

## DSWD DROMIC Report #3 on the Effects of Southwest Monsoon and Tropical Storm “Crising” as of 18 July 2025, 6PM

### I. Situation Overview

Issued on 18 July 2025, at 5:00 PM, stormy conditions are imminent over Northern Luzon tonight as “Crising” approaches Northern Cagayan.

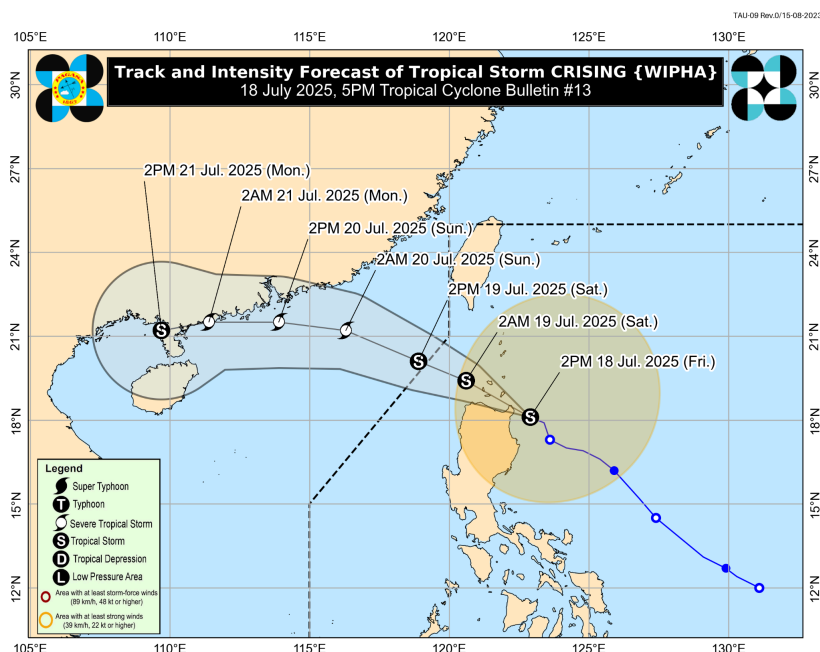
#### HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

##### Heavy Rainfall Outlook

Refer to Weather Advisory No. 13 issued at 5:00 PM today for the heavy rainfall outlook due to Tropical Cyclone “Crising” and the Southwest Monsoon.

##### Severe Winds

- The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.
- Minor to moderate impacts from gale-force winds are possible within any of the localities where Wind Signal No. 2 is hoisted.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.
- The Southwest Monsoon will bring strong to gale-force gusts over the following areas (especially in coastal and upland areas exposed to winds):
  - Today: Zambales, Bataan, Cavite, Batangas, Quezon, Bicol Region, MIMAROPA, Visayas, Zamboanga del Norte, Camiguin, Misamis Oriental, Misamis Occidental, Lanao del Norte, Surigao del Norte, Dinagat Islands, Davao Occidental, Davao Oriental, and Sarangani.
  - Tomorrow: Metro Manila, Pangasinan, Central Luzon, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, Visayas, Zamboanga Peninsula, Basilan, Sulu, Tawi-Tawi, Misamis Occidental, Lanao del Norte, Camiguin, Surigao del Norte, Dinagat Islands, Davao Occidental, and Davao Oriental.
  - Sunday (20 July): Metro Manila, Ilocos Region, Central Luzon, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, Western Visayas, Samar and Northern Samar.



### **Coastal Inundation**

- There is a minimal to moderate risk of life-threatening storm surge with peak heights reaching 1.0 to 2.0 m within 24 hours over the low-lying or exposed coastal localities of Batanes, Cagayan including Babuyan Islands, Ilocos Norte, and Ilocos Sur.

### **HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS**

A Gale Warning is hoisted over the northern seaboard of Northern Luzon. Refer to Gale Warning No. 3 issued at 5 PM today for the details.

### **24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook**

Up to very rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 6.0 m: The seaboards of Batanes and Babuyan Islands
- Up to 4.5 m: The northern seaboard of Ilocos Norte; the remaining seaboards of Cagayan; and the seaboard of Isabela
- Sea travel is risky for all types or tonnage of vessels. All mariners must remain in port or, if underway, seek shelter or safe harbor as soon as possible until winds and waves subside.

Up to rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 3.5 m: The western seaboards of Ilocos Norte, Zambales, Bataan, Batangas, Occidental Mindoro including Lubang Islands, Palawan, and Antique; the southern seaboard of Iloilo; the western and southern seaboards of Negros Occidental and Guimaras
- Up to 3.0 m: The southern seaboards of Negros Oriental, Cebu, and Bohol; the seaboards of Siquijor and Camiguin; the northern seaboard of Zamboanga Peninsula; the eastern seaboard of Davao Oriental; the remaining seaboards of Palawan
- Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.

Up to moderate seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 2.5 m: The northeastern seaboard of Aurora and Northern Samar; the eastern seaboards of Catanduanes and Eastern Samar; the remaining seaboards of Negros Oriental, Negros Occidental, Guimaras, Cebu and Bohol; the northern and western seaboards of Masbate; the southern seaboards of Quezon, Marinduque, Oriental Mindoro, and Southern Leyte; the northern seaboards of Misamis Oriental, Agusan del Norte, and Surigao del Norte
- Up to 2.0 m: The remaining seaboards of Aurora, Polillo Islands, Catanduanes, and Northern Samar; the northern seaboard of Camarines Norte; the eastern seaboard of Camarines Sur; the seaboards of Misamis Occidental, Lanao del Norte, and Dinagat Islands
- Mariners of motorbancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigation under these conditions.



#### b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **2,700 families** or **11,580 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex E).

#### c. Total Displaced Population

There are **6,702 families** or **24,748 persons** still displaced in **Regions II, MIMAROPA, V, VI, VII, and IX** (see Annex F).

### IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **201 houses** were damaged; of which, **26** are **totally damaged** and **175** are **partially damaged** in **Regions VI and IX** (see Annex G).

### V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱2,720,721.81** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, **₱2,558,751.81** from **DSWD** and **₱161,970.00** from the **Local Government Units (LGUs)** (see Annex H).
