

## DSWD DROMIC Report #9 on Typhoon “Nika” and Super Typhoon "Ofel" as of 15 November 2024, 6AM

### I. Situation Overview

Issued on 15 November 2024 at 5:00 AM, “Ofel” continues to weaken over Luzon Strait.

#### HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

##### Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Refer to Weather Advisory No. 36 issued at 5:00 AM today for the heavy rainfall outlook due to “Ofel” and “Pepito”.

##### Severe Winds

The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.

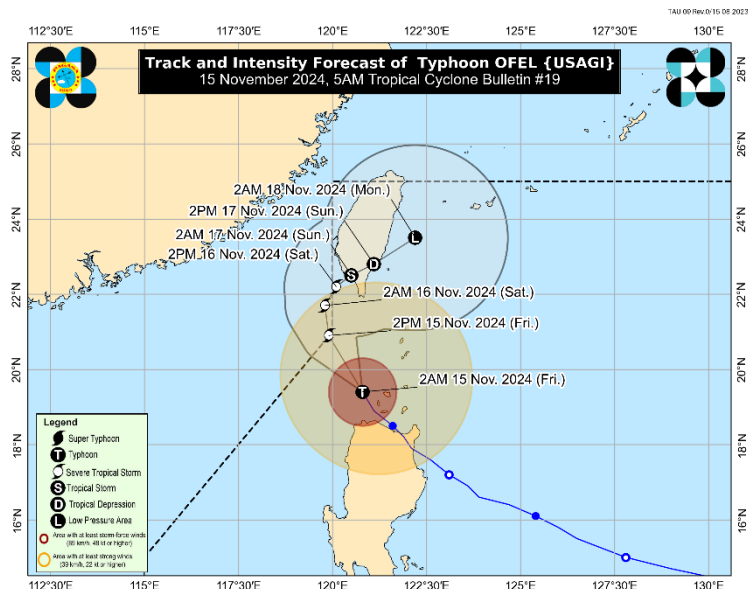
- Moderate to significant impacts from storm-force winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No 3.
- Minor to moderate impacts from gale-force winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 2.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.

##### Coastal Inundation

There is a high risk of life-threatening storm surge with peak heights up to 3.0 m in the next 48 hours over the low-lying or exposed coastal localities of Batanes, Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur, Cagayan including Babuyan Islands, and Isabela. Refer to Storm Surge Warning No. 11 issued at 2:00 AM today for more details.

#### HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

A Gale Warning is hoisted over the northern and eastern seaboard of Northern Luzon. Refer to Gale Warning No. 6 issued at 5:00 AM today for more details.



## 24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook

Up to very rough or high seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 5.0 m: The seaboards of Batanes and Babuyan Islands
- Up to 4.5 m: The northern seaboards of Ilocos Norte and mainland Cagayan
- Sea travel is risky for all types or tonnage of vessels. All mariners must remain in port or, if underway, seek shelter or safe harbor as soon as possible until winds and waves subside.

Up to rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 4.0 m: The eastern seaboard of mainland Cagayan; the seaboard of Isabela
- Up to 3.5 m: The eastern seaboards of Northern Samar, Eastern Samar, Dinagat Islands, Surigao del Norte including Siargao and Bucas Grande Islands, Surigao del Sur, and Davao Oriental
- Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.

Up to moderate seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 2.5 m: The northern and eastern seaboards of Catanduanes; the eastern seaboards of Albay and Sorsogon; the northern seaboard of Northern Samar
- Up to 2.0 m: The western seaboard of Ilocos Norte; the seaboards of Aurora and Camarines Norte; the eastern seaboard of Quezon including Polillo Islands; the northern and eastern seaboards of Camarines Sur; the remaining seaboard of Catanduanes
- Mariners of motorbancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigation under these conditions.

## **TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK**

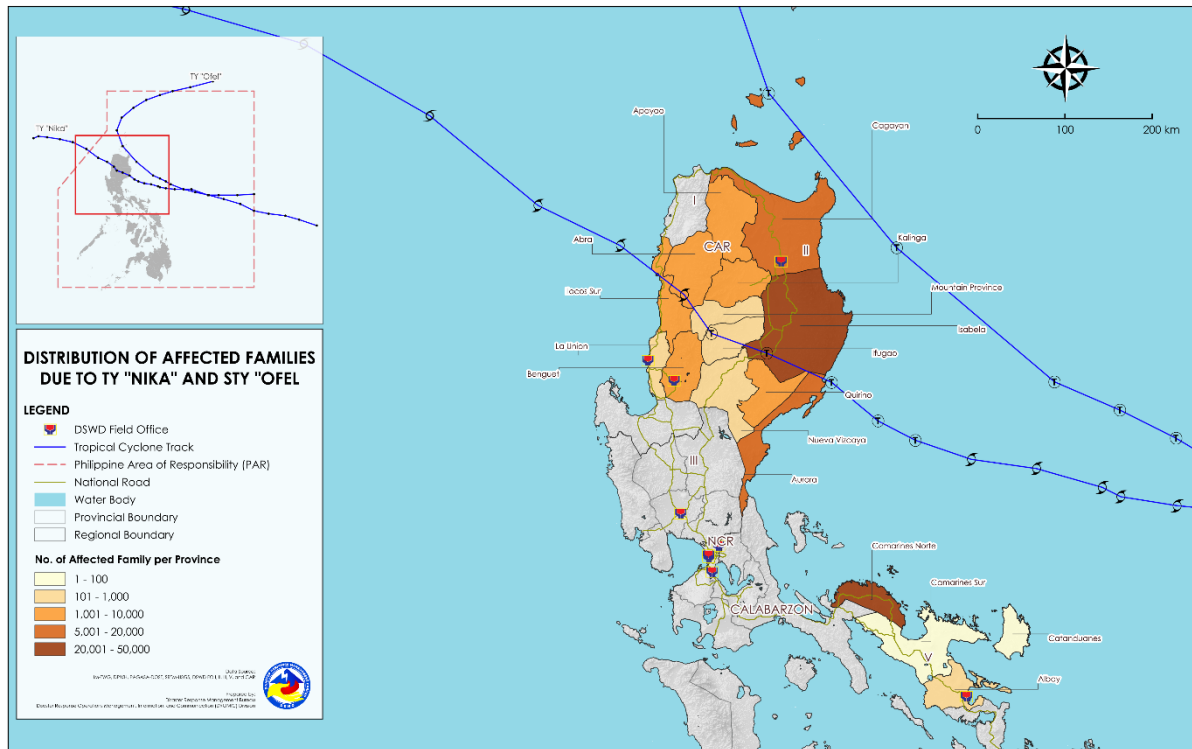
- “Ofel” will continue to move north northwestward and may exit the northwestern boundary of PAR this afternoon. Outside PAR, the tropical cyclone will then move generally northward until tomorrow (16 November) morning over the sea west of Batanes. “Ofel” may then re-enter the PAR region as it turns generally northeastward towards southern Taiwan and will remain inside PAR until the rest of the forecast period.
- Despite exiting the PAR region, a tropical cyclone wind signal may still be raised over the areas of Extreme Northern Luzon. OFEL is forecast to further weaken throughout the forecast period due to the increasingly unfavorable environment from Luzon Strait up to the sea east of Taiwan, where OFEL may weaken into a remnant Low.

The center of Typhoon “Ofel” was estimated based on all available data at 100 km Northwest of Calayan, Cagayan (19.8 °N, 120.7 °E) moving North Northwestward at 20 km/h with maximum sustained winds of 120 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 150 km/h.

## II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **119,882 families** or **456,255 persons** are affected in **1,476 barangays** in **Regions I, II, III, V and CAR** (see Annex A).



## III. Status of Displaced Population

### a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **12,393 families** or **38,154 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **546 evacuation centers** in **Regions II and CAR** (see Annex B).

### b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **10,437 families** or **35,397 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex E).

### c. Total Displaced Population

There are **22,830 families** or **73,551 persons** still displaced in **Regions II and CAR** (see Annex F).

## IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **3,902 houses** were damaged; of which, **329** are **totally damaged** and **3,573** are partially damaged in **Regions I, II, III, and CAR** (see Annex G).

## V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱29,803,029.10** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families composed of **₱27,414,081.94** from **DSWD**, **₱2,050,287.16** from the **Local Government Unit (LGUs)**, and **₱338,600.00 Non-Government Organizations (NGOs)** (see Annex H).
