

## DSWD DROMIC Report #6 on Typhoon “Nika” and Typhoon "Ofel" as of 13 November 2024, 6PM

### I. Situation Overview

Issued on 13 November 2024 at 5:00 PM, more areas are now under Wind Signal Number 2 as Typhoon “Ofel” threatens Northern Luzon.

#### HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

##### Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Refer to Weather Advisory No. 24 issued at 5:00 PM today for the heavy rainfall outlook due to “Ofel”.

##### Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.

- Minor to moderate impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 2.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.

The highest Wind Signal which may be hoisted during the occurrence of “Ofel” is Wind Signal No. 4.

##### Coastal Inundation

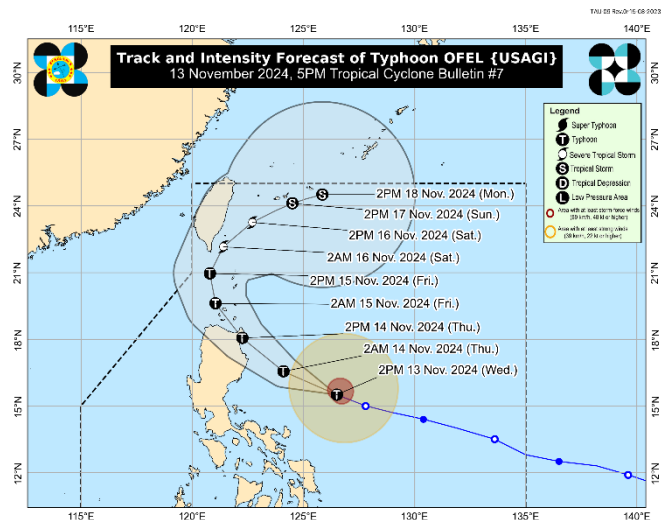
There is a moderate to high risk of life-threatening storm surge reaching 1.0 to 3.0 m in the next 48 hours over the low-lying or exposed coastal localities of Batanes, Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur, Cagayan including Babuyan Islands, Isabela, and northern Aurora. Refer to Storm Surge Warning No. 5 issued at 2:00 PM today for the details.

#### HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

##### 24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook

Up to very rough or high seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 10.0 m: The eastern seaboard of mainland Cagayan; the seaboard of Babuyan Islands
- Up to 8.0 m: The seaboard of Isabela; the remaining seaboard of mainland Cagayan



- Up to 5.0 m: The seaboard of northern Aurora
- Sea travel is risky for all types or tonnage of vessels. All mariners must remain in port or, if underway, seek shelter or safe harbor as soon as possible until winds and waves subside.

Up to rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 4.5 m: The seaboard of Batanes
- Up to 3.5 m: The northern and eastern seaboards of Catanduanes and Polillo Islands; the remaining seaboard of Aurora; the seaboard of Camarines Norte and northern Quezon; the northern seaboards of Ilocos Norte and Camarines Sur.
- Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.

Up to moderate seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 2.5 m: The eastern seaboard of mainland Quezon including the rest of Polillo Islands, Albay, and Sorsogon; northern and eastern seaboards of Northern Samar.
- Up to 2.0 m: The remaining seaboard of Ilocos Region; the seaboard of Kalayaan Islands; the eastern seaboard of Camarines Sur and Eastern Samar; the remaining seaboard of Catanduanes.
- Mariners of motorbancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigation under these conditions.

## TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

- “Ofel” is forecast to move west northwestward to northwestward over the Philippine Sea before making landfall along the eastern coast of Cagayan or Isabela tomorrow (14 November) afternoon. It will then emerge over the Luzon Strait on Friday (15 November), pass close to or make landfall over Babuyan Islands, then turning northeastward on Saturday (16 November) towards the sea east of Taiwan. Regardless of the position of the landfall point, it must be emphasized that hazards on land and coastal waters may still be experienced in areas outside the landfall point or forecast confidence cone.
- It must also be emphasized that the track may still shift within the limit of the forecast confidence cone, especially the portion wherein “Ofel” will be moving northeastward.

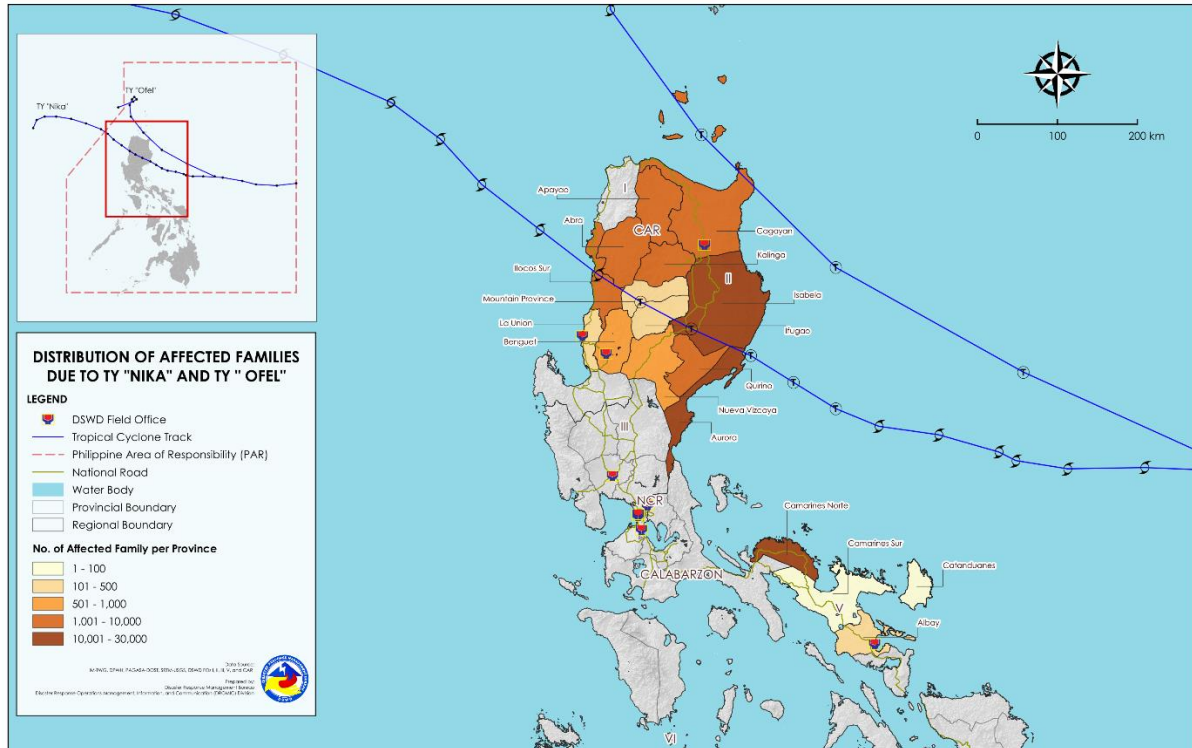
“Ofel” is forecast to steadily intensify within 24 hours and possibly make landfall during its peak intensity. Its landfall will trigger a weakening trend, which will continue for the rest of the forecast period.

The center of the eye was estimated based on all available data 480 km East of Baler, Aurora (15.7 °N, 126.1 °E) while moving West Northwestward 25 kph with a maximum sustained winds of 120 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 150 km/h.

## II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **83,416 families** or **304,141 persons** are affected in **1,186 barangays** in **Regions I, II, III, V** and **CAR** (see Annex A).



## III. Status of Displaced Population

### a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **8,695 families** or **26,979 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **376 evacuation centers** in **Regions I, II, III,** and **CAR** (see Annex B).

### b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **6,368 families** or **22,714 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex E).

### c. Total Displaced Population

There are **15,063 families** or **49,693 persons** still displaced in **Regions I, II, III,** and **CAR** (see Annex F).

## IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **2,316 houses** were damaged; of which, **230** are **totally damaged** and **2,086** are partially damaged in **Regions I, II, III,** and **CAR** (see Annex G).

## V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱9,090,813.02** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, **₱7,765,995.89** from **DSWD**, **₱1,308,187.16** from the **Local Government Unit (LGUs)**, and **₱16,629.97** **Non-Government Organizations (NGOs)** (see Annex H).
