

DSWD DROMIC Report #5 on Typhoon “Marce” as of 08 November 2024, 6AM

I. Situation Overview

Issued on 08 November 2024 at 5AM, “Marce” continues to weaken and is now over the sea West of Ilocos Norte.

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Refer to Weather Advisory No. 22 issued at 5:00 AM today for the Heavy Rainfall Outlook associated with MARCE.

Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.

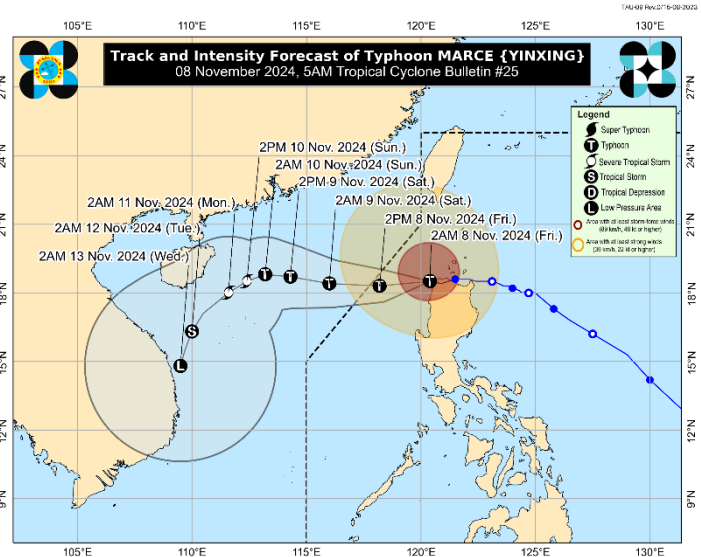
- Significant to severe impacts from typhoon-force winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 4.
- Moderate to significant impacts from gale-force winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 3.
- Minor to moderate impacts from gale-force winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 2.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.

Furthermore, the northeasterly wind flow and the periphery of MARCE will also bring strong to gale-force gusts over the following areas (especially in coastal and upland areas exposed to winds):

- Today (8 November): Batanes, Cagayan including Babuyan Islands, Isabela, and Ilocos Region.
- Tomorrow (9 November): Batanes and Babuyan Islands

Coastal Inundation

There is a high risk of life-threatening storm surge with peak surge heights exceeding 3.0 m in the next 48 hours over the low-lying or exposed coastal localities of Batanes, Cagayan including Babuyan Islands, Isabela, Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur, and La Union. Refer to Storm Surge Warning No. 11 issued at 2:00 AM today for the details.



HAZARD AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

A Gale Warning is hoisted over the seaboard of Northern Luzon. For more information, refer to Gale Warning No. 9 issued at 5:00 AM today.

24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook

Up to very rough, high, or very high seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 12.0 m: The seaboard of Babuyan Islands and Ilocos Norte
- Up to 8.0 m: The seaboard of Ilocos Sur
- Up to 6.0 m: The remaining seaboard of Ilocos Region; the western seaboard of Batanes
- Up to 5.0 m: The northern seaboard of mainland Cagayan; the remaining seaboard of Batanes
- Up to 4.5 m: The western seaboard of Pangasinan; the remaining seaboard of mainland Cagayan.
- Sea travel is risky for all types or tonnage of vessels. All mariners must remain in port or, if underway, seek shelter or safe harbor as soon as possible until winds and waves subside.

Up to rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 3.5 m: The seaboard of Kalayaan Islands, Zambales, and Isabela
- Up to 3.0 m: The northeastern seaboard of Aurora; the western seaboard of Bataan, Lubang Islands, Calamian islands and mainland Palawan
- Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.

Up to moderate seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 2.5 m: The northern and eastern seaboard of Polillo Islands and Catanduanes; the northern seaboard of Camarines Norte and Camarines Sur; the northern and eastern seaboard of Northern Samar; the eastern seaboard of Albay, Sorsogon, and Eastern Samar; the western seaboard of Bataan; the remaining seaboard of Aurora
- Up to 2.0 m: The seaboard of Quezon; the western seaboard of Occidental Mindoro and Batangas; the eastern seaboard of Camarines Sur, Dinagat Islands, and Surigao del Sur
- Mariners of motorbancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigation under these conditions.

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

- In the forecast track, MARCE will continue moving generally westward and exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR) region this afternoon or evening. The surge of the northeasterly wind flow will result in a generally southwestward movement beginning on Sunday (10 November).

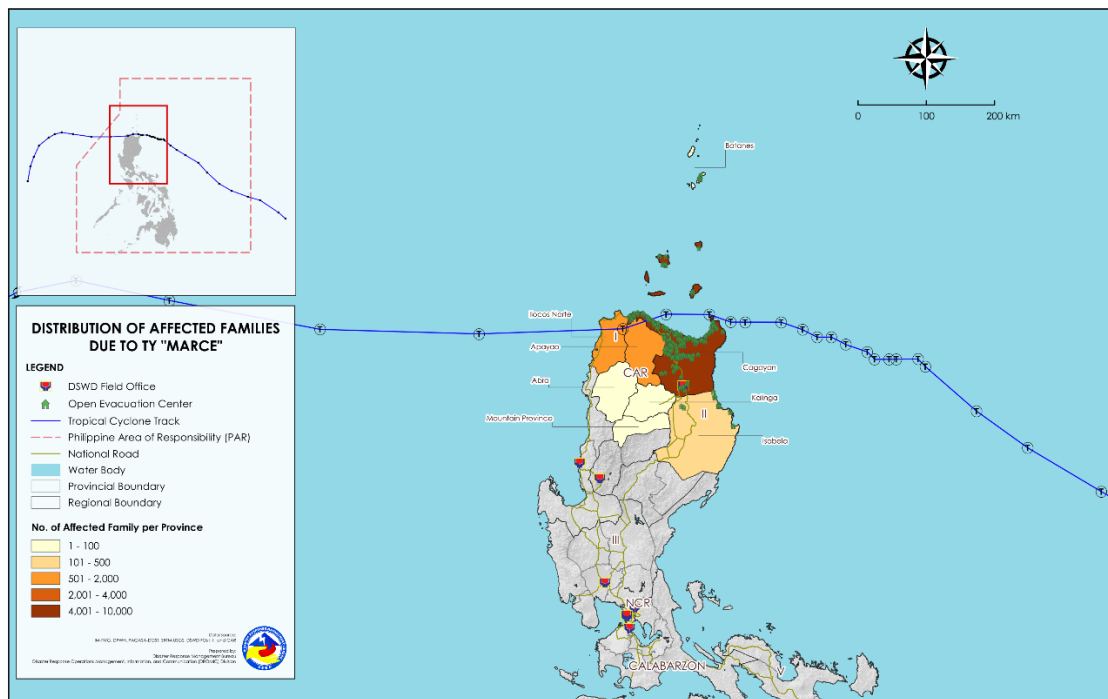
- MARCE is forecast to continue to weaken for the next days due to the possible dry air intrusion from the prevailing northeasterly wind flow. Nevertheless, it will remain as a typhoon throughout its passage within the PAR region.

The center of Typhoon MARCE was estimated based on all available data over the coastal waters of Pasuquin, Ilocos Norte (18.4 °N, 120.2 °E) Moving West Northwestward at 10 km/h with a maximum sustained winds of 155 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 215 km/h.

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **10,948 families** or **32,634 persons** are affected in **334 barangays** in **Regions I, II** and **CAR** (see Annex A).



III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **5,771 families** or **17,193 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **262 evacuation centers** in **Regions I, II** and **CAR** (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **2,191 families** or **7,065 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are **7,962 families** or **24,258 persons** still displaced in **Regions I, II** and **CAR** (see Annex E).

IV. Damaged Houses

One house was partially damaged in Brgy. Santa Isabel, Buguey, Cagayan. (see Annex F).

V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of ₱612,922.45 worth of assistance was provided to the affected families composed of ₱611,366.45 from DSWD and ₱1,556.00 from the Local Government Unit (LGU) (see Annex G).
