

DSWD DROMIC Report #2 on Typhoon “Nika” as of 11 November 2024, 6PM

I. Situation Overview

Issued on 11 November 2024 at 5PM, Typhoon “Nika” is now over Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR).

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Refer to Weather Advisory No. 15 issued at 5:00 PM today for the heavy rainfall outlook due to Typhoon “Nika”.

Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.

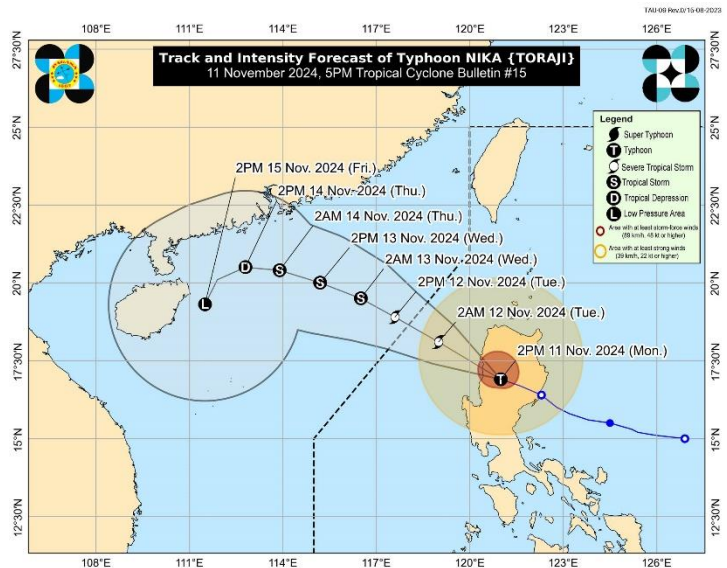
- Significant to severe impacts from typhoon-force winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 4.
- Moderate to significant impacts from storm-force winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 3.
- Minor to moderate impacts from gale-force winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 2.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.

Furthermore, the northeasterly wind flow will also bring strong to gale-force gusts over the following areas (especially in coastal and upland areas exposed to winds):

- Today (11 November): Batanes, Bataan, Cavite, Batangas, Lubang Island, Marinduque, Romblon, Masbate, Camarines Norte, Camarines Sur, and Catanduanes
- Tomorrow (12 November): Ilocos Sur, La Union, Pangasinan, Batanes, Cagayan including Babuyan Islands, and Isabela

HAZARD AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

A Gale Warning is hoisted over the eastern seaboard of Luzon and the northern and western seaboard of Northern Luzon.



24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook

- Up to very rough or high seas over the following coastal waters:
- Up to 5.5 m: The eastern seaboard of mainland Cagayan; the seaboard of Isabela and Ilocos Sur; the western seaboard of Ilocos Norte.
- Up to 5.0 m: The remaining seaboard of mainland Cagayan and Ilocos Norte; the seaboard of Babuyan Islands
- Up to 4.5 m: The seaboard of Batanes and northern Aurora
- Sea travel is risky for all types or tonnage of vessels. All mariners must remain in port or, if underway, seek shelter or safe harbor as soon as possible until winds and waves subside.

Up to rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 4.0 m: The remaining seaboard of Ilocos Region.
- Up to 3.0 m: The remaining seaboard of Aurora; the northern and eastern seaboard of Polillo Islands; the western seaboard of Zambales
- Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.

Up to moderate seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 2.5 m: The seaboard of northern mainland Quezon and Camarines Norte; the northern seaboard of Camarines Sur and Catanduanes.
- Up to 2.0 m: The western seaboard of Bataan, Lubang Islands, Occidental Mindoro, and Calamian Islands; the northern and eastern seaboard of Northern Samar; the seaboard of Kalayaan Islands; the eastern seaboard of Camarines Sur, Albay, Sorsogon, and Eastern Samar.

Mariners of motorbancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigation under these conditions.

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

- Typhoon “Nika” will traverse the landmass of mainland Luzon today and emerge over the sea west of Ilocos Sur this evening. Regardless of the position of the center in the next several hours, it must be emphasized that hazards on land and coastal waters may still be experienced in areas outside the forecast confidence cone. Afterwards, NIKA will move west northwestward over West Philippine Sea and exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility by tomorrow (12 November) morning. NIKA is forecast to continue moving generally west northwestward until Thursday (14 November) before turning generally southwestward on Friday (15 November).
- Typhoon “Nika” may weaken into a severe tropical storm while traversing mainland Luzon due to land interaction. A generally weakening trend may then be expected for this tropical cyclone until it becomes a remnant low over the sea near southern China.

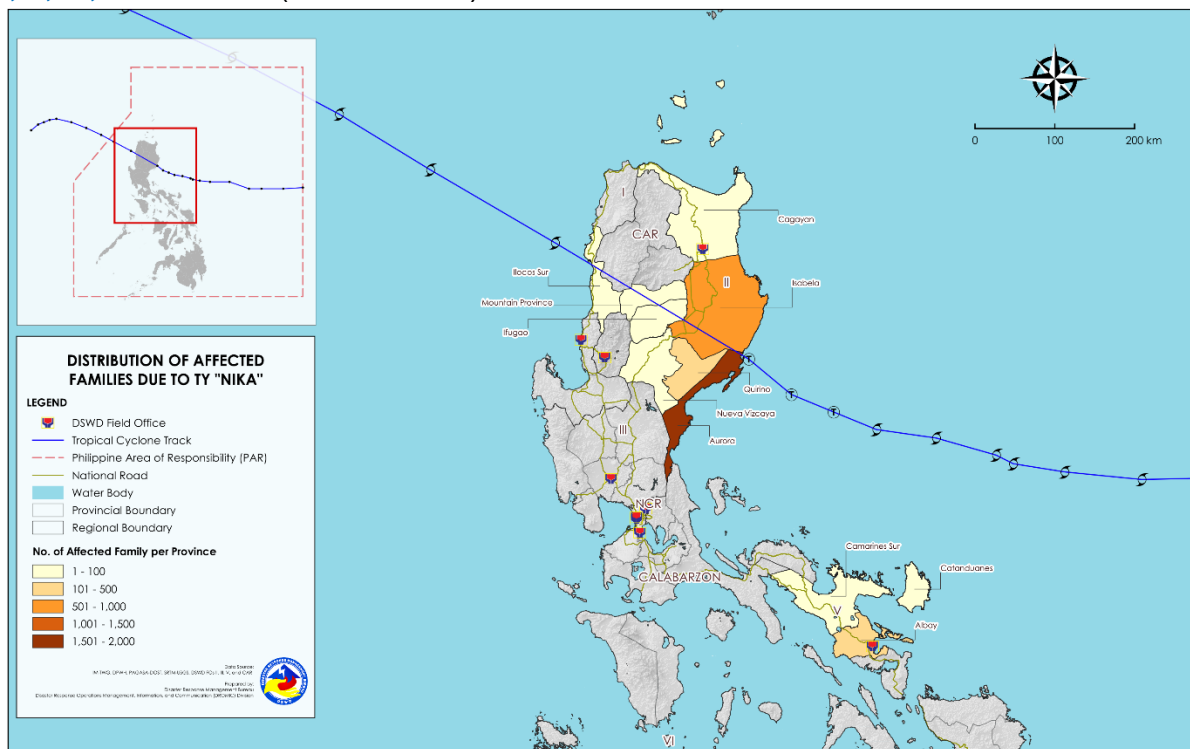
The center of the eye was estimated based on all available data in the vicinity of

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **2,855 families** or **7,903 persons** are affected in **125 barangays** in **Regions I, II, III, V** and **CAR** (see Annex A).



III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **2,137 families** or **6,191 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **145 evacuation centers** in **Region I, II, III,** and **CAR** (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **417 families** or **1,248 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are **2,554 families** or **7,439 persons** still displaced in **Region I, II, III,** and **CAR** (see Annex E).

IV. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱47,480.00** worth of assistance was provided by the **Local Government Units (LGUs)** to the affected families (see Annex F).
