

DSWD DROMIC Report #10 on Typhoon “Nika” and Super Typhoon "Ofel" as of 15 November 2024, 6PM

I. Situation Overview

Issued on 15 November 2024 at 5:00 PM, “Ofel” further weakens and is now outside the Philippine Area of Responsibility but may still re-enter tonight.

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Severe Tropical Storm OFEL is not expected to bring significant rainfall in any part of the country. However, Weather Advisory No. 38 has been issued at 5:00 PM today for the heavy rainfall outlook due to “PEPITO”.

Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.

- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.

HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS


24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook

Up to rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 3.5 m: The seaboard of Batanes
- Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.

Up to moderate seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 2.5 m: The seaboards of Babuyan Islands, Ilocos Norte and mainland Cagayan



- Up to 2.0 m: The remaining seaboard of Ilocos Region and Cagayan Valley
- Mariners of motorbancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigation under these conditions.

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK


- OFEL is forecast to recurve towards the sea southwest of Taiwan tonight through tomorrow (16 November) early morning. On the track forecast, the tropical cyclone may make landfall over the southwestern coast of Taiwan by tomorrow morning or afternoon. It will then cross the rugged terrain of Taiwan before emerging over the sea east of Taiwan on Sunday (17 November).
- Despite exiting the PAR region, a tropical cyclone wind signal may still be raised over the areas of Extreme Northern Luzon. OFEL is forecast to further weaken throughout the forecast period due to the increasingly unfavorable environment and interaction with the mountainous terrain of Taiwan. Its passage over Taiwan will result in OFEL being downgraded into a remnant Low on Sunday evening (17 November) or Monday (18 November) early morning.

The center of Typhoon “Ofel” was estimated based on all available data 205 km West Northwest of Itbayat, Batanes (OUTSIDE PAR) (21.2 °N, 119.9 °E) moving North Northwestward 15 km/h at 20 km/h with maximum sustained winds of 100 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 125 km/h.

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **132,366 families** or **493,508 persons** are affected in **1,611 barangays** in **Regions I, II, III, V and CAR** (see Annex A).



III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **13,835 families** or **41,568 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **464 evacuation centers** in **Regions II** and **CAR** (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **8,313 families** or **26,565 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex E).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are **22,148 families** or **68,133 persons** still displaced in **Regions II** and **CAR** (see Annex F).

IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **6,856 houses** were damaged; of which, **348** are **totally damaged** and **6,508** are partially damaged in **Regions I, II, III,** and **CAR** (see Annex G).

V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱30,286,875.87** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families composed of **₱27,839,008.76** from **DSWD**, **₱2,104,707.11** from the **Local Government Unit (LGUs)**, **₱338,600.00 Non-Government Organizations (NGOs)**, and **₱4,500.00** from **other Partners** (see Annex H).
