

DSWD DROMIC Report #4 on the Effects of Southwest Monsoon and Tropical Storm “Crising” as of 19 July 2025, 6AM

I. Situation Overview

Issued on 19 July 2025, at 5:00 AM, “Crising” maintains its strength while moving away from extreme Northern Luzon

HAZARDS AFFECTING LAND AREAS

Heavy Rainfall Outlook

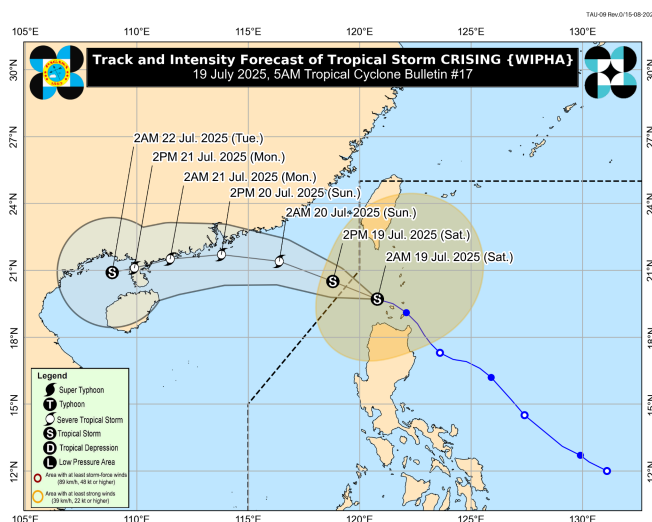
Refer to Weather Advisory No. 15 issued at 5:00 AM today for the heavy rainfall outlook due to Tropical Cyclone “Crising” and the Southwest Monsoon.

Severe Winds

- The wind signals warn the public of the general wind threat over an area due to the tropical cyclone. Local winds may be slightly stronger/enhanced in coastal and upland/mountainous areas exposed to winds. Winds are less strong in areas sheltered from the prevailing wind direction.
- Minor to moderate impacts from gale-force winds are possible within any of the localities where Wind Signal No. 2 is hoisted.
- Minimal to minor impacts from strong winds are possible within any of the areas under Wind Signal No. 1.
- The Southwest Monsoon will bring strong to gale-force gusts over the following areas (especially in coastal and upland areas exposed to winds):
 - Today: Metro Manila, Central Luzon, CALABARZON, Bicol Region, MIMAROPA, Visayas, Nueva Ecija, Nueva Vizcaya, the rest of Isabela, the rest of La Union, the rest of Benguet, Abra, Zamboanga del Norte, Camiguin, Misamis Oriental, Misamis Occidental, Lanao del Norte, Surigao del Norte, and Dinagat Islands.
 - Tomorrow: Metro Manila, Ilocos Region, Cordillera Administrative Region, Cagayan Valley, Central Luzon, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, Visayas, and Zamboanga del Norte.
 - Monday (21 July): Metro Manila, Ilocos Region, Cordillera Administrative Region, Central Luzon, CALABARZON, MIMAROPA, Bicol Region, and Visayas.

Coastal Inundation

- There is a minimal to moderate risk of life-threatening storm surge with peak heights reaching 1.0 to 2.0 m within 12 hours over the low-lying or exposed coastal localities of Batanes, Cagayan including Babuyan Islands, Ilocos Norte, and Ilocos Sur. Refer to Storm Surge Warning No. 9 issued at 2:00 AM today for the details.



HAZARDS AFFECTING COASTAL WATERS

A Gale Warning is hoisted over the northern and eastern seabords of Northern Luzon. Refer to Gale Warning No. 4 issued at 5 AM today for the details.

24-Hour Sea Condition Outlook

Up to very rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 6.0 m: The seabords of Batanes and Babuyan Islands
- Up to 4.5 m: The northern seaboard of Ilocos Norte; the remaining seabords of Cagayan
- Sea travel is risky for all types or tonnage of vessels. All mariners must remain in port or, if underway, seek shelter or safe harbor as soon as possible until winds and waves subside.

Up to rough seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 4.0 m: The seabords of Zambales, Bataan, Occidental Mindoro including Lubang Islands, and Kalayaan Islands; the western seabords of Palawan including Calamian Islands; the western seaboard of Pangasinan
- Up to 3.5 m: The seabords of Isabela; The western seabords of Ilocos Norte, Ilocos Sur, La Union, Batangas, and Antique; the southern seaboard of Iloilo; the western and southern seaboard of Guimaras; the remaining seaboard of Pangasinan
- Up to 3.0 m: The western seabords of Negros Occidental; the remaining seabords of Palawan
- Mariners of small seacrafts, including all types of motorbancas, are advised not to venture out to sea under these conditions, especially if inexperienced or operating ill-equipped vessels.

Up to moderate seas over the following coastal waters:

- Up to 2.5 m: The northeastern seaboard of Aurora and Northern Samar; the northern and eastern seabords of Catanduanes; the eastern seabords of Eastern Samar; the western and southern seabords of Negros Oriental; the northern and western seabords of Masbate; the southern seabords of Quezon, Marinduque, and Oriental Mindoro; the seabords of Romblon; the eastern and southern seabords of Davao Oriental
- Up to 2.0 m: The remaining seabords of Aurora; the northern and eastern seabords of Polillo Islands; the northern seabords of Camarines Norte, Camarines Sur, Lanao del Norte, Misamis Oriental, and Agusan del Norte; the eastern seabords of Surigao del Norte, Surigao del Sur, and Dinagat Islands; the southern seabords of Siquijor, Cebu, Southern Leyte, Davao Occidental, and Sarangani; the northern and western seabords of Zamboanga Peninsula, Basilan, Sulu, and Tawi-Tawi; the seabords of Misamis Occidental
- Mariners of motorbancas and similarly-sized vessels are advised to take precautionary measures while venturing out to sea and, if possible, avoid navigation under these conditions.

TRACK AND INTENSITY OUTLOOK

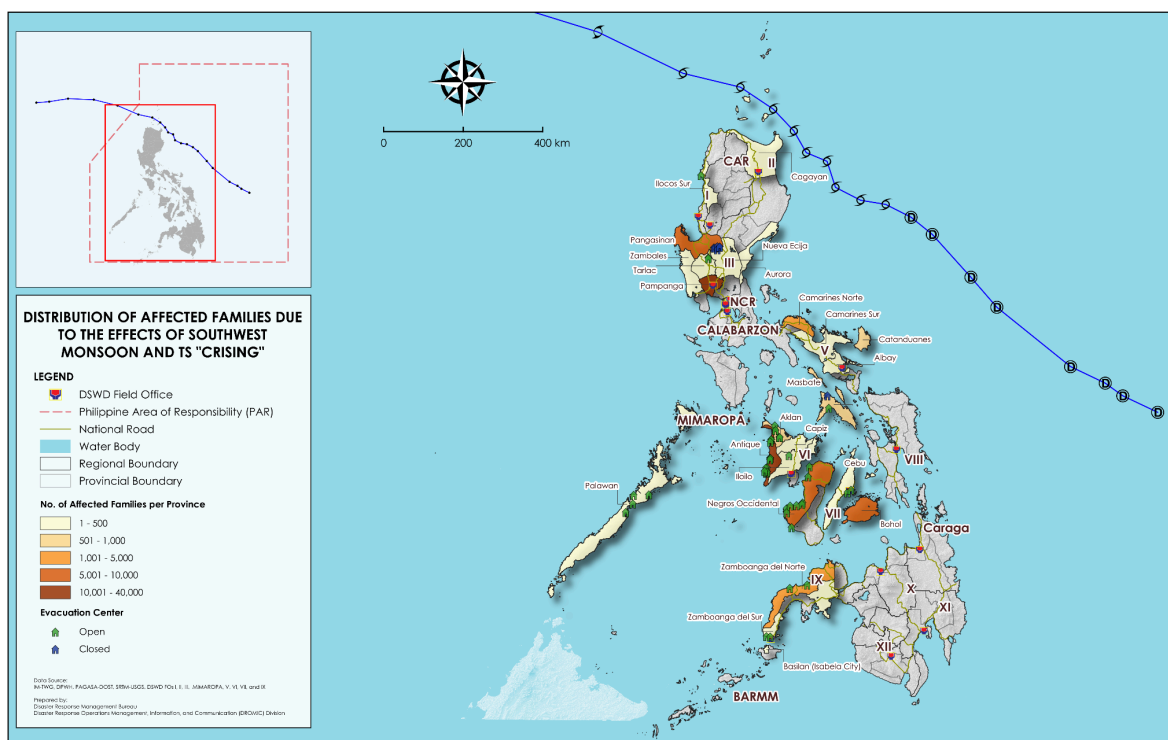
- Tropical Storm “Crising” will continue moving generally west northwestward towards southern China and may exit the Philippine Area of Responsibility this morning or early afternoon.
- “Crising” is forecast to continue to intensify and may reach Severe Tropical Storm category today.

The center of Tropical Storm CRISING was estimated based on all available data 125 km West Northwest of Calayan, Cagayan (19.8°N, 120.4°E) while moving West Northwestward at 15 km/h with a maximum sustained winds of 85 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 105 km/h

II. Status of Affected Areas and Population

A total of **68,209 families** or **215,599 persons** are affected in **495 barangays** in **Regions I, II, III, MIMAROPA, V, VI, VII, IX** and **CAR** (see Annex A).



III. Status of Displaced Population

a. Inside Evacuation Center

There are **5,378 families** or **17,381 persons** currently taking temporary shelter in **213 evacuation centers** in **Regions I, III, MIMAROPA, V, VI, VII, and IX** (see Annex B).

b. Outside Evacuation Center

There are **3,202 families** or **13,054 persons** temporarily staying with their relatives or friends (see Annex E).

c. Total Displaced Population

There are **8,580 families** or **30,435 persons** still displaced in **Regions I, II, III MIMAROPA, V, VI, VII, and IX** (see Annex F).

IV. Damaged Houses

A total of **276 houses** were damaged; of which, **34** are **totally damaged** and **242** are **partially damaged** in **Regions I, V, VI, VII and IX** (see Annex G).

V. Cost of Humanitarian Assistance Provided

A total of **₱4,544,076.09** worth of assistance was provided to the affected families; of which, **₱4,196,509.43** from **DSWD** and **₱347,566.66** from the **Local Government Units (LGUs)** (see Annex H).
