

DSWD DROMIC Report #196 on Kanlaon Volcano Eruption as of 02 May 2025, 6PM

I. Situation Overview


- As of **02 May 2025**, Kanlaon Volcano remains under **Alert Level 3 (magmatic unrest)**. This means that the explosive eruption on 08 April 2025 may be followed by **similar short-lived explosive eruptions** in the short term or even progress to lava eruptions that generate lava flows and lava fountaining activity. It is recommended that **communities within a 6-km radius of the summit crater remain evacuated** due to the danger of potential pyroclastic density currents or PDCs, ballistic projectiles, rockfalls, ashfall and other related hazards that could be posed by similar explosive eruptions. Local Government Units (LGUs) must also prepare their communities within the PDC hazard zone for subsequent evacuation in case unrest further escalates and hazardous worst-case explosive eruption becomes imminent. Increased vigilance must be exercised should intense rains occur since loose ash or pyroclastic material have been deposited in the upper slopes and could easily be eroded to generate lahars and sediment-laden streamflows in channels draining the southern and western portions of the edifice. Civil aviation authorities must also advise pilots to avoid flying close to the volcano's summit as ash from any sudden eruption can be hazardous to aircraft.
- On 08 April 2025 at 05:51 AM, a moderately explosive eruption occurred at the summit crater of Kanlaon Volcano that lasted 56 minutes based on seismic and visual recordings. The eruption generated a gray voluminous plume that slowly rose to 4,000 meters above the vent before bending and drifting west and southwest. Audible rumbling sounds of the eruption were reported in Brgys. Biak-na-Bato and Sag-ang, La Castellana, Negros Occidental and Brgy. Pula, Canlaon City, Negros Oriental. PDCs descended the southern slopes within a kilometer of the crater, in the jurisdiction of La Castellana, based on visual and thermal camera monitoring. Large ballistic fragments were also observed to have been thrown around the crater within a few hundred meters and caused burning of vegetation near the volcano summit. Thin ashfall has been reported in the following localities of Negros Occidental: La Carlota City– Brgys. Roberto Salas Benedicto, La Granja, Nagasi, Yubo, Ara-al, San Miguel and Cubay; Bago City– Brgys. Mailum, Ilijan, and Binubuhan; and La Castellana– Brgys. Sag-ang and Mansalanao. Sulfurous fumes were also experienced strongly in Brgy. Cubay, La Carlota City and faintly as far as the Municipality of Hinigaran, Negros Occidental.
- On 15 February 2025 at 2:32 PM, an episode of significant emission occurred from the summit crater of Kanlaon Volcano. The emission lasted for eight (8) minutes based on the seismic record and generated a plume that rose 1,500 meters above the crater before drifting to the west-northwest. Ashfall and sulfurous smells were reported in several localities of Bago City, Negros Occidental.

- On 11 January 2025 at 1:00 PM, a pronounced inflation or swelling of the middle to upper portion of the eastern edifice was observed. Electronic tilt was recorded at 1,056 m elevation on the eastern flank of the volcano showing an abrupt and sharp increase in inflationary tilt since 10 January 2025, indicating a sudden pressurization within the upper portions of the edifice. The overall parameters may indicate that the shallow magma conduit of the volcano is undergoing pressurization that may lead to an eruption.
- On 23 December 2024 at 12:30 PM, an increase in volcanic ash emission at the Kanlaon Volcano was observed. At 11:45 AM, dark ash began issuing from the summit of Kanlaon Volcano accompanied by a weak low frequency volcanic earthquake. This has produced a dark plume roughly 1.2 kilometers tall that is drifting to the northwest. Ash emission has been ongoing and ashfall is expected to fall over communities of Negros Occidental northwest to west of the volcano. All other parameters of the volcano remain elevated but are generally unchanged.
- On 09 December 2024 at 3:03 PM, Alert Level 3 was raised from Alert Level 2 after an explosive eruption that occurred at the summit vent of the Kanlaon Volcano. The eruption produced a voluminous plume that rapidly rose to 3,000 meters above the vent and drifted west-southwest. PDCs descended the slopes on the general southeastern edifice based on IP and thermal camera monitors.
- The raising of the Alert Level of Kanlaon Volcano from Alert Level 2 (increasing unrest) to Alert Level 3 (magmatic unrest) means that a magmatic eruption has begun and may progress to further explosive eruptions. All LGUs are advised to evacuate the 6-km radius from the summit of the volcano and must be prepared for additional evacuation if activity warrants.

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **22,680 families** or **89,625 persons** are affected in **29 barangays** in **Regions VI** and **VII** (see Annex A).



III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **2,561 families** or **8,192 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **21 evacuation centers (ECs)** in **Regions VI** and **VII** (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **3,722 families** or **11,958 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex E).

c. Total Displaced Population

A total of **6,283 families** or **20,150 persons** are still displaced in **Regions VI** and **VII** (see Annex F).

IV. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱258,306,545.14** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, **₱156,006,445.31** from **DSWD**, **₱30,392,293.59** from the **LGUs**, **₱33,451,112.24** from **Non-Government Organizations (NGOs)**, and **₱38,456,694.00** from **other Partners** (see Annex G).
