

DSWD DROMIC Report #4 on Typhoon “Marce” as of 07 November 2024, 6PM

I. Situation Overview

Issued on 07 November 2024 at 5PM, life-threatening conditions persist over Northeastern Cagayan as Typhoon “Marce” makes landfall over Santa Ana, Cagayan.

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Refer to Weather Advisory No. 18 issued at 5:00 PM today for the Heavy Rainfall Outlook associated with MARCE.

Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.

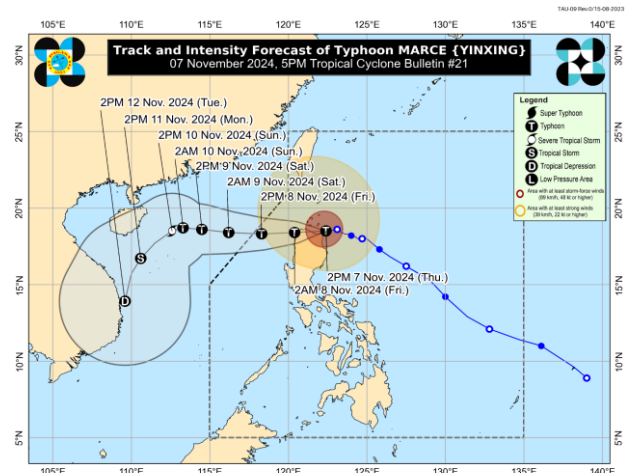
- Significant to severe impacts from typhoon-force winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 4.
- Moderate to significant impacts from gale-force winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 3.
- Minor to moderate impacts from gale-force winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 2.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.

Furthermore, the northeasterly wind flow and the periphery of MARCE will also bring strong to gale-force gusts over the following areas (especially in coastal and upland areas exposed to winds):

- Today (7 November): Zambales, Bataan, and Polillo Islands
- Tomorrow (8 November): Batanes, Cagayan including Babuyan Islands, Isabela, and Ilocos Region.
- Saturday (9 November): Batanes and Babuyan Islands

Coastal Inundation

There is a high risk of life-threatening storm surge with peak surge heights exceeding 3.0 m in the next 48 hours over the low-lying or exposed coastal localities of Batanes, Cagayan including Babuyan Islands, Isabela, Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur, and La Union. Refer to Storm Surge Warning No. 9 issued at 2:00 PM today for the details.



HAZARD AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

A Gale Warning is hoisted over the seaboard of Northern Luzon and the western seaboard of Central Luzon.

24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook

Up to very rough, high, or very high seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 12.0 m: The seaboard of Babuyan Islands and Ilocos Norte; the northern seaboard of mainland Cagayan.
- Up to 8.0 m: The remaining seaboard of Cagayan.
- Up to 7.0 m: The seaboard of Batanes and Ilocos Sur.
- Up to 5.0 m: The remaining seaboard of Ilocos Region;
- Up to 4.5 m: The seaboard of northern Zambales and Isabela.
- Sea travel is risky for all types or tonnage of vessels. All mariners must remain in port or, if underway, seek shelter or safe harbor as soon as possible until winds and waves subside.

Up to rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 4.0 m: The seaboard of Kalayaan Islands
- Up to 3.5 m: The seaboard of Camarines Norte and northern Aurora, the remaining seaboard of Zambales.
- Up to 3.0 m: The northern and eastern seaboard of Polillo Islands and Catanduanes; the northern seaboard of Camarines Sur; the western seaboard of Bataan, Lubang Islands, Calamian islands and mainland Palawan
- Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.

Up to moderate seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 2.5 m: The northern and eastern seaboard of Northern Samar; the eastern seaboard of Albay, Sorsogon, and Eastern Samar; the remaining seaboard of Aurora; the seaboard of northern Quezon.
- Up to 2.0 m: The western seaboard of Occidental Mindoro and Batangas; the eastern seaboard of Camarines Sur, Dinagat Islands, and Surigao del Sur
- Mariners of motorbancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigation under these conditions.

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

- Typhoon MARCE will move generally westward, emerge over Aparri Bay, and possibly make another landfall along the coast of northwestern mainland Cagayan tonight. MARCE will emerge over the West Philippines tomorrow (8 November) early morning.
- Regardless of the position of the center of the eye in the next several hours, it must be emphasized that potentially life threatening conditions due to typhoon-force winds, storm surge inundation, and torrential rainfall will be experienced

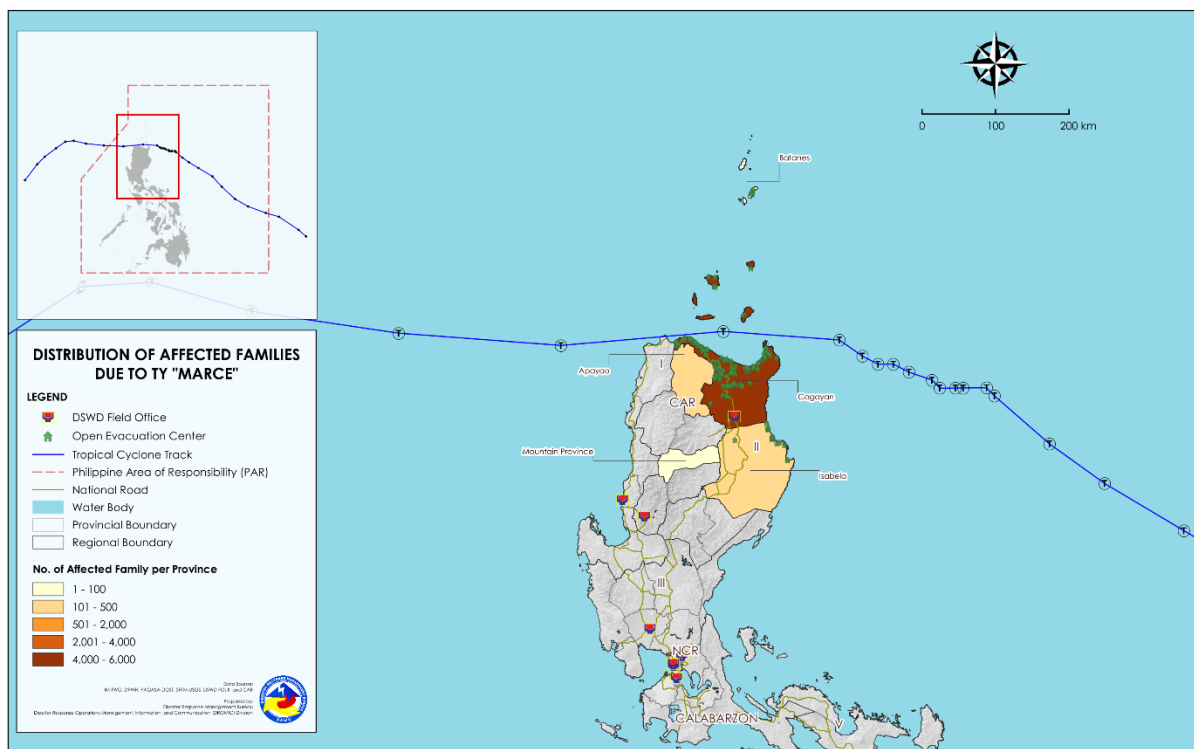
- in the Babuyan Islands and the northern portions of mainland Cagayan, Ilocos Norte, and Apayao.
- After crossing the northern portion of Northern Luzon, MARCE will continue moving generally westward and exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) region tomorrow afternoon or evening. The surge of the northeasterly wind flow will result in a generally southwestward movement beginning on Sunday (10 November).
- The possibility of reaching Super Typhoon category after crossing northeastern Cagayan is still not ruled out. Nevertheless, weakening is expected within the day due to interaction with the terrain of mainland Luzon and the possible dry air intrusion from the prevailing northeasterly wind flow. Nevertheless, it will remain as a typhoon throughout its passage within the PAR region. The surge of the northeasterly wind flow will trigger a continuous period of weakening during the weekend.

The center of the eye of Typhoon “Marce” was estimated based on all available data in the vicinity of Santa Ana, Cagayan (18.5 °N, 122.0 °E) moving Westward 10 kph with a maximum sustained winds of 175 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 240 km/h.

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **5,764 families** or **16,449 persons** are affected in **211 barangays** in **Regions II** and **CAR** (see Annex A).



III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **3,626 families** or **10,552 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **167 evacuation centers** in **Regions II** and **CAR** (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **870 families** or **2,608 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are **4,496 families** or **13,160 persons** still displaced in **Regions II** and **CAR** (see Annex E).

IV. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱612,922.45** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families composed of **₱611,366.45** from **DSWD** and **₱1,556.00** from the **Local Government Unit (LGU)** (see Annex F).
