

DSWD DROMIC Report #16 on the Effects of Shear Line

as of 22 February 2025, 6AM

I. Situation Overview

On 06 February 2025 at around 4:00 AM, cloudy skies with scattered rains and isolated thunderstorms caused by Shear Line may have brought possible flash floods or landslides due to moderate to heavy rains in Visayas, Catanduanes, Albay, Sorsogon, Masbate, Romblon, Dinagat Islands, and Surigao del Norte.

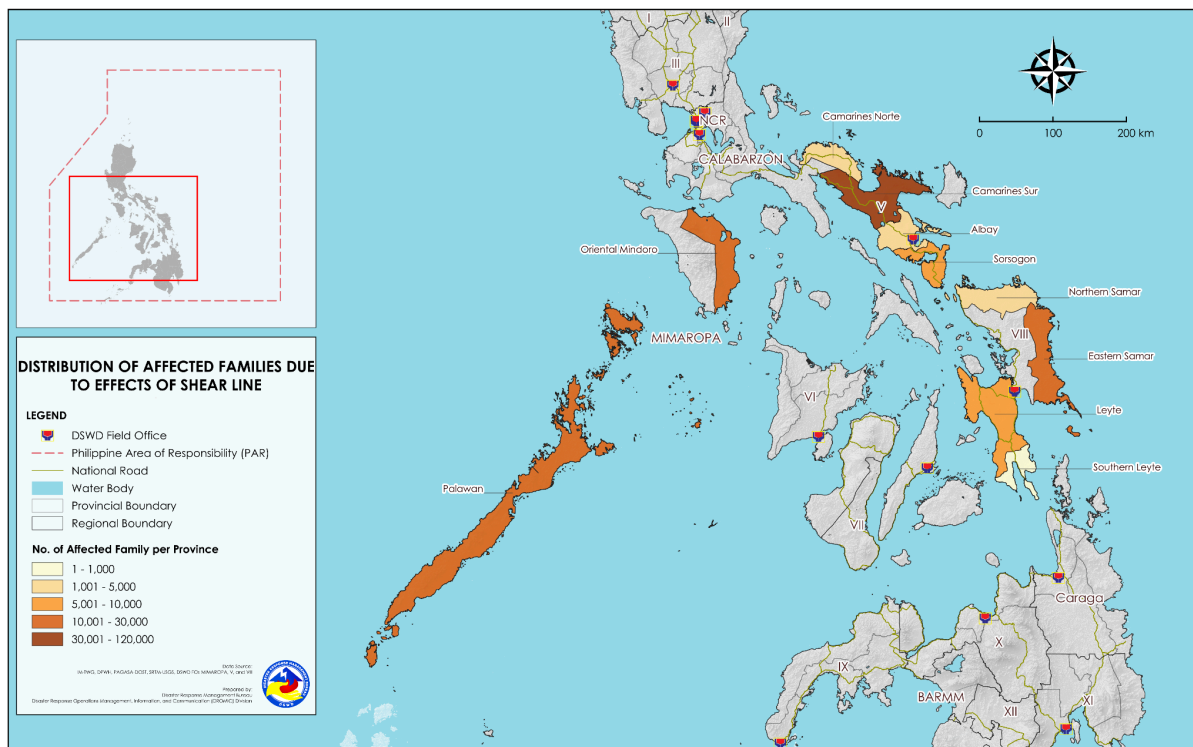
On the same day, several municipalities in Eastern Samar experienced flooding due to the Shear Line. Further, continuous heavy rainfall was also experienced in Bicol Region that resulted in a landslide incident in Legazpi City and caused localized flooding in various areas.

On 08-09 February 2025, flooding incidents were experienced in MIMAROPA Region, particularly in several low-lying areas in the municipalities of Baco, Calapan City, Naujan, Socorro and Victoria in Oriental Mindoro, and Aborlan and Narra in Palawan, due to continuous rainfall caused by Shear Line. These incidents led to the displacement of the families residing in the low-lying areas and near the river and lake side.

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **189,444 families** or **767,034 persons** are affected in **1,143 barangays** in **Regions MIMAROPA, V and VIII** (see Annex A).



III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **111 families** or **508 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **five (5) evacuation centers** in **Regions MIMAROPA** and **VIII** (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

A total of **17,805 families** or **64,261 persons** temporarily stayed with their relatives or friends (see Annex C).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are **111 families** or **508 persons** still displaced in **Regions MIMAROPA, V** and **VIII** (see Annex D).

IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **315 houses** were damaged; of which, **72** are **totally damaged** and **243** are **partially damaged** in **Regions MIMAROPA, V** and **VIII** (see Annex E).

V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱28,660,084.84** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families composed of **₱23,586,805.50** from **DSWD**, **₱4,164,379.34** from the **Local Government Units (LGUs)**, **₱908,900.00** from the **other Partners** (see Annex F).
