

DSWD DROMIC Report #2 on the Effects of Southwest Monsoon and Tropical Storm "Crising"

as of 18 July 2025, 6AM


Situation Overview

Issued on 18 July 2025, at 5:00 AM, "**Crising**" intensifies into a Tropical Storm as it approaches Northern Luzon.

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Refer to Weather Advisory No. 11 issued at 5:00 AM today for the heavy rainfall outlook due to Tropical Cyclone CRISING and the Southwest Monsoon.



Severe Winds

- The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.
- Minor to moderate impacts from gale-force winds are possible within any of the localities where Wind Signal No. 2 is hoisted.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.
- The Southwest Monsoon will bring strong to gale-force gusts over the following areas (especially in coastal and upland areas exposed to winds):
 - Today: Batangas, Quezon, the rest of Bicol Region, MIMAROPA, Visayas, Zamboanga del Norte, Camiguin, Misamis Oriental Surigao del Norte, Dinagat Islands, Davao Occidental, Davao Oriental, and Sarangani.
 - Tomorrow: Metro Manila, Central Luzon, CALABARZON, Bicol Region, MIMAROPA, Visayas, Zamboanga Peninsula, Basilan, Sulu, Tawi-Tawi, Misamis Occidental, Lanao del Norte, Camiguin, Surigao del Norte, Dinagat Islands, Davao Occidental, and Davao Oriental.
 - Sunday (20 July): Metro Manila, Ilocos Region, Central Luzon, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, Western Visayas, and Northern Samar.



Coastal Inundation

 There is a minimal to moderate risk of life-threatening storm surge with peak heights reaching 1.0 to 2.0 m in the next 48 hours over the low-lying or exposed coastal localities of Cagayan including Babuyan Islands, Isabela, Ilocos Norte, and Ilocos Sur. Refer to Storm Surge Warning No. 5 issued at 2:00 AM today for the details.

HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

A Gale Warning is hoisted over the northern seaboard of Northern Luzon. Refer to Gale Warning No. 1 issued at 5 AM today for the details.

24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook

Up to very rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 5.0 m: The seaboards of Batanes.
- Up to 4.0 m: The northern seaboards of Ilocos Norte and Cagayan including Babuyan Islands
- Sea travel is risky for all types or tonnage of vessels. All mariners must remain in port or, if underway, seek shelter or safe harbor as soon as possible until winds and waves subside.

Up to rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 3.5 m: The northeastern seaboard of Cagayan; the eastern seaboard of Isabela; the western seaboard of Ilocos Norte and Palawan; the southern seaboard of Iloilo; the western and southern seaboards of Negros Occidental and Guimaras
- Up to 3.0 m: The remaining seaboards of Cagayan; the seaboard of Isabela, the
 western seaboards of Antique and Occidental Mindoro including Lubang Islands; the
 southern seaboard of Negros Oriental; the northern seaboard of Zamboanga
 Peninsula; the eastern seaboard of Davao Oriental; the remaining seaboards of
 Palawan
- Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.

Up to moderate seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 2.5 m: The northeastern seaboard of Aurora and Northern Samar; the eastern seaboards of Catanduanes and Eastern Samar; the seaboards of Romblon, Siquijor, and Camiguin; the northern and western seaboards of Masbate; the southern seaboards of Quezon, Oriental Mindoro, Bohol, and Southern Leyte; the northern seaboards of Misamis Oriental, Agusan del Norte, and Surigao del Norte
- Up to 2.0 m: The western seaboards of Bataan and Batangas; the remaining seaboards of Aurora, Polillo Islands, Camarines Sur, Catanduanes, and Northern Samar; the northern seaboards of Camarines Norte; the southern seaboard of Marinduque; the seaboards of Misamis Occidental, Lanao del Norte, and Dinagat Islands



 Mariners of motorbancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigation under these conditions.

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK


- CRISING will move generally northwestward within the next 12 hours. On the forecast track, a landfall scenario over mainland Cagayan or Babuyan Islands this afternoon or evening is possible. Afterwards, it will move west northwestward traversing over Extreme Northern Luzon until it exits the Philippine Area of Responsibility by tomorrow afternoon.
- CRISING intensified into a tropical storm at 2:00 AM today. It will continue to intensify until it reaches Severe Tropical Storm category by tomorrow morning or afternoon.

The center of the eye was estimated based on all available data 335 km East of Echague, Isabela or 325 km East of Tuguegarao City, Cagayan (17.2 °N, 124.8 °E) while moving Northwestward at 20 km/h with a maximum sustained winds of 65 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 80 km.

I. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of 5,022 families or 17,694 persons are affected in 142 barangays in Regions MIMAROPA, VI, VII, and IX (see Annex A).





II. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are 1,598 families or 5,255 persons currently taking temporary shelter in 80 evacuation centers in Regions MIMAROPA, VI, VII, and IX (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **859 families** or **3,161 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex C).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are 2,457 families or 8,416 persons still displaced in Regions MIMAROPA, VI, VII, and IX (see Annex D).

III. Damaged Houses

A total of 174 houses were damaged; of which, 22 are totally damaged and 152 are partially damaged in Regions VI and IX (see Annex E).

IV. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of ₱801,139.00 worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, ₱744,539.00 from DSWD and ₱56,600.00 from the Local Government Units (LGUs) (see Annex F).

 The Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) has activated its Response Cluster to prepare for the possible impacts of the Southwest Monsoon and Tropical Depression (TD) "CRISING," formerly identified as Low Pressure Area (LPA 07F). Undersecretary for Disaster Response Management Group (DRMG) Diana Rose S. Cajipe reaffirmed the Department's commitment to delivering timely and effective social protection interventions to communities that may be affected by flooding, displacement, and other hazards associated with TD "CRISING" and the intensified Southwest Monsoon. The Disaster Response Management Bureau (DRMB) is currently on Red Alert Status to ensure continuous monitoring and dissemination of significant disaster-related updates, in close coordination with DSWD Field Offices for the implementation of preparedness and readiness measures, and with DOST-PAGASA for timely and accurate weather forecasts and advisories. All members of the DRMB Quick Response Teams (QRTs), as well as emergency logistics equipment, are on standby for immediate deployment as necessary. In support of these efforts, the National Resource and Logistics Management Bureau (NRLMB) is ensuring the adequate supply and timely replenishment of Food and Non-Food Items (FNFIs) for resource augmentation to DSWD Field Offices. The NRLMB is likewise continuing its repacking operations to meet the anticipated demand. Furthermore, DRMB actively participated in the Pre-Disaster Risk Assessment (PDRA) meetings in line with the projected impacts of the Southwest Monsoon and TD "CRISING." The Department remains steadfast in its commitment to safeguard the welfare of vulnerable communities and to support the national government's disaster preparedness and response efforts.

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
