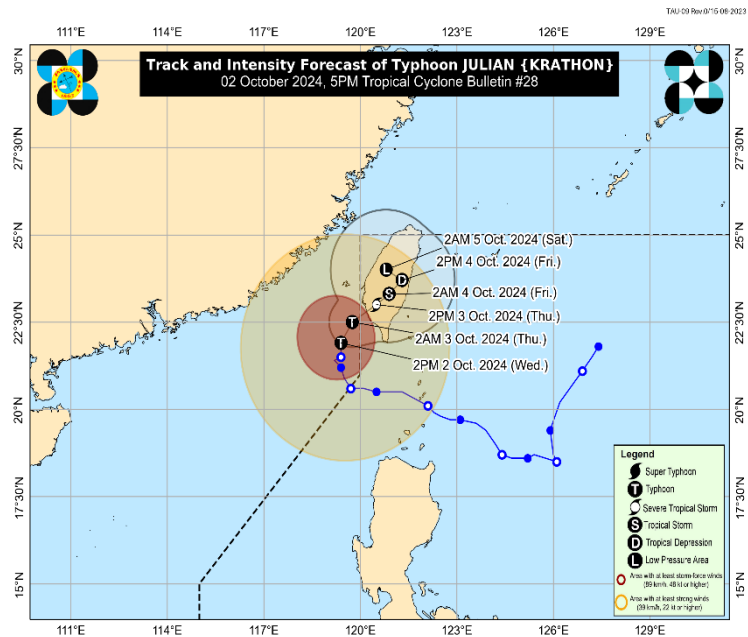
24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook

Under the influence of Typhoon “Julian”, a Gale Warning is hoisted over the northern seaboard of Northern Luzon.

Very rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 4.5 m over the seaboard of Batanes and Babuyan Islands

Sea travel is risky for most types or tonnage of vessels, including all small seacrafts and motorbancas. Mariners are advised to remain in port or seek safe shelter or harbor.



Moderate or rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 4.0 m over the seaboard of Ilocos Norte
- Up to 3.5 m over the remaining seaboards of Ilocos Region and the northeastern seaboard of mainland Cagayan
- Up to 3.0 m over the seaboard of Zambales
- Up to 2.5 m over the remaining seaboard of Cagayan

Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

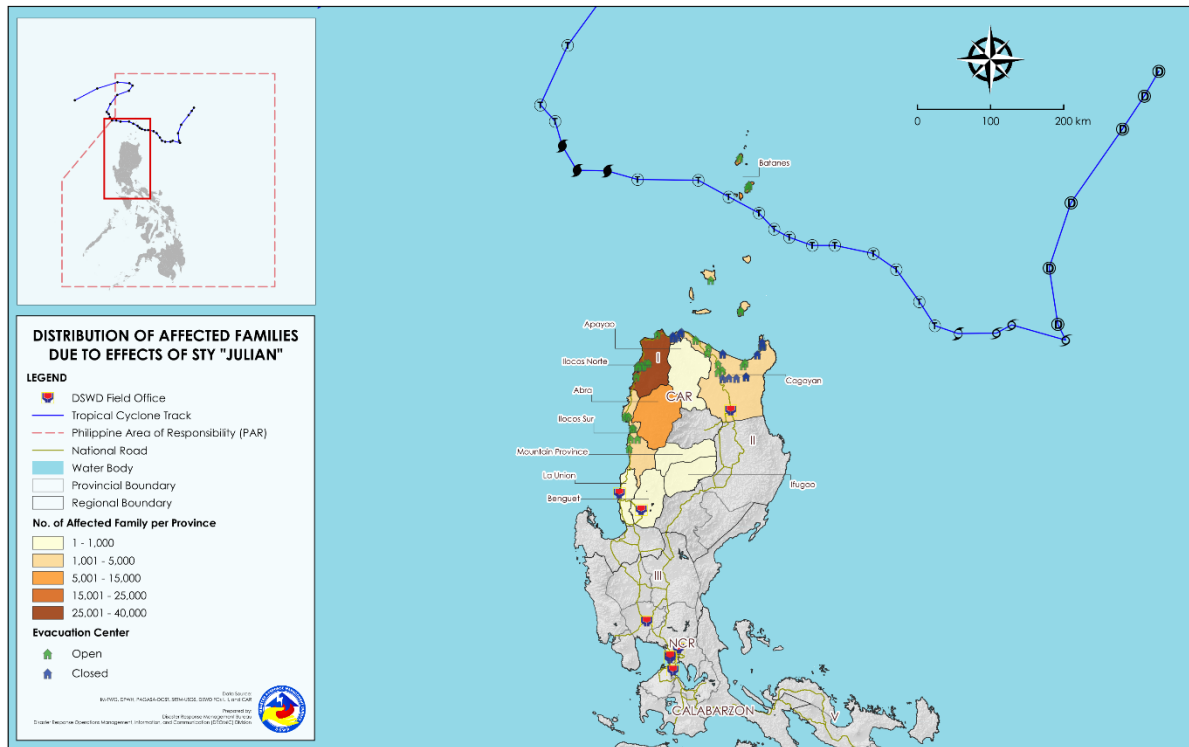
- There has been a significant change in the track forecast of “Julian”. The typhoon is still forecast to turn northeastward towards the southwestern coast of Taiwan, where it is expected to make landfall tomorrow (3 October) morning after entering the northwestern boundary of the Philippine Area of Responsibility. Despite the re-entry, no direct effect is anticipated over the country except for Batanes which is relatively close to Taiwan. After landfall, “Julian” is forecast to move slowly to almost stationary over the landmass of Taiwan, where it may become a remnant low by Saturday (5 October) while still within PAR but relatively far from any part of the country.
- At present, there is no dominant weather system influencing the general motion of “Julian”. As such, considerable shifts in the track forecast of succeeding bulletins are not ruled out.
- Due to a combination of incoming northeasterly wind flow over the East China Sea and Taiwan Strait and lower ocean heat content in its vicinity (which is related to upwelling of cooler waters caused by its slow movement for nearly two days), “Julian” is forecast to rapidly weaken. Further weakening is expected once “Julian” hits the landmass over Taiwan due to frictional effects. The tropical cyclone may become a remnant low on weekend.

The center of the eye of Typhoon “Julian” was estimated based on all available data 275 km West Northwest of Itbayat, Batanes (OUTSIDE PAR) (22.0 °N, 119.5 °E) moving Northward at 15km/h with maximum sustained winds of 165 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 205 km/h.

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **57,126 families** or **204,459 persons** are affected in **721 barangays** in **Regions I, II,** and **CAR** (see Annex A).



III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **376 families** or **1,143 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **39 evacuation centers** in **Regions I, II, and CAR** (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **655 families** or **2,323 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex E).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are **1,031 families** or **3,466 persons** displaced in **Regions I, II, and CAR** (see Annex F).

IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **361** houses were damaged; of which, **36** are totally damaged and **325** are partially damaged in **Region I, II, and CAR** (see Annex G).

V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱16,715,302.24** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, **₱10,422,023.41** from **DSWD**, **₱3,264,045.56** from the **Local Government Units (LGUs)**, **₱2,960,933.27** from **Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs)**, and **₱68,300.00** from **other Partners** (see Annex H).
