

# **DSWD DROMIC Report #235 on Kanlaon Volcano Eruption**

as of 18 June 2025, 6PM

### I. Situation Overview

- As of 18 June 2025, Kanlaon Volcano remains under Alert Level 3 (magmatic unrest) which means that the volcano is in a state of magmatic unrest, with currently increased chances of short-lived moderately explosive eruptions that could generate life-threatening volcanic hazards. It is recommended that communities within a 6-km radius from the summit crater remain evacuated due to the danger of pyroclastic density currents (PDCs), ballistic projectiles, ashfall, rockfall and other related hazards. Communities that experience ashfall must take all necessary precautions and use protective masks or wet cloth to prevent ash inhalation, with special attention given to vulnerable persons including the elderly, persons with respiratory or cardio-vascular diseases, expecting mothers and infants. Local Government Units (LGUs) must continue to prepare their communities within the PDC hazard zone for subsequent evacuation in case unrest further escalates and hazardous worst-case explosive eruption becomes imminent. Increased vigilance against potential syn-eruption lahars and sediment-laden streamflows in channels draining the edifice is strongly advised should intense rains occur during eruptive unrest. Civil aviation authorities must also advise pilots to avoid flying close to the volcano's summit as ash from any sudden eruption can be hazardous to aircraft.,
- On 13 May 2025 at 02:55 AM, a moderately explosive eruption occurred at the summit crater of Kanlaon Volcano that lasted five (5) minutes based on seismic and infrasound data. The eruption generated a greyish voluminous plume that rose approximately 4.5 kilometers above the vent before drifting to the southwest. Audible rumbling sounds of the eruption were reported in Brgy. Pula, Canlaon City, Negros Oriental and La Castellana, Negros Occidental. Incandescent PDCs descended the southern slopes within approximately two (2) kilometers of the crater based on visual and thermal camera monitoring. Large ballistic fragments were also observed to have been thrown around the crater within a few hundred meters and caused burning of vegetation near the volcano summit. Thin ashfall has been reported in the following localities of Negros Occidental: La Carlota City— Brgys. Cubay, San Miguel, Yubo and Ara-al; Bago City— Brgys. Ilijan and Binubuhan; and La Castellana— Brgys. Biak-na-Bato, Sag-ang, and Mansalanao.
- On 08 April 2025 at 05:51 AM, a moderately explosive eruption occurred at the summit crater of Kanlaon Volcano that lasted 56 minutes based on seismic and visual recordings. The eruption generated a gray voluminous plume that slowly rose to 4,000 meters above the vent before bending and drifting west and southwest. Audible rumbling sounds of the eruption were reported in Brgys. Biak-na-Bato and Sag-ang, La Castellana, Negros Occidental and Brgy. Pula, Canlaon City, Negros Oriental. PDCs descended the southern slopes within a kilometer of the crater, in the jurisdiction of La Castellana, based on visual and thermal camera monitoring. Large ballistic fragments were also observed to have been thrown around the crater within a few hundred meters and caused burning



of vegetation near the volcano summit. Thin ashfall has been reported in the following localities of Negros Occidental: La Carlota City– Brgys. Roberto Salas Benedicto, La Granja, Nagasi, Yubo, Ara-al, San Miguel and Cubay; Bago City– Brgys. Mailum, Ilijan, and Binubuhan; and La Castellana– Brgys. Sag-ang and Mansalanao. Sulfurous fumes were also experienced strongly in Brgy. Cubay, La Carlota City and faintly as far as the Municipality of Hinigaran, Negros Occidental.


- On 15 February 2025 at 2:32 PM, an episode of significant emission occurred from the summit crater of Kanlaon Volcano. The emission lasted for eight (8) minutes based on the seismic record and generated a plume that rose 1,500 meters above the crater before drifting to the west-northwest. Ashfall and sulfurous smells were reported in several localities of Bago City, Negros Occidental.
- On 11 January 2025 at 1:00 PM, a pronounced inflation or swelling of the middle
  to upper portion of the eastern edifice was observed. Electronic tilt was recorded
  at 1,056 m elevation on the eastern flank of the volcano showing an abrupt and
  sharp increase in inflationary tilt since 10 January 2025, indicating a sudden
  pressurization within the upper portions of the edifice. The overall parameters
  may indicate that the shallow magma conduit of the volcano is undergoing
  pressurization that may lead to an eruption.
- On 23 December 2024 at 12:30 PM, an increase in volcanic ash emission at the Kanlaon Volcano was observed. At 11:45 AM, dark ash began issuing from the summit of Kanlaon Volcano accompanied by a weak low frequency volcanic earthquake. This has produced a dark plume roughly 1.2 kilometers tall that is drifting to the northwest. Ash emission has been ongoing and ashfall is expected to fall over communities of Negros Occidental northwest to west of the volcano. All other parameters of the volcano remain elevated but are generally unchanged.
- On 09 December 2024 at 3:03 PM, Alert Level 3 was raised from Alert Level 2 after an explosive eruption that occurred at the summit vent of the Kanlaon Volcano. The eruption produced a voluminous plume that rapidly rose to 3,000 meters above the vent and drifted west-southwest. PDCs descended the slopes on the general southeastern edifice based on IP and thermal camera monitors.
- The raising of the Alert Level of Kanlaon Volcano from Alert Level 2 (increasing unrest) to Alert Level 3 (magmatic unrest) means that a magmatic eruption has begun and may progress to further explosive eruptions. All LGUs are advised to evacuate the 6-km radius from the summit of the volcano and must be prepared for additional evacuation if activity warrants.

## II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **24,406 families** or **94,053 persons** are affected in **30 barangays** in **Regions VI** and **VII** (see Annex A).



# III. Status of Displaced Population

### a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are 2,184 families or 6,991 persons currently taking temporary shelter in 20 evacuation centers (ECs) in Regions VI and VII (see Annex B).

## b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **3,070 families** or **9,878 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex E).

### c. Total Displaced Population

A total of **5,254 families** or **16,869 persons** are still displaced in **Regions VI** and **VII** (see Annex F).

## IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **5,032 houses** were damaged; of which, **one (1)** is **totally damaged** and **5,031** are **partially damaged** in **Region VI** (see Annex G).



## V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of ₱293,173,337.86 worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, ₱187,435,238.03 from DSWD, ₱33,430,293.59 from the LGUs, ₱33,851,112.24 from Non-Government Organizations (NGOs), and ₱38,456,694.00 from other Partners (see Annex H).
