

## DSWD DROMIC Report #15 on the Effects of Southwest Monsoon and Typhoon “Bising” as of 15 July 2025, 6AM

### I. Situation Overview

On 04 July 2025, at 5:00 AM, the Low Pressure Area (LPA) west of Calayan, Cagayan developed into a Tropical Depression (TD) and was named “Bising”. Meanwhile, the Southwest Monsoon affected Central and Southern Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao. By 11:00 AM, the Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (PAGASA) reported that it slightly intensified over the sea west of extreme Northern Luzon. At 3:00 PM, TD “Bising” exited the Philippine Area of Responsibility (PAR). It continuously intensified and affected the extreme Northern Luzon.

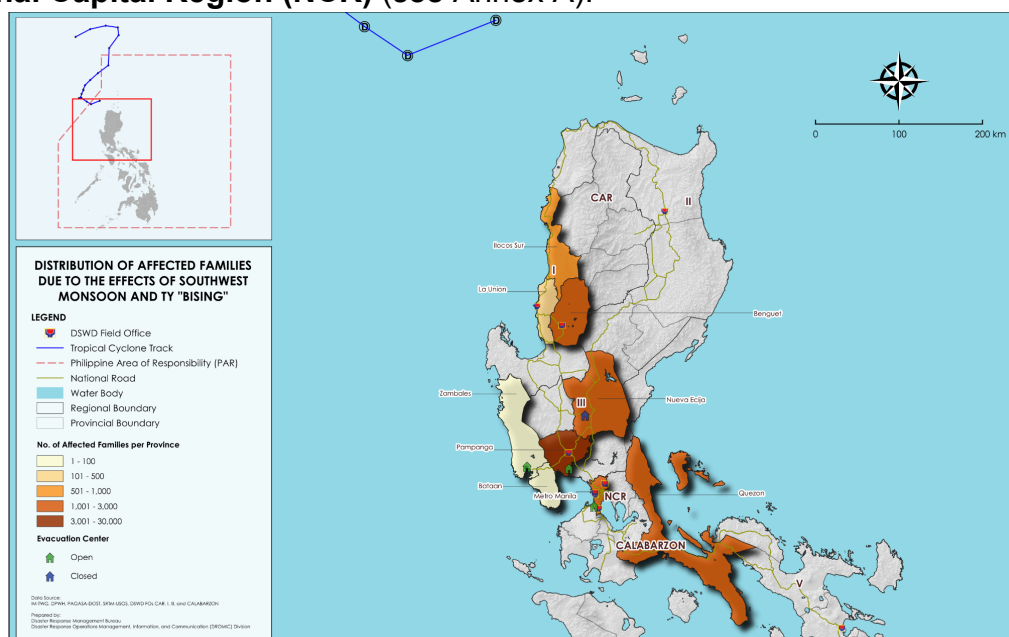
On 06 July 2025, at 4:00 AM, PAGASA reported that the trough of Severe Tropical Storm “Bising” affected extreme Northern Luzon while Southwest Monsoon affected the rest of the country. By 5:00 PM, Typhoon “Bising” accelerated northeastward towards Taiwan. By 11:00 PM, it further intensified and re-entered the northwestern boundary of the PAR.

On 07 July 2025, at 5:00 AM, Typhoon “Bising” slightly weakened as it moved over the northwestern portion of Taiwan. Meanwhile, the Southwest Monsoon continued to affect the rest of the country. At 11:00 AM, “Bising” exited the PAR.

### II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **35,540 families** or **113,476 persons** are affected in **106 barangays** in **Regions I, III, CALABARZON, Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR), and National Capital Region (NCR)** (see Annex A).



### III. Status of Displaced Population

#### a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **104 families** or **419 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **three (3) evacuation centers** in **Regions III** and **NCR** (see Annex B).

#### b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **22 families** or **79 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex D).

#### c. Total Displaced Population

There are **126 families** or **498 persons** still displaced in **Regions III**, **CAR**, and **NCR** (see Annex E).

### IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **26 houses** were damaged; of which, **four (4)** were **totally damaged** and **22** were **partially damaged** in **Regions I, III**, and **CAR** (see Annex F).

### V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱18,910,213.20** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, **₱18,587,480.27** from **DSWD** and **₱322,732.93** from the **Local Government Units (LGUs)** (see Annex G).
