

## DSWD DROMIC Report #4 on Typhoon “Nika” as of 12 November 2024, 6PM

### I. Situation Overview

Issued on 12 November 2024 at 5:00 PM, Typhoon “Nika” has weakened into a Tropical Storm and exited the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR).

#### HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

##### Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Typhoon “Nika” is less likely to bring heavy rainfall over the country in the next three days.

##### Severe Winds

The channeling of winds coming to Typhoon “Nika” from the Luzon Strait will also bring strong to gale-force gusts over the following areas (especially in coastal and upland areas exposed to winds):

- Today (12 November) - Batanes and Babuyan Islands

##### Coastal Inundation

Typhoon “Nika” no longer poses any threat of storm surge inundation in the coastal areas of the country. With this development, a final Storm Surge Warning was issued at 2:00 PM today.

#### HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

A final Gale Warning was issued at 5:00 PM today.

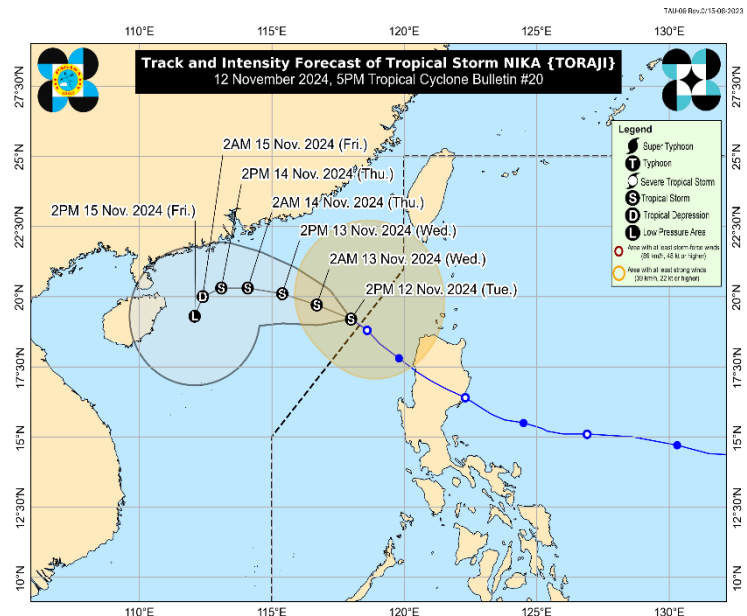
##### 24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook

Up to very rough or high seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 3.0m: The western seaboard of Batanes and Babuyan Islands; the seaboard of Ilocos Norte.
- Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.

Up to rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 2.5 m: The remaining seaboards of Batanes, Babuyan Islands, and Ilocos Region; the northern seaboard of mainland Cagayan, the northern and eastern seaboards of Catanduanes.



- Up to 2.0 m: The remaining seaboard of Cagayan Valley, the western seaboard of Zambales; the seaboards of northern Aurora and Kalayaan Islands; the northern and eastern seaboards of Camarines Sur and Northern Samar; the eastern seaboards of Albay, Sorsogon, and Eastern Samar.
- Mariners of motorbancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigation under these conditions.

## TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

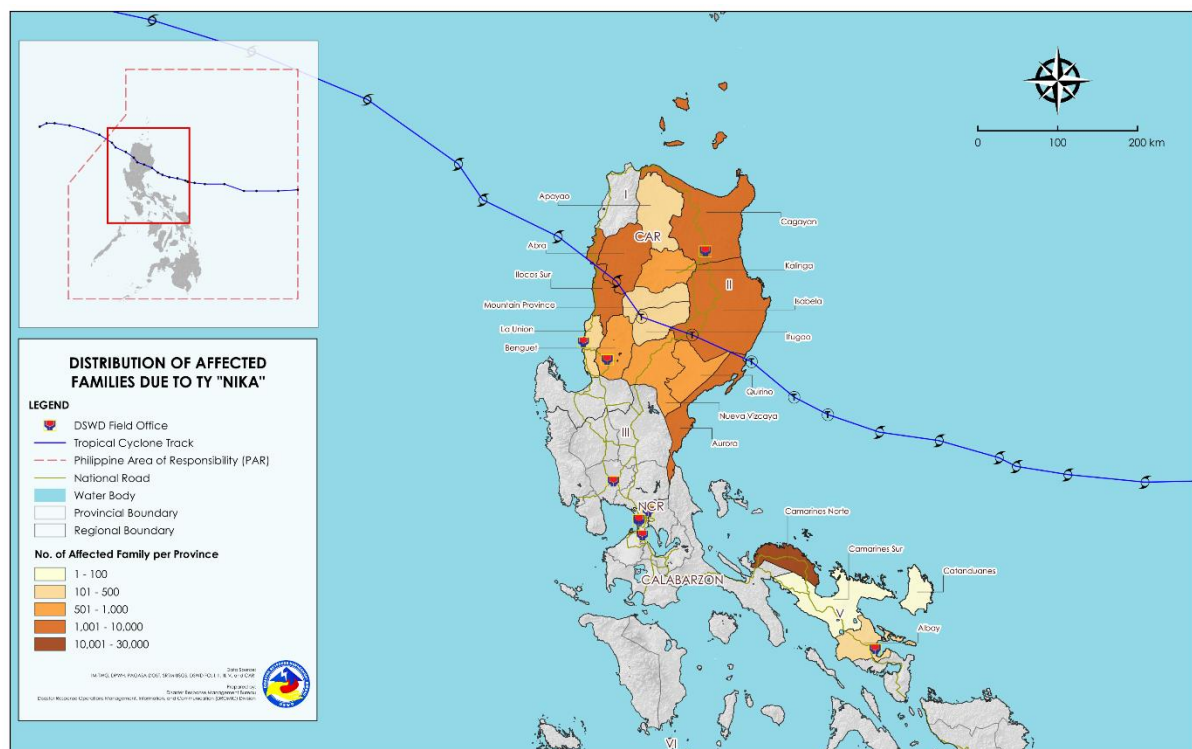
- Typhoon “Nika” will continue moving generally west northwestward to westward over the West Philippine Sea before shifting to a more southwestward movement from Thursday onwards. Due to increasingly unfavorable environment, Typhoon “Nika” is forecast to weaken into a tropical depression on Thursday evening or Friday early morning and degenerate into a remnant low on Friday afternoon or evening.

The center of the eye was estimated based on all available data 365 km West of Calayan, Cagayan (OUTSIDE PAR) (19.4 °N, 118.0 °E) while moving Northwestward 15 km/h with maximum sustained winds of 85 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 105 km/h.

## II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **52,313 families** or **194,736 persons** are affected in **856 barangays** in **Regions I, II, III, V** and **CAR** (see Annex A).



### III. Status of Displaced Population

#### a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **9,894 families** or **29,986 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **598 evacuation centers** in **Regions I, II, III,** and **CAR** (see Annex B).

#### b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **4,878 families** or **16,293 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex E).

#### c. Total Displaced Population

There are **14,772 families** or **46,279 persons** still displaced in **Regions I, II, III,** and **CAR** (see Annex F).

### IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **255 houses** were damaged; of which, **42** are **totally damaged** and **213** are partially damaged in **Regions I, II, III,** and **CAR** (see Annex G).

### V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱3,852,604.98** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, **₱3,408,422.86** from **DSWD** and **₱444,182.12** from the **Local Government Unit (LGU)** (see Annex H).
