

## DSWD DROMIC Report #6 on Typhoon “Marce” as of 08 November 2024, 6PM

### I. Situation Overview

Issued on 08 November 2024 at 5PM, Typhoon “Marce” exits the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR).

#### HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

##### Severe Winds

The northeasterly wind flow and the periphery of “Marce” will also bring strong to gale-force gusts over the following areas (especially in coastal and upland areas exposed to winds):

- Today (8 November): Batanes, northern Cagayan including Babuyan Islands, and Ilocos Region.

##### Coastal Inundation

The threat of storm surge inundation over the coastal areas of the country has ceased.

#### HAZARD AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

A Gale Warning is hoisted over the western seaboard of Northern Luzon.

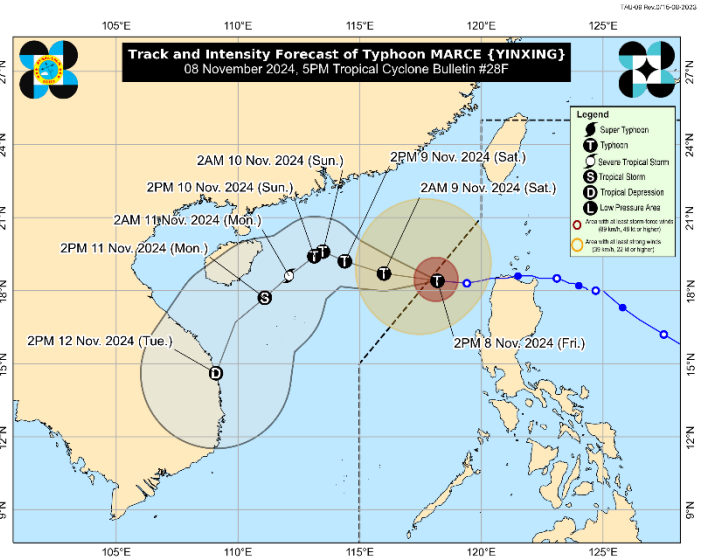
##### 24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook

Up to very rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 4.5 m: The western seaboard of Ilocos Norte and Ilocos Sur.
- Sea travel is risky for all types or tonnage of vessels. All mariners must remain in port or, if underway, seek shelter or safe harbor as soon as possible until winds and waves subside.

Up to rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 4.0 m: The seaboard of Zambales; the western seaboard of Batanes and Babuyan Islands; the remaining seaboard of Ilocos Region.
- Up to 3.5 m: The remaining seaboard of Batanes and Babuyan Islands; the northern seaboard of mainland Cagayan.
- Up to 3.0 m: The remaining seaboard of mainland Cagayan, the seaboard of Isabela



- Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.

Up to moderate seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 2.5 m: The seaboard of northern Aurora; the western seaboards of Bataan, Lubang Islands, Calamian Islands, and mainland Palawan.
- Up to 2.0 m: The remaining seaboards of Aurora; the northern and eastern seaboards of Polillo Islands, Catanduanes, and Northern Samar; the seaboards of Camarines Norte; the northern seaboard of Camarines Sur; the eastern seaboards of Albay, Sorsogon, Eastern Samar, Dinagat Islands, and Surigao del Sur
- Mariners of motorbancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigation under these conditions.

## TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

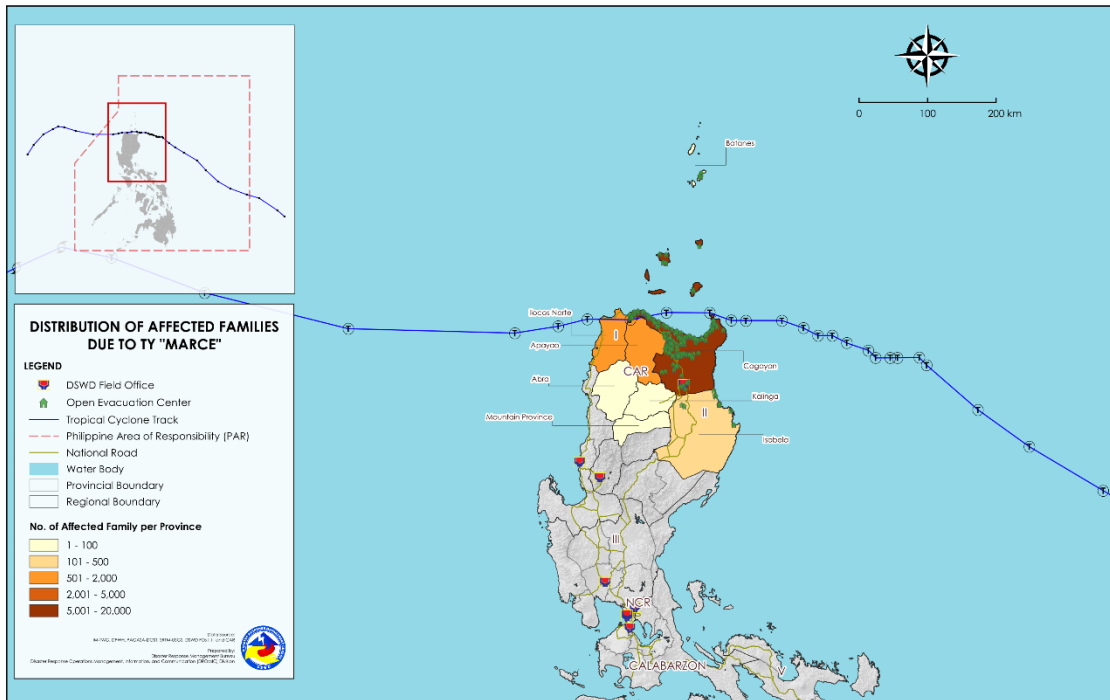
- On the forecast track, “Marce” will continue moving generally westward to west northwestward until tomorrow (09 November) over the West Philippine Sea. The surge of the northeasterly wind flow will result in a generally west southwestward to southwestward movement beginning on Sunday (10 November).
- “Marce” is forecast to re-intensify within the next 24 hours. Afterwards, it will then weaken due to increasingly unfavorable environment associated with the upcoming northeasterly wind flow.

The center of the eye of Typhoon “Marce” was estimated based on all available data 285 km West Northwest of Sinait, Ilocos Sur (OUTSIDE PAR) (18.4 °N, 117.8 °E) moving West Southwestward 20 km/h with a maximum sustained winds of 150 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 185 km/h.

## II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **18,274 families** or **55,634 persons** are affected in **445 barangays** in **Regions I, II** and **CAR** (see Annex A).



### III. Status of Displaced Population

#### a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **7,300 families** or **21,686 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **320 evacuation centers** in **Regions I, II** and **CAR** (see Annex B).

#### b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **3,417 families** or **11,257 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

#### c. Total Displaced Population

There are **10,717 families** or **32,943 persons** still displaced in **Regions I, II** and **CAR** (see Annex E).

### IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **three (3) houses** were **totally damaged** in **Regions I, II,** and **CAR** (see Annex F).

### V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱2,515,356.34** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families composed of **₱2,483,450.34** from **DSWD** and **₱31,906.00** from the **Local Government Unit (LGU)** (see Annex G).
